Thomas H. McDonald, chief-of the United States bureau of public roads, to Fort Worth. Texas, in connection with Texas highway matters as relating to federal aid.

The officers are being sent, McDonald told the United Press, because the resignation of two Texas highway commissioners has left the commaission without any administrative head, and to determine whether the state has diverted federal aid funds to other obligations.



Famous Norwegian Arctic Explorer Sponsors New Armenian Republic

By HENRY WOOD

(United Press Staff Correspondent) GENEVA, Nov. 28.—Doctor Fridtjof Nansen, famous Norwegian explorer, and High Humanitarian Commissioner for the League of Nations, has just assumed the sponsorship for

the Bolshevik Republic of Armenia.

As the result of efforts undertaken Doctor Nansen before the League Nations as well as with various European governments it is probable that a large international loan will be floated for the purpose of perman-ently settling additional Armenian refugees within the borders of their

new national home.

Since the failure of the Allies at the Lausanne conferences to wrest from the Turks the creation within Turkish territory of a national Armenian home, the little Armenian Republic that has been fostered within the confines of Russia by the Soviets

the confines of Russia by the Soviets seems to constitute the one, last chance of the Armenians having at least a national home of their own, somewhat similar to the national home that is now being created for the Jews in Palestine.

The little state which goes by the name of the Armenian Republic of Erivan has a territory of 27,000 square kilometers or about the same as that of Belgium, and a population of 1,200,000 of whom 95 per cent are Armenians.

While the republic forms part of the Union of Soviet Republics it is nevertheless entirely self-governing with its own administration, law courts, university and schools. The official language is Armenian and the government is entirely free to grant concessions and carry on finanial loans and operations on its own

The present government has been in office for four years, the Soviets having organized the little republic and sarcastically notified the League of Nations of the fact at at the precise moment when the League, in spite of previous pledges to the Armenian people, was forced to limit that it was powerless to do anything. According to Dr. Nansen the government has been able to reconstruct the whole social and economic system.

With several hundred thousand Armenian refugees still scattered in Syria, Greece and the Balkans generally, Doctor Nansen is convinced that the new Armenian Republic of-fers the best opportunity of perman-ently settling at least as many of these as the country can be made to

The plan which Doctor Nansen now proposes is an international loan of about one million pounds for the realization of an irrigation scheme that will render enough more land fertile in Armenia to support between thirty and fifty thousand more Ar-

These would be selected, especially the first contingent of fifteen thou-sand, from the congested centers of Greece and the Balkans. Dr. Nansen is convinced that provisions for fifteen thousand alone would permit placing all of the most urgent cases



LONDON, Nov. 28.—Echoes of the theological bombshell exploded by Dean Inge of St. Paul's Cathedral with his assertion that there is no place in the astronomical universe for a physical leaven or hell, and that Christ in consequence could not have physically ascended into heaven, are still reverberating through-fout England.

Criticism ranges from frank approval to bitter condemnation.

"If Dean Inge had promulgated some of these doctrines five hundred years ago, declared one London clergyman he would have been burned at the stake for heresy. I don't set myself up to be of the intellectual caliber of the Dean, but if I believed what he believes I would take myself out of the church of England."

Rev. Basil W. B. Matthews, of Moly Trinity Church: "The average Church of England priest does not look to Dean Inge for guidance."

"If the Dean believes these things" said Rev. T. P. Stevens of St. Matthews, "he may be a Christian in mind, but he can not call himself a Christian in fact."


