



DRIVE ON LAW VIOLATORS TO BE DETERMINED

Police Declare They Will Stop Petty Thieving in Ranger.

The drive on law violators last week by the Ranger police department will not be slackened, police officials indicated last night.

Police Commissioner C. O. Terrell, who was in Fort Worth Thursday and Friday, expressed himself as pleased with the department's work during his absence.

The apparent ease with which the thieves have "gotten away with it," is not difficult to explain, the police say. They work in unfrequented sections of the city, always assisted.

It is comparatively easy, the police say, for anyone to go along main street sneakily and lift things from the car without suspicions being aroused.

A visitor at the police station one day last week remarked to Assistant Chief Leonard Davenport that he has frequently observed men on the road early on the morning with valves, pipe lines and even tanks of gasoline.

The three young boys, arrested Thursday in connection with the disappearance of automobile accessories, brass and lead in Ranger and vicinity, were taken to Eastland Saturday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Poe.

It is charged the young man's death was caused by slow poisoning with arsenic and that his father and mother had also been poisoned.

FORT WORTH FIRE COMMISSIONER HURT; FIREMEN INJURED

FORT WORTH, May 12.—Fire and Police Commissioner Alderman and two firemen were injured tonight when flames which started at 8:45 o'clock wiped out almost an entire block beginning in a building which was occupied by the Gabert Auto works.

The loss is estimated to be between \$150,000 and \$200,000. The flames which originated on the second floor of the building spread quickly and within a few minutes the structure was a flaming mass.

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT ASKS PUBLICATION OF CLARIFYING STATEMENT

Eastland, Texas, May 12, 1923.—Editor Ranger Daily Times, Ranger, Texas. Dear Sir: Will you kindly publish this letter in your Sunday issue of the Daily Times?

I have never at any time tried to interpose my judgments or opinions in any controversies of the larger independent school districts.

Mr. Carl Springer, an Eastland attorney, came to my office several days ago and asked my opinion regarding the right of trustees of independent districts to rescind actions which they had taken in session, after duly organizing and electing their officers within the 20 days prescribed by law.

My answer was that if the minutes had been duly read and approved and if the officials had really accepted these positions, I believed that a contract had been made which could not be rescinded without the consent of both parties to the contract.

I gave this opinion to Mr. Springer personally, and to no one else, never dreaming that my name would be used in any article or statement (except as an explanation) with my permission.

Trusting that this explanation will clear the erroneous impression which seems to have been made concerning my interference with your school affairs, and with the kindest regards to all, I remain,

'PUSSYFOOT' JOHNSON OF WORLD-WIDE FAME SPEAKS HERE TUESDAY

"Pussyfoot" Johnson, the world wide prohibition advocate, will speak in Ranger next Tuesday night at the First Baptist church.

Texas is not a strange place to Johnson. In the days of the Indian Territory, Johnson was in the Indian service, trying to keep separate the Indians north of Red river and the whisky runners on the Texas side.

He is on a lecture tour sponsored by the World League Against Alcoholism. His headquarters are in London and he is conducting a campaign in European countries.

He returns to the East after his speaking tour of Texas. Included in his speaking tour are a number of North Texas towns that were formerly havens for the rum runners of the Indian Territory and, according to Johnson, the cities appear 1,000 per cent better—better even than two years ago when he was in Texas.

The trust company section of the association will hold its annual meeting the last day of the convention. Dick Ashley of San Antonio will preside at this meeting.

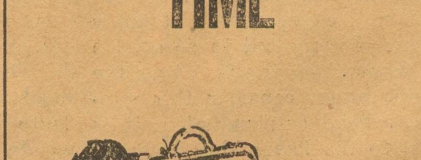
SALVATION ARMY LEADERS TO VISIT RANGER THIS WEEK

# FIGHT COTTON BOLL WEEVILS WITH TURKEYS

### One Tom, Ten Hens and Their Brood Clear 50 Acres of the Pest.

MOODY, Texas, May 12.—"Fight the boll weevil with turkeys. Fred Acree, Moody business man and large cotton grower, has adopted this slogan for controlling the cotton pest on his land. He declares that it is the best control method yet discovered.

