The house had followed out its original ultimatum that bills must be strictly under the governor's call before they will be considered.

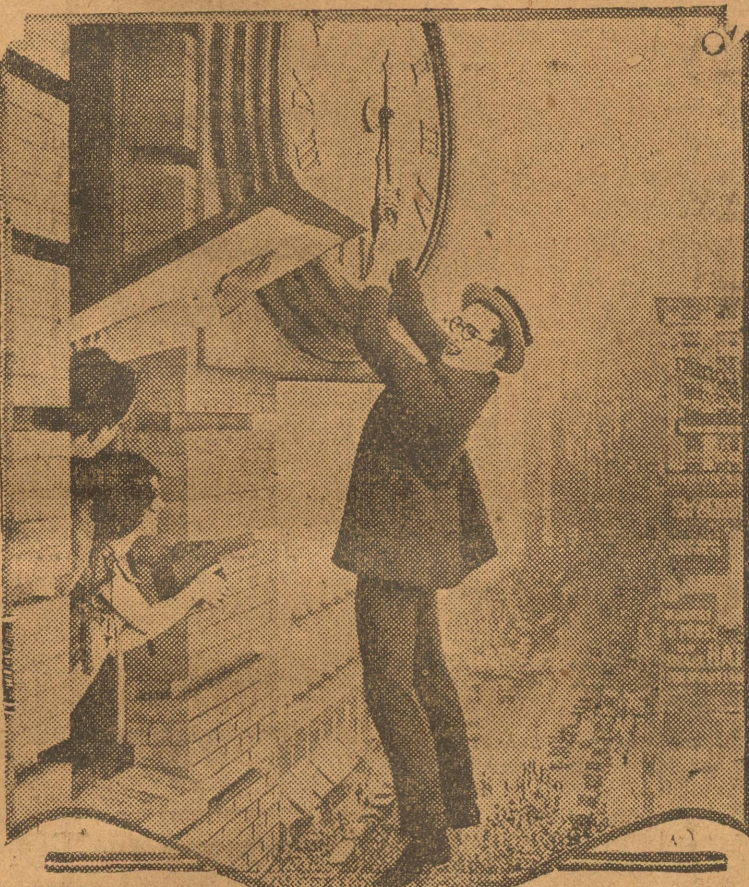

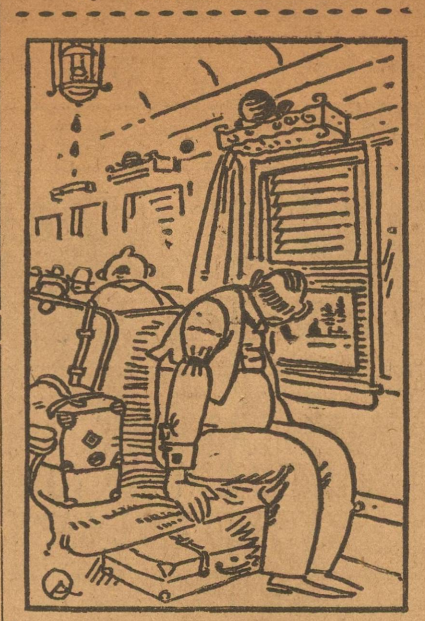
COTTON AGREEMENT IS REACHED BY EXPORTERS

Communists Making Life Uncertain and Alarming Germany

BERLIN, May 27.—Communist activities are expected in many Ruhr cities and in Berlin tomorrow, according to rumor. Clashes between the reds and police at Dresden at midnight last night resulted in 11 deaths, it was stated here today.

Authorities in Berlin are becoming alarmed. At Dresden during the night communists plundered shops and then assailed small groups of police. Volleys were exchanged and 60 persons were reported wounded in addition to the 11 dead.

CLARA PHILLIPS IS BROUGHT TO NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, May 29.—Clara Phillips, famous hammer murderess, arrived here today at 1:15 p. m., completing the first lap of her journey from Honduras to Los Angeles. She was standing on the deck in company with a deputy sheriff and her sister as the steamship "Copan" docked here.

A large crowd collected at the dock to get a glimpse of the woman who was convicted of beating Alberta Meadows to death with a hammer and later made a sensational escape from jail.

BLUE SKY LAW MAY PROVIDE SOME REVENUE

AUSTIN, May 29.—A new revenue measure which was enacted by the last session of the legislature without intention of being a revenue raising act, has been discovered by Secretary of State Staples.

The revenue from the act comes in under the provision which prohibits operation of declarations of trust. This will require organizations and companies to obtain charters which requires a fee depending on the amount of capital stock (Staples said).

Operations of the blue sky law is placed under the secretary of state's office. Staples declares the act to be one of the most important recently enacted.

HOUSE OPPOSED TO CUTTING APPROPRIATIONS

AUSTIN, May 29.—Opposition to the reduction of \$3,000,000 in the rural school aid bill was voiced in the house today in a resolution which was adopted without a record vote.

The house also opposed the complete repeal of the \$600,000 reclamation bill when it voted down an amendment to the Bonham bill which proposed its reduction to \$300,000.

FOREIGN BOXERS DO NOT LIKE TO "TAKE IT"

By HENRY L. FARRELL (United Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, May 29.—Paul Sampson, like McTigue, who left the United States with little rep and some ambition, is back in this country with a title, quite a little money and a lot of opinions.

Sampson is the heavyweight champion of Germany. In the words of Sam Langford, who said after he won the heavyweight championship of Mexico: "It ain't so much, but it's sampin'." Paul is admitting that his laurels won't get him much around American rings, but he's going back soon where they do.

"The fight game is booming in Germany and I'm in on the ground floor. If I can't get a few matches around here I'm going right back," Sampson said.

He would like to get a match with Mike McTigue or Gene Tunney.

"McTigue may be the recognized light heavyweight champion on this side, but everyone in Europe still regards Siki as the champion. He won seventeen rounds in the fight with McTigue, and no fighter ever earned a decision on three good rounds," he says.

While he was in Germany and Austria, Sampson won ten fights with knockouts and he piled up an accumulation of marks that will go a long way where he could buy hand-made shoes for the equivalent of two dollars and a banquet for twenty-five cents.

Sampson shipped over on the Reliance, and he got a discharge in Hamburg with a month's pay and twenty dollars. That was enough to keep him for two months in Germany, and he hit for Berlin, where he stumbled into a fight with Hans Breitsonstrater, the German champion, and knocked him out.

After he had cleaned up all the German and Austrian heavies he had a fight arranged with Siki, and was negotiating with Paris promoters for a fight with Carpenter, but he lost both matches when the French went in the Ruhr section.

"The boxing commission then put a ban on all bouts against French and Belgian boxers and, being as I am a German, I lost the chances for some good money," he said.

"This fellow Siki isn't as bad as you think on this side. He's just like a monkey. He drinks like a fish and does all kinds of dissipating, but he's hard to figure," Sampson said to the United Press.

Carpenter is all through. I doubt if he ever comes over here. I saw him one night in a cafe in Berlin, and I didn't know him, he was so thin and white. He's been hitting the pace, too. Smoking and drinking all the time. Dempsey took the little out of him that he had.

"Criqui is the best fighter over there, but I don't believe he can beat Kilbane. Those fellows over there don't like to take it the way they will have to when they box with Americans.
