PRESIDENT BACK IN WHITE HOUSE READY FOR WORK

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Back in the White House today after five weeks of complete rest in the South, President Harding was back at his desk to tackle the problems that have piled up during his absence from Washington.

AUSTIN, April 9.—Deputy Constable J. W. Massie faced a charge of murder here today as a result of shooting Vivian Whatley, 28, here yesterday. Whatley died early today.

Four Children Burned to Death When Hiding in Hay

DENVER, April 9.—Four children lost their lives last night when a barn in which they were playing was destroyed by fire. The children were playing hide and seek under the hay when an unidentified boy lighted a match to find the others, according to a fifth child who escaped.

PERMIT GRANTED FOR CARBON BLACK PLANT IN STEPHENS COUNTY

AUSTIN, April 9.—Permit to do business was granted today to the Parks Producing company, a West Virginia concern, to operate a plant at Parks, Stephens county, to manufacture carbon black, hydro-carbon and by-products from waste gas.

FORMER TEXAN IN COURT TO ANSWER SERIOUS CHARGE

PHILADELPHIA, April 9.—Trial of Wylie F. Morgan of Maude, Texas, confessed abductor and slayer of 8-year-old Lillian Gilmore, began today before Judge Monaghan. Guards and policemen were placed around the room to prevent any possible demonstration against the prisoner.

BABY DIES AFTER BEING THROWN OUT OF WINDOW

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 9.—Rev. William Wilkins, former Baptist minister, was in the county jail here today charged with killing his baby by throwing it out of the window.

DANCER MAKES NEW RECORD FOR TIME DANCING

Miss Alma Cummings of Texas Passes 40-Hour Mark and Going Strong.

NEW YORK, April 9.—Miss Alma Cummings of San Antonio, Texas, whose recent record of 27 hours continuous dancing was bettered by Miss Ruth Mollock, has set a new world's record of 40 hours of continuous dancing and was still going strong for a 50-hour record she started out at 10 o'clock Saturday night to make.

DEAD MAN IDENTIFIED BUT MURDERER REMAINS UNKNOWN

SULPHUR SPRINGS, April 9.—The body of a man whose head appeared to have been torn away by a charge of shot from a shotgun, found late Saturday night near the roadside in White Oak bottoms, three miles west of this place, today was identified as that of Ed Douglas, a painter of Pittsburg, Texas. He was formerly employed here several weeks.

New Aid To Science

Machine Perfected Which Will Permit Dissection of Living Human Cells and May Reveal Cure for Cancer and Similar Diseases.

CHICAGO, April 9.—A micro-vision apparatus, governed by finely adjusted screws, whose work is so delicate and minutely exact as to enable it to dissect living human cells which are actually invisible to the naked eye, has been perfected by Professor C. E. Tharaldsen, of the department of zoology of Northwest university, according to an announcement made at the university today.

'FRAUD ORDERS' LIKELY TO TIE UP MUCH MAIL

All Alleged Oil Promotion Swindlers to Come Under Federal Ban.

FORT WORTH, April 9.—Plans are being made to extend the oil fraud investigations to Dallas and Wichita Falls, United States District Attorney Zweifel said today.

In preparation to beginning the investigation of alleged oil frauds in Dallas and Wichita Falls, Zweifel has asked the postoffice department for two additional inspectors to push the mail "fraud order" work. Investigations in Dallas are expected to uncover frauds on a wholesale scale, and the attorney said he would ask for a "fraud order" in every case where disclosures indicated it would be necessary to protect the "suckers" who continue to bite at the alluring offers notwithstanding the outcry against them.

MENTAL DERANGEMENT RESULTING IN DEATH IS CAUSED BY FEAR

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., April 9.—Mental derangement caused by fear of punishment for having divulged secrets of the Ku Klux Klan may be responsible for the suicide of Kent W. Ogden, police said today.

GREEN BUGS DAMAGING WICHITA WHEAT CROP

FORT WORTH, April 9.—Green bugs are devastating the Wichita county wheat fields, according to Secretary Dorsey of the Texas Grain Dealers' association, who today appealed to federal agencies to aid in ousting the pests that have destroyed several wheat crops in recent years.