After several years experimenting, Acree declares that he has discovered some interesting facts about weevil control with turkeys. He says he has watched turkeys as they spread over the cotton fields and has learned each "peep" means destruction to a weevil or worm. This observation has led him to the belief that one tom, and ten hens and their brood will control the damage by weevils and worms on 50 or 60 acres of cotton.

Acree owns and operates 1,800 acres of land, a large part of which is devoted to cotton growing. He has produced some of the best turkeys in this country, including winners in poultry shows of the southwest and the second prize cockerel from the national show held at Madison Square Garden, New York.

## PETTY THIEVING INVESTIGATION COMES MONDAY

County Attorney Expects to Present Matter to Grand Jury.

Chief of Police O. V. Davenport said Saturday afternoon that he had not received any word from County Attorney Barnes relative to transferring the youths held in connection with an investigation of petty thieving in Ranger to the Eastland county jail. The county attorney instructed the Ranger police head Thursday while here to make an investigation to hold them pending further instructions. He said an examining trial would be given the boys following the convening of the grand jury on Monday.

Two of the boys arrested were released. Three were still held in the jail Saturday.

E. K. Britton of the Export Oil corporation, which owns the Export oil refinery, three miles northeast of Ranger, said after a conference with County Attorney Barnes, that while Ranger youths had visited the refinery grounds as written confessions declare, which officers say the boys made, he believes that the major part of the damage done to automobiles stored in the refinery's boiler room and the garage is the work of three men, two of whom he mentioned by name.

"The work was done between 7 and 11 o'clock Monday morning," Mr. Britton said. "There is a road to the Hagaman well which we allow the men going there to use. My brother was returning to the plant grounds when he saw a car that looked to him like a Buick with three men in it driving away. He could only recognize two of them. What business they had there we don't know. This was on Monday morning. There was only one automobile track on the road and it was plain. It had rained Sunday night as I remember."

The Export Oil refinery was to have opened for business the first of May, Mr. Britton said, but because of dropping crude oil prices the opening had been postponed. Only several men are around the plant at present. It is impossible to see the garage from the house, on the hill, where some men are living, making it easy for the garage to be visited by outsiders without being noticed.

Mr. Britton estimates the damage done to all the six cars to be around \$2,000. "There isn't that much stolen in money value," he said, "but the crude way the things were taken

off and the money it would take to replace the stolen things sends the figure up."

The damage to the Pierce-Arrow is greater than was generally known at first. The radiator, carburetor, gasoline tank, cushions and steering wheel were removed.

The thieves failed to get away with the radiator on a Buick car but broke the windshield while tampering with the car. A radiator was taken from another car.

Hub caps were taken from the Velie, Case and Peerless autos, which were kept in the boiler room. The Pierce-Arrow, Ford and Buick were stored in the garage.

Thieves made a raid last year on the refinery, taking a surveyor's outfit, a typewriter and other things for a total value of \$1560, Mr. Britton said.

## CITY BAKERY PUTS IN NEW AND LARGER BAKING EQUIPMENT

Among the improvements being made at the City Bakery, 122 North Austin street, are the installation of a steam boiler for making French bread and rolls and the equipment of the bake shop with a cake mixer. A firebrick oven with a capacity of 425 loaves of bread, was used for the first time last Wednesday.

Roy Speed, the owner, said he is making the additions to take care of his growing trade. Mr. Speed bought the bakery on Nov. 1, 1922, from J. C. Fowler and has been operating it ever since.

The large brick oven is built entirely outside of the bake room, the doors opening inside of the latter room. It will be used for all kinds of baking. The oven capacity will be almost tripled as the old one was capable of baking 150 loaves.

With the installation of the steam boiler, Mr. Speed will have live steam at his command for the making of French and rye bread.

