### DEFENSE OF THE SUPREME COURT.

Chief Justice Taft has given an ef- Taylor, Bertram. fective answer to the critics of the supreme court who are demanding a change that would require at least seven of the nine justices to concur in any decision that annuls an act of congress. In his eulogy of Salmon P. Chase he tells that almost a century ago there were similar criticisms of the court and like demands for a limitation of its constitutional powers. He also shows that the court has been right in its views of the constitution and that the criticisms of its decisions were emanations of popular clamor not representative in real majority sentiment or of partisan political rancor not justified by the constitution ,the laws or the public wel-

Unquestionably there was no greater foresight, no clearer vision of the future, displayed by the founders of the republic than their provision for securing majority rule. It must not be forgotten, although a decision may seem to depend on one pivotal vote of the court, that there are four other learned jurists agreeing with that one. Those five quite as fully represent a majority view of the constitutionality of an act of congress as an act of congress passed by a small majority represents a desire of the people of the United States. Prejudiced representatives in congress, depending on popular clamor for their seats. are more likely to be wrong in their judgments of real popular sentiment for a modification of the laws than are justices of the supreme court, who are relieved of all fear of the public by their tenure of office and bound by their oaths to administer the law according to their best understanding of the constitution of the United States.

There is no reason why the court should be unanimous. The justices are human; they may err in judicial determination, it is true. In a decision five to four it is as likely that the five are right as it would be that the seven of the nine were right. Their decisions are more likely to be in consonance with the constitution and more protective of the general welfare than would be an enactment by such a congress as was last in session, though it may have been passed by an almost unanimous vote.-Cincinnati Enquirer.