Confederate Veterans Meet In New Orleans

Only Surviving Member General Lee's Staff Among the 50,000 Soldiers and Visitors There Gathered.

NEW ORLEANS, April 9.—Fifty-eight years ago at Appamatox courthouse in Virginia, General Robert E. Lee and members of his staff signed a parole by the terms of which surrender of the Confederate army was made to the victorious forces under General Ulysses S. Grant. Today there was expected to arrive in New Orleans for the Confederate reunion that will open Wednesday the last surviving member of General Lee's staff.

Harmony Hovers Over Klan Palace Seeking to Light

ATLANTA, April 9.—After a conference today between Emperor William Simmons, Dr. W. H. Evans, imperial wizard and the marshal of the municipal court, at the headquarters of the Ku Klux Klan, announcement was made by a representative of the Evans faction that all of the officers of the Klan had returned to their desks and business would proceed as usual.

MINIMUM WAGE LAW ENACTED BY CONGRESS HELD UNCONSTITUTIONAL

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The minimum wage law, by which congress sought to establish a minimum of wages paid girls and women in the District of Columbia was held unconstitutional today by the supreme court.

NEW LAW REQUIRES NEW BONDS EXECUTED

AUSTIN, April 9.—County commissioners, county judges and sheriffs will be required to execute new bonds within 30 days after adjournment of the regular session of the legislature, according to the terms of a new law which was today held by the attorney general's department to be constitutional and not retroactive.

NEW YORK, April 9.—A prosperous restaurant owner by day, leader of a band of hold-up men by night, Edward Dougherty, 27 years old, has confessed to Brooklyn police the details of a Jekyll and Hyde existence, authorities say.

FASCISTI LEADERS IN NEW YORK SEEM DIVIDED

NEW YORK, April 9.—An alliance of the fascisti in this country is to be perfected at a meeting in this city tomorrow night, according to announcement today by officers of Italian labor organizations.

Yolanda, Eldest Daughter of King Victor, Becomes Bride of Cavalry Officer.

ROME, April 9.—Princess Yolanda of Savoy, oldest daughter of the King and Queen of Italy, was today married in the Paolina chapel of the Quirinal palace to Carlo Calvi, Count of Bergolo, captain in the Italian cavalry.

Losers Her Rank.

The bride is 22 years of age and the groom is 36. By marriage Princess Yolanda comes down in rank to Countess of Bergolo. To offset this, King Victor originally planned to confer on Count of Bergolo the title and rank of Duke of Segno.

Furlough Refused.

Captain Di Bergolo had been asking for furloughs too often, and they had been gradually granted. The real motive for his absence from the regiment was to meet Yolanda.

AUSTIN, April 9.—Before the end of the spring term there will be an intramural horseshoe pitching tournament at the University of Texas, according to an announcement by B. M. Whitaker, director of intramural athletics in the university.

Following the marriage of Princess Mary of England, Yolanda is the second of the royal princesses of Europe to follow the after-war tendency of refusing royal marriages for reasons of state and of marrying purely for love.

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CANAL IN RUHR WRECKED BY EXPLOSIONS

Dynamite Causes Big Damage and Inland Water Traffic Is Blocked.

ESSEN, April 9.—Dynamite explosions damaged the Dortmund canal locks in the Ruhr early today, blocking the canal and seriously interfering with inland water traffic in the Ruhr. This is declared the most serious and far-reaching sabotage yet attempted, the intention of the dynamiters evidently being to drain the water from the main Rhineland canal.