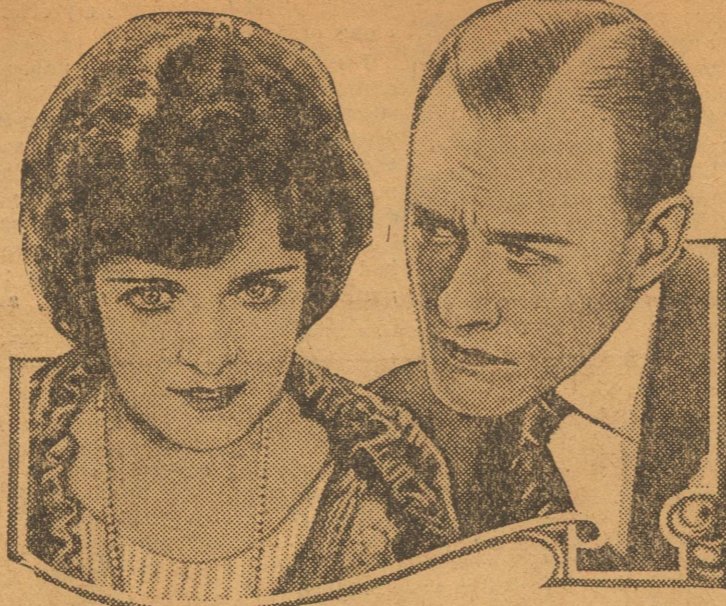

## RUHR VALLEY NATIVES STRONG FOR DISCIPLINE

Talk Violence to French Invaders, but Inclined to "Passive" Resistance.

GROAT (United Press Correspondent) BERLIN, May 12.—The "hard-headed Westphalians," as the natives of Westphalia like to term themselves are still telling the stranger within their gates that there is likely to be bloodshed, murder, arson and the like against the French Ruhr "invaders" one of these balmy days.

The Westphalian tells you he is of different stock than the rest of the Germans. When he comes into the world and his first word is "Nein," meaning no, he is wont to boast to you. And, following his "Nein" idea he is saying it emphatically to the Frenchman.

But if one pries beneath the surface of this propaganda song about impending bloodshed—of course it would be futile to predict definitely that bloodshed won't come—one finds the truth to be this:

The Westphalian has no intention of starting trouble with the French occupiers.

His discipline has been and still is too Prussian to permit this. He was disciplined in the hard school of

Prussian militarism. There he learned to obey. And now he is obeying. He has been told to keep quiet, avoid provocation, grin and bear it.

That he is doing. And, besides what training he had under compulsory military service, he has had an even stronger discipline in the labor unions which rule the rich industrial territory with a hand as hard as and steel the region the region produces.

The unions have trained their men through many a battle with capital that they must keep a united front and must obey their leaders. This has been hammered in until it is second nature.

Hence, when the labor leaders, at the behest of Chancellor Cuno and others promulgated the doctrine of "passive resistance," it meant that hundreds of thousands of laborers simply obey it as sheep follow their leader. It is "Discipline" with a capital D.

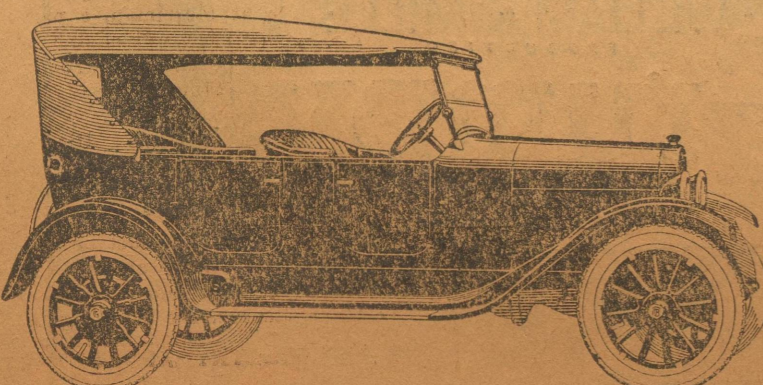

# NEW YORK AND PARIS ONLY 15 HOURS APART

This Is Promised When "Phantom" Airplane, Just Invented Is Perfected.

