"by people whose interests appear in need of inquiry." There "high-priced executives of Big Steel are, and are entrenched in every position of importance—not at the modest salaries paid government employees. While they are listed on the WPB payroll at \$1 a year, they still continue to receive the same big salaries directly from their regular peacetime employers. Inquiry, no doubt, would reveal that they are large holders of stock. Many are officers of the large steel corporations. As soon as the war is over, they will, of course, return to their former companies whose interests they have been ever mindful of. Regularly they are so reminded by the big salary check they periodically receive from their employer during their comfortable stay at Washington."

It is upon such men that Donald Nelson must rely for advice in making his decisions, says Patton. "It is my firm conviction that to entrust such individuals for counsel is to assure the steel trust that when there is a difference of viewpoint, big steel is there in the saddle. When a new firm is to erect a new plant in this industry, the interest taken by these executives is not unbiased. The fact is, though they are under oath of office, they get offensive and angry and connive to discredit and to otherwise undermine the faithful efforts of those who would increase the nation's steel output. What dominates their mind appears to be the ear of another competitor whose independence may use the comfortable lucrative base point price system and the monopoly control of market conditions which the steel trust has been permitted to build up over the industries of this nation in the past 40 years."

Despite almost insuperable obstacles, Patton promises to persist in his unequal battle to establish a steel industry in East Texas.

Allied Victories Affect Market

LONDON, July 20 (AP)—Allied victories are bringing a curious twist to the London stock exchange with a marked rise in prices of securities of enemy and occupied countries which could not be sold at any price a few years ago.

Financial circles said today buyers apparently were banking on quick defeat of the axis—hoping European countries still would have enough money in the "kitty" to meet obligations of their bondholders.

Actual transactions in the market, however, have not been very large, probably because of the wartime limitation that dealings be on a strictly cash basis.