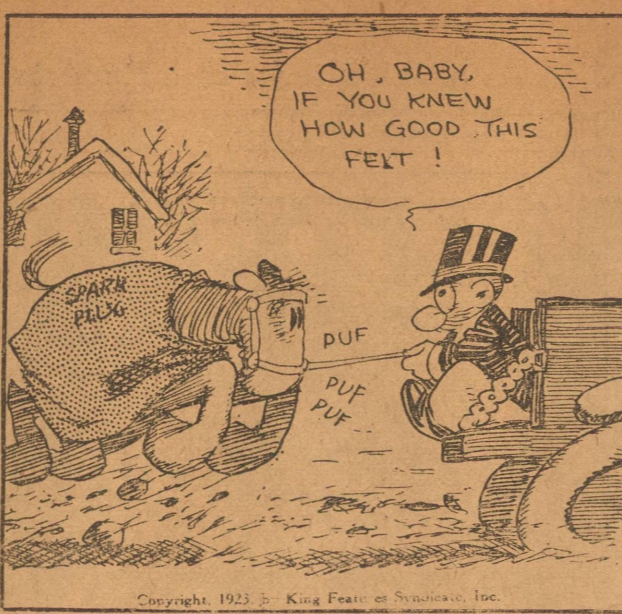
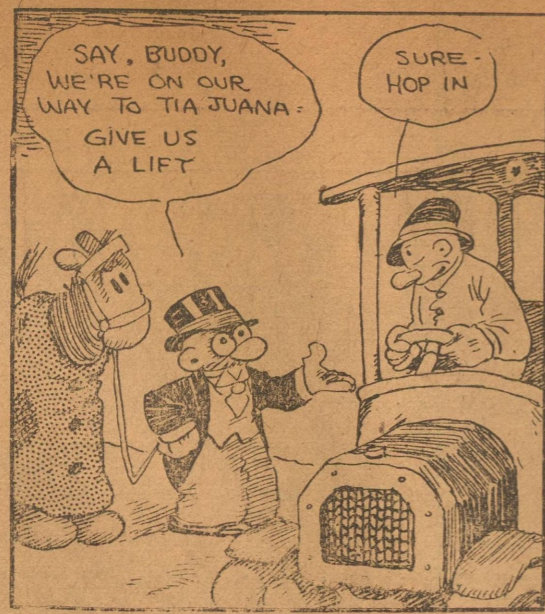
## GOVERNOR NEFF SEEKS DATA ABOUT PENITENTIARY

FARMER PAYS THE BILL.

Tax exempt bonds have increased and difficulty and cost of money for investment both in industry and in the building of homes by the average citizen. In an interesting discussion of this by James H. Collins, in a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post, Mr. Collins writes:

"The effect of tax-exempts on mortgage money has been as disastrous as the effect on utility and industrial capital, though less is heard about it. For where the public-service or manufacturing corporation devises some way to get emergency rations of capital, the individual home builder generally goes without. All over the country this retards building and keeps up rents and living costs.

"Farm mortgages in this country run to an estimated aggregate of \$8,000,000,000. Only \$500,000,000 is in tax-exempt land bank loans. Fully 85 per cent of the farm-mortgage money is in competition with tax-exempt securities, and the borrower must pay higher interest rates if he gets money at all. President Howard, of the American Farm Bureau federation, says that tax-exempt bonds soon will equal the value of all farm property in the United States. As these bonds pay no taxes, they throw additional burdens on other kinds of property.

"And yet tax-exempt bonds are being cleverly used as an argument to urge farmers to save money by spending it.

"Country folks in the Middle West are being told that if the privilege of issuing tax-exempt bonds is abolished by the proposed amendment now before congress their schools, roads, and other public improvements will cost them more, and in many cases not be built at all."

By encouraging and making possible the extravagant spending of money for local improvements tax-exempt bonds operate to increase local taxes—for it is only by the payment of local taxes that interest and principal of the local tax-exempt bond issue can be paid.

The farmers are beginning to see what industry has already been clamoring about—that it is not the borrower, who profits by tax-exempt securities, but the lender.—George McQuaid, director Texas Public Service Information Bureau.