By JOHN O'BRIEN, United Press Staff Correspondent. PARIS, May 12.—Mail from Paris will reach New York within 15 hours when the "phantom airplane," invented by Captain Maurice Percheron, has been perfected.

This is a question of only a couple of years, French experts declare. The inventor believes he will be able to control a small airplane flying without a pilot, as it now does for a distance of about 70 miles, right around the globe.

French aeronautical engineers, while admitting that Americans have done a lot to make the "pilotless airplane" a practical success, insist that it was in France that the first experiments were made and they do not intend to give up their title to pioneers. Toward the end of the war Captain Boucher sent up the first of these airplanes guided by means of Hertzian waves. On Sept. 14 of the same year an airplane thus guided remained in the air 51 minutes, covering a total distance of 100 kilometers, or 60 miles. It was guided from another airplane flying in the ordinary way.

Since that time enormous progress has been made. The "pilotless airplane" is now almost entirely automatic. The hands of the pilot have been replaced by a mechanism something like that of an automatic elevator, with buttons marked "Up," "Down," "To the Right" and "To the Left." By pushing these buttons two experts who recently made a long flight were able to dispense entirely with the balancing and directing apparatus. The next step will be to send the airplane on its flight without having this mechanism or any person aboard, everything being directed from a fixed station on the ground.

Besides the main idea of guiding the airplane from a distance, the machine in which the experiments have been made combines several features any one of which would be regarded as an enormous advance in the science of flying. As the airplane comes to the ground a trailer strikes the surface first, cutting off the motor and acting as a brake for an easy landing. There is also a delicate piece of mechanism which prevents the airplane from taking the air if the motor

power is not sufficiently developed. Still another sends the machine to a determined height and will not permit it to mount higher.

Captain Percheron, aided by another veteran aeronautical engineer, Captain Boucher, is now devoting all his time to the perfecting of the apparatus which will enable him to send an airplane on an indefinite journey with what might be called "written" instructions, since they would take the form of a perforated music roll for automatic pianos, which will be executed mathematically and automatically. He feels sure that he will in time be able to launch a machine for a flight of two hours and a half from Paris to Marseilles, four hours across the Mediterranean to Algiers, 15 hours to New York, and 48 hours, including landings at pre-arranged stations, to the Far East.

Looking at the military side of this invention the possibilities of terrific destruction without danger to the attacking force and without known means of defense are infinite. Thousands of aerial canoes, loaded with explosives, could be sent over enemy territory, their deadly charges to be dropped when and where the directing army desired.

## COUNTY ATTORNEY SAYS HE HAS PICKED OUT SUNDAY MOVIES TO FEEL WEIGHT OF HIS DISFAVOR

Ranger Daily Times: My attention has been called to your article of yesterday's issue wherein you accuse me of "passing the buck" of closing the Sunday picture shows. I will not be drawn into a newspaper controversy in this matter but wish to state my position, so that it may not be misunderstood.

About three months ago I was visited by a picture show man from Cisco who informed me that he was going to run his picture show, if the picture shows in Eastland and Ranger were allowed to continue running on Sunday. That he knew the sentiment of all of the local officers in Cisco was against running the picture shows and that if such local officers prosecuted him, he was going to appeal the case to the county court-at-law where my office would have to prosecute or dismiss the case. I at that time told him that if he persisted in such an attitude that it would result in all the picture shows in Eastland county having to close on Sunday. Since that time various citizens from different parts of the county have visited my office and appeared before the grand jury of Eastland county insisting that the Sunday picture shows be closed. The grand

jury before whom this matter was discussed recommended that my office enforce the Sunday laws as far as possible.

About three weeks ago the picture shows in Cisco opened on Sunday over the protest of its local officers and are now running on Sunday.

