# DANCERS ARE ABLE TO SIT

Three Chief Contestants in Endurance Exhibit on Way to Recovery.

William E. McMillin of Los Angeles, acclaimed the world's champion marathon dancer, yesterday afternoon, for his feat in staying on the floor of the Summer Garden 195 hours and five minutes, sat up on his bed in a private room in the Clinical hospital this morning, smiling and cheerful. After passing through a delirium yesterday afternoon, due to his long period on the floor without any sleep, except what he may have snatched during his 15-minute rest periods every four hours, he seemed fresh and bright this morning. He said he expected to be able to leave his room this afternoon.

In room No. 232 of the Gholson hotel, his closest competitor, Miss Margaret Collier, 24, who left the floor at 10:30 a. m. yesterday with a record of 191 hours and 30 minutes, sat on a bed receiving visitors who were calling to congratulate her for her performance. Reading newspaper accounts of the marathon occupied some of her attention. She said she was sorry she didn't go 200

Among her admirers were two Ranger school girls. They wanted her Dallas address.

"Slim," as Mr. McMillin became known during the progress of the marathon, recalled this morning that he lived in Ranger for almost one year. He came to the city in December, 1918, and lived here for almost one year. He was with the Prairie Oil and Gas company and also the Reavis Clothing store.

If any one be willing to take a chance and make a loan to pay off the teachers, the trustees are taking no chances in authorizing the president and secretary to negotiate the loan. That is the thing for which The Times is

suggesting that the trustees transact any other business. But Mr. Cooper takes the attitude that he is judge and jury

as well as a school trustee and he argues for the money lender who is reluctant to make the loan. He might leave the safety of the loan to the lender to determine. One of the Ranger banks has signified a willingness to do so. The bank has a loan board and an attorney to pass on the legality of the transaction, and the school board does not take a chance of losing by taking whatever action may be necessary to get the money with which to pay the teachers.

Mr. Cooper says it would not he wise to take any action now, especially in view of the fact that the matter could be determined within a few days. If it was at all certain that the matter would be determined within a few days The Times would be less insistent for immediate action. But while the next term of court in which the contest suit is pending begins June 4, there is no assurance that the case will be set down for trial until some time later. If a new election should

be ordered, at least 30 days notice would be required before the election and it looks as though the teachers might have to wait all summer for their money. That is working a hardship on them.

If the board has only three members, these three might consider themselves as constituting a quorum and authorize the president and secretary to negotiate a loan. Then it would be up to the bank to say whether it considered the authorization sufficient to safeguard its interests in making the loan. . At least the three members would have shown they did all they could to get the money for the teachers so they would not have to wait longer for it.

Unquestionably Mr. Cooper is acting according to his best light but if he would try to look at the question from the standpoint of the teachers who need the money that is due them, he might revise his viewpoint and make an effort, at least, to get the money for them. Should the bank then refuse to make the loan, he could at least say that he had done all he could.