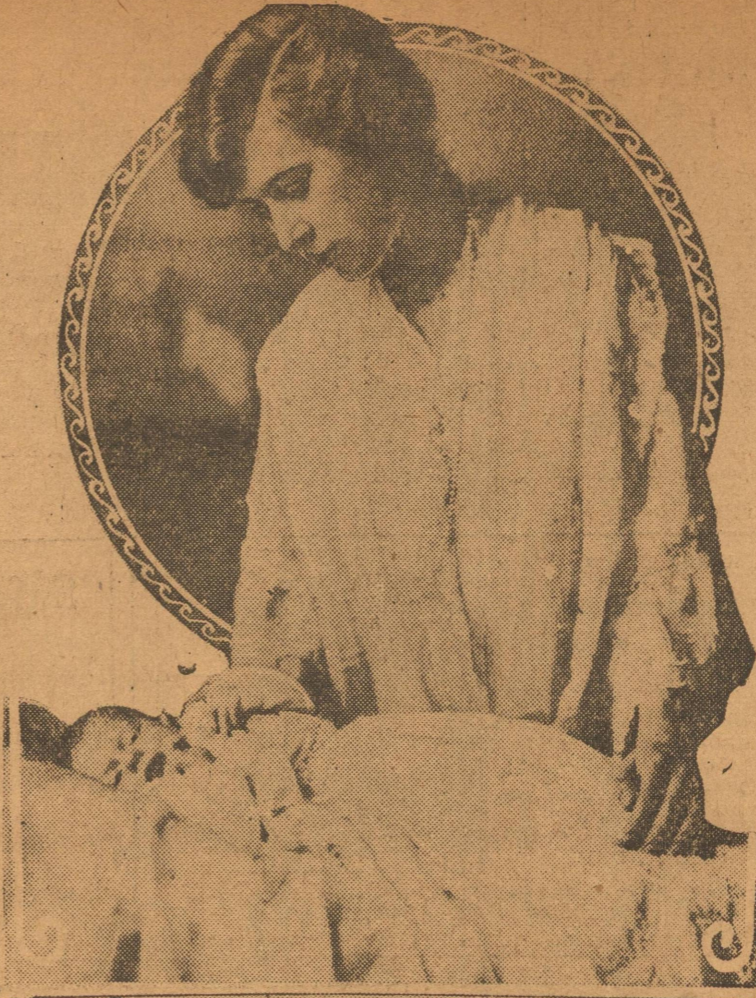

# PIRATES HAVE STRONGER BALL TEAM THIS YEAR

By HENRY L. FARFELL, United Press Sports Editor.

NEW YORK, April 9.—Due to causes which can be only partially explained, the Pittsburgh Pirates won the inconsistent championship of the National League last season. The chart of the Pirates' record for the season is almost a perfect ladder of ups and downs on which they wandered erratically from second to sixth place and finished in a tie for third.

With the possible exception of the improvement that may be expected in several young ball players, the Pirates will be no stronger when they start after the 1923 pennant than when they finished the last race. It does not follow, however, that the Pirates will do no better than they did last year. On the contrary, it is possible that they may do much better. In figuring the chances of the Pittsburgh team in the coming pennant race it is necessary to go back to last season and do all the figuring on what happened during that season.

For several years the Pirates have been strong potentially. When George Gibson, former Pirate catcher, was given the management of the club, much was expected from him and the team. After a bad early season start last year, the club fell to fifth place, then found itself and mounted up to second place, where it remained for three weeks. The team went to pieces and it was intimated that Gibson's inability to enforce the rules of training was responsible when the Pirates dropped down to sixth place in July.

At this point, Gibson resigned and Bill McKechnie was placed in command and almost immediately results began to show. The Pirates jumped into second place in two weeks. They slumped then and dropped down to fifth. McKechnie sent out a hurry call for Walter Schmidt, who joined the club, and the club played ball from then on.

Schmidt held out for an increase in salary before the season started and when it was refused he went into temporary retirement. Gibson never made serious efforts to get him back, being content, apparently, with the work of Johnny Gooch, a fine young catcher, who lacked nothing but the very essential knowledge of the batters and the stability in hold down the young pitchers.

If Bill McKechnie had been in charge of the team from the start, if Schmidt had worked in 100 games instead of only 40, and if Rebel Russell had been with the club before June, the Pirates might have won the pennant last year.