It is not left to the people of Cisco or any other community as to whether or not the Sunday picture shows shall run in Ranger, and any statement to the effect that I have stated that the community of Cisco was responsible for my attitude in closing the Sunday picture shows is maliciously false and not made in the interest of truth, but only for the purpose of making it appear that I had arrayed one community against the other. My office assumes the responsibility of its attitude toward the Sunday picture show, and I am personally responsible to any aggrieved party or parties for any statement that I might have made.

As far as I am concerned this matter is a closed incident and I am going to do everything in my power to close Sunday picture shows. I regret that the Sunday picture show incident has seen fit to attempt to array

the towns of Cisco and Ranger against one another, but their action in doing so only further convinces me of the danger in allowing them to operate further.

The legislature is in session at the present time and if the law should not be enforced it should be repealed. If the legislature refused to repeal it, I should enforce it.

If the Sunday picture show men and their sympathizers wish to enforce the Sunday law in the town of Ranger to its strictest letter, they have an efficient police force, a city attorney, and a corporation judge. I shall place no obstacle in their way, if they honestly want to enforce it, but

at present the whole energy of my office along that line shall be centered on the Sunday picture shows, and until that matter is determined by the Sunday picture show closing, I do not intend to dissipate my efforts along other lines.

I further notice in your paper a statement by Mayor R. H. Hodges wherein he states "we have been informed by County Attorney Barnes that his action attempting to close moving picture shows in Ranger is due to a request of Cisco citizens." I do not know Mr. Hodges nor have I had any conversation with him regarding Sunday picture shows, and

such statement made by him is untrue and can serve no other purpose than to mislead the people of Cisco. In closing I will again state that Sunday picture shows are going to be prosecuted as long as I feel it is my duty to do so and I accept all the responsibility connected therewith as leads to the suspicion that the Serbians are working.—Dallas News.

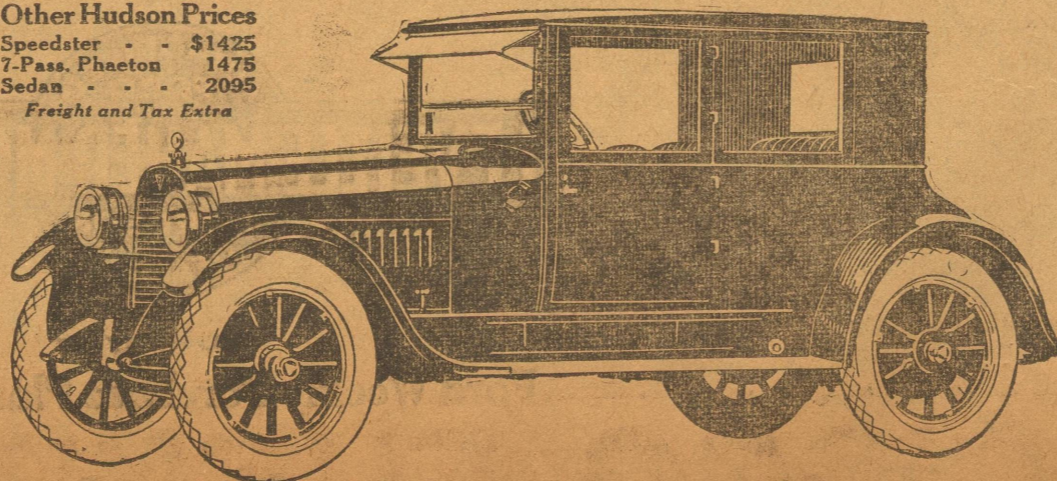

Soviet Orator Speaks Harshly of British Neighbor

MOSCOW, May 12.—"We want peace, but we are prepared to meet the enemy."

This was the challenge flung at Great Britain by Georges Tchitcherine, Russian minister of foreign affairs, in a fiery speech in the Moscow opera house this afternoon.

"Russia will not take a single backward step before the insolence of British imperialism," declared Tchitcherine amid a roar of applause.

