SAILORS DISOBEYING

LONDON, Feb. 7 .- Premier Lloyd George is reported to favor a substantial modification of the list of Germans whose surrender to the allies is demanded, according to the Westminster Gazette today.

FRENCH ASTONISHED. PARIS, Feb. 7.—Astonishment was caused in French circles today by the change in attitude of the British govern ment regarding the extradition of Germans accused of violation of the laws of war. It was understood that Great Britain was the most insistent of the powers represented at the peace conference in demanding the trial of the former emperor and other prominent Germans.

Information received today shows that the British tendency is to leave to others the furtherance of the extradition proceedings.

Railroad Plunder Double in Wartime,

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 .- Wholesale looting of merchandise in transit up-on the railroads of the United States caused a loss of approximately \$45,-000,000 in 1919, according to railroad administration statistics.

This is estimated to be more than double the losses sustained in any pre-war year, but it is pointed out that the increased cost of commodities stolen, which is roughly estimated to be sixty-five per cent, must be conidered when considering past loses with those of today.