Russell, the old White Sox pitcher, who found out he could hit when he was about to pass out of the game, joined the team in June. He not only played right field acceptably, but his tremendous batting was one of the big features of the season.

Figuring now that McKechnie will be in charge when the next race starts, that the team will have the skilled head of Schmidt behind the bat and the stick of Russell at the bat all season, the chances of the Pirates are at least good.

## HAS IT COME TO THIS— THAT A PRIZE FIGHTER MUST HAVE ANCESTORS

PARIS, April 9.—Eugene Criqui European featherweight champion, who is now in the United States to attempt to wrest the world's title from Johnny Kilbane, can trace his lineage back to the tenth century, and numbers among his ancestors two marshals of France.

Fighting has been a serious business with the Criqui family for the last thousand years. The first to get his name in the records was Baudoin De Criqui (the name became Criqui later) who scored a knockout against the Belgians under the walls of Valenciennes in 1007, when he captured the city.

Henry de Criqui was among the crusaders who followed Louis IX (St. Louis) against the infidels in 1248. Jacques De Criqui commanded the troops from Guyenne province in the French army that was defeated by the British at Agincourt in 1415. He had been named a marshal of France five years previous to the battle of Agincourt.

After the advent of gunpowder, the Criquis continued with musket and cannon the fighting they had begun with lance and sabre. Francois De Criqui, another marshal of France, won the battle of Fribourg in 1675 and was at Nimeguen for Louis XIV in 1679.

Eugene Criqui, last of the family, with only a stinging left and crushing right as his weapons—having discarded firearms since he was severely wounded before Verdun—is continuing in the footsteps of his ancestors. Though the family name was changed from Criqui to Criqui during the revolution, its spirit animates its modern representative. Criqui's friends say Johnny Kilbane had better beware, for the motto of the house remains the same: "Nul Ne Saxy frotte," which may be rendered as "let nobody pick on me."

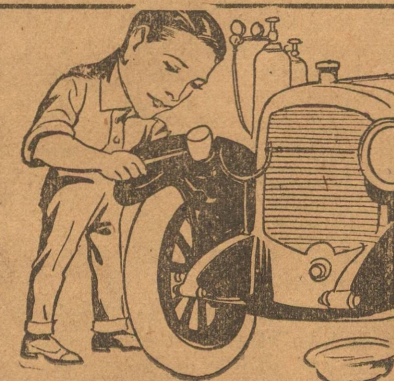

### Luck of the Greek Turns Against Him When Indian Plays

PARIS, April 9.—The talk of the clubs and casinos on the continent at present is the high play of M. Vagliano, Greek ship owner of London. Last season at Deauville and this year at Monte Carlo, Vagliano has played all comers without limit at baccarat. He is somewhat beyond middle age, tall, smooth-shaven and soberly but correctly dressed in the London fashion. He confines himself to baccarat and always takes the bank for the reason that he is willing to risk more than any other player.

The principal baccarat table is reserved for him at Monte Carlo. He takes the bank at midnight, having several francs on deposit with the sporting club, and announces that the game is without limit. He plays about every second or third night, and for one hour only. His bearing at the table is modest and calm, with a certain air of remoteness, but he is nevertheless alertly conscious of every move in the play.

The most experienced observers consider that, though M. Vagliano's judgment and instinct are good, the prevailing quality in his success is his luck. He wins enormously, but not always.

One of his recent defeats was at the hands of an Indian Maharaja who was being shown about the great institution at Monte Carlo. The Greek was pointed out to the visitors as the most famous player in the casino and he asked to be presented to him.

The formalities over, the Maharaja said graciously: "I will make one bet." Then, turning to his principal adjutant, he told him to place on the table a couple of lakhs, which would be equivalent to 20,000 pounds sterling.

"I regret, your highness, that I have only one lakh with me," said the adjutant, who producing notes from various pockets, got together the sum of 750,000 francs.

M. Vagliano dealt the cards and the Maharaja, who seemed familiar with the game, turned up a king and nine spot. Vagliano drew a ten and seven. The Indian potentate bowed, resumed his inspection of the rooms, and his adjutant took possession of the 1,500,000 francs.