A break in diplomatic relations may mean war, and "if it comes we are prepared to meet the enemy."

The foreign minister appeared in the uniform of an infantry officer in the Red army, and he declared the proud banner of Soviet Russia would cover the ships of the imperial British.

Student Gives His Life for Companion Declares Girl Saved

By United Press. AUSTIN, May 12.—Two days have elapsed since the drowning in Lake Austin of Charles Albert McCurdy, a student at the Austin Theological Seminary, who, with Miss Mildred Morris of Houston, University of Texas student, was canoeing in the lake when their boat upset, and the body of McCurdy has not been recovered.

Miss Morris, who succeeded in getting ashore after she and her companion were spilled into the lake, has returned to her home in Houston. She is inclined to believe that McCurdy lost his life in an effort to get her to shore, declaring his last words to her were, "Keep a level head, Mildred, and trust me to get you out."

Miss McCurdy said that when these words were uttered she and McCurdy were swimming, and shortly afterwards she lost consciousness. When she regained consciousness she was lying at the water's edge and McCurdy had disappeared.

A reward of \$250 for recovery of the body has been offered by W. E. Long, secretary of the Austin Chamber of Commerce.

RUSSIAN SOVIET CLAIMS 12-MILE TERRITORIAL ZONE

By United Press. MOSCOW, May 12.—Russia's reply to a British note protesting seizure of English fishing vessels has been handed the British charge here by Mr. Litvinoff. The soviet note defends Russia's right to a 12-mile territorial zone along the Murmansk coast, scene of the seizures, pointing out that international law does not limit such zones to three miles.

Great Britain, the Russians point out, has a nine-mile zone at Ceylon.

"BLUE SKY" LIMIT FOR LIQUOR PRESCRIPTIONS

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The treasury department will revise regulations governing prescription by liquor by physicians and will permit the unlimited use of liquor prescriptions to physicians all over the country unless a stay of execution of the injunction granted by Judge Knox in New York yesterday against enforcing present regulations is obtained by prohibition authorities, it was stated at the treasury department today.

OUTDOOR BOXING ENTERPRISES ARE FAST DEVELOPING

Walker can command two large purses without meeting any of the dangerous fighters in the welterweight class, as he can take on Wilson and then give Benny Leonard the chance that he wants at his crown.

Leonard has almost a million dollars right within his grasp. The lightweight champion has in prospect contests with Walker, Lew Tendler, Sailor Friedman, Charley White and Rock Kansas and they would all be good drawing cards.

Johnny Kilbane, the venerable featherweight champion, has already signed to meet Eugene Cricqui, the

European featherweight champion, and if he gets over the Frenchman he can, if he wants to, fight Johnny Dundee and Joe Lynch.

Lynch, the bantamweight champion, following the example of other champions, would like to avoid the dangerous men in their class, may be forced to accept the challenge of Carl Tremaine and then fight Joe Burman and Johnny Curtin.

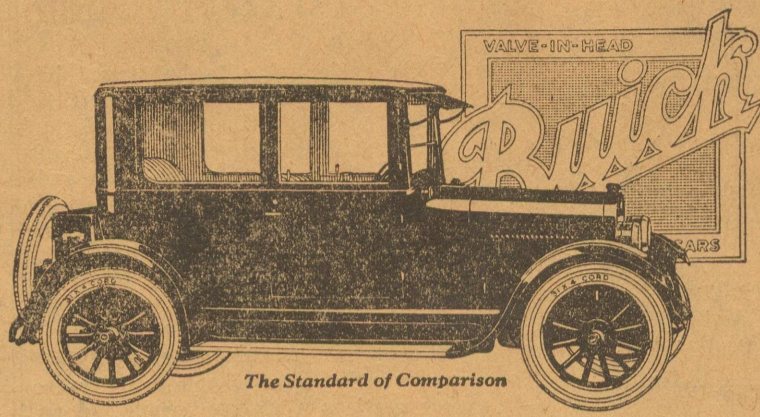
