H. A. Coomer, traffic manager of the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad, says the increased activity in the shallow oil pool south of Ranger will have a beneficial business effect on Rangers

### "Little Mothers" Trained to Help Care for Baby

EL PASO, May 17.-When baby brothers get the pepper shakers or go into convulsions for some other reason, 33 "little mothers" will know what to do. A class of 33 girls known as "the little mothers" has been graduated at one of the grade schools and given certificates showing they have finished courses in the care and feeding of infants.

The course was given especially for the girls, who have baby brothers and sisters at home, or who will work as nurse and servant girls. All the "little mothers" in the class are Mexican children.

Signs of illness were taught, and methods on how to make a baby's bed and other things. The girls to get the certificates are 12 and 13 years old. City nurses helped teach the course, which extended over four months.

LAUSANNE, May 17.—Renewal of the Turko-Greco war involving Serbia as an ally of Greece and Bulgaria as an ally of Turkey is threatened. Such Balkan conflagration would, it is eared, precipitate another general European conflict.

## ENGINEER DIES AT POST; HEADON CRASH FOLLOWS

Fireman Cries Warning Which Goes Unheeded and Then Leaps to Save Life.

LIMA, Ohio, May 17 .- A dead man had his hand on the throttle of the locomotive that was drawing a Lake Erie passenger train when it crashed dead-on into a freight near here, injuring a number of persons, authori-

ties believed today. The report followed a statement by the fireman on the locomotive that Engineer Assler, 61, had died of heart trouble a few moments before the crash. The fireman leaped to safety before the trains came together. He said that his shouts of warning to the engineer had gone unheeded.

The engineer had disregarded an order, according to the fireman, to stop at the Oakland switch and wait for the freight. The order was clutched in his right hand, but the train went by the switch without halting, the engineer with his hand on the 60 miles an hour.







## STATE INCOME TAX BILL WILL ADD TO REVENUE

General Fund to Be Enriched Several Million Dollars Annually.

By Associated Press

AUSTIN, May 16 .- The state general revenue fund will be enlarged by between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 annually under terms of the Dinkle income tax bill as passed by the senate, according to Representative C. E. Dinkle of Greenville, author of the first income tax measure to be placed upon the Texas statutes. Representative Dinkle estimates that if the county al valorem tax exemption clause had been removed the act would net between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 an-

The income tax bill as passed is not perfect, sponsors of the measure declare, but it is the basis for a source of income which it is said will be one of the largest the state has at its command. Proponents declare that no doubt amendments will be necessary to the act it has been tried and

It is generally conceded by members that the Dinkle bill is the most important one passed by the present session of the legislature. It is one of the sources of revenue which Governor Neff noted in his pre-legislative address last fall.

The tax under the bill ranges from 2 to 10 per cent. Incomes up to \$5,-000 are taxed 2 per cent; up to \$25, 000 for 3 per cent; 4 per cent up to \$50,000; 6 per cent up to \$100,000, and 10 per cent for all the incomes over \$200,000. A single man is exempt from the tax on an income below \$1, 000, and married men below \$2,500. A further exemption of \$400 for each child is allowed.

County and state ad valorem taxes are deducted from the income tax due, under the senate bill. An effort to eliminate the county taxes from this provision failed.




