MOUNT ETNA BELCHING OUT DESTRUCTION

WOMEN NEEDED IN LEGISLATURE SHE DECLARES

Mrs. Edith Wilman Says She Will Return and Press Her Measures.

AUSTIN, June 18.—Texas Women should seek seats in the state legislature as much as men, Mrs. Edith Wilman, of Dallas, first woman member of the Texas legislature, declared after completing four strenuous months of work in her legislative seat. Like other members, Mrs. Wilman admitted she is ready for a rest from her lawmaking duties.

"My experience in the legislature has been the most valuable of my life," Mrs. Wilman said. "These four months have been as profitable to me as my 30 years of club and political work. Texas women should seek seats in the legislature. I hope that two years from now there will be several candidates for places in the law-making body.

"Woman's first place is in her home," Mrs. Wilman added, "and I would not advise any woman who is making a home to engage in political life. But those who are already in public work can as well run for the legislature and be elected as men."

The Dallas legislator declares that she intends to come back to the thirty-ninth legislature. "When I first entered the legislature, I felt an evident barrier of prejudice and custom," Texas' initial woman legislator said, discussing her legislative experience. "There seemed to be a feeling that I was in the legislature more because women are always trying to do something different than because I had a purpose in my work. But this attitude soon changed and I have met with co-operation from all members."

Legislators experienced somewhat of a thrill early in the regular session last January when Mrs. Wilman made her first debate on the floor. She was greeted with much applause. As the sessions have gone on, however, she has entered into debate often and taken an active part in deliberations. Night sessions did not prevent the woman lawmaker from being in her seat.

Mrs. Wilman sponsored several bills during the past sessions of the legislature. Chief among these was the bill proposing to create a court of domestic relations for Dallas county. This measure passed the house by a large majority but was killed in the senate.

Another measure submitted by Mrs. Wilman proposed requiring health certificates for both persons obtaining a marriage license. This bill was defeated in the house by a small vote. Mrs. Wilman firmly believes, she said, that such acts will become laws at some future legislature.

BRECKENRIDGE MAN DROWNED IN BRAZOS NEAR CRYSTAL FALLS

BRECKENRIDGE, June 18.—Carl Stoker, 35 years old, was drowned in the clear fork of the Brazos river, near Crystal Falls, ten miles north of Breckenridge, Sunday morning about 9 o'clock.

Mr. Stoker was a prominent business man of Breckenridge and well known throughout this section of the country.

A party of Breckenridge men and women, including Mr. Stoker and his wife, left the city Saturday night about 9 o'clock and went to the river and spent the night fishing. Mr. Stoker is survived by his wife.

EITHER THE SCHOOLS OR PUBLISHERS OF TEXT-BOOKS GET THE MONEY

AUSTIN, June 18.—The public schools will receive \$13 per capita apportionment for the next two years under an act of the recent legislature, State Superintendent S. M. N. Marrs said today. But the \$13 allotment is contingent on holding the alleged text-book contract illegal, he also said.

If held legal, the apportionment will be reduced to \$12 per capita. It is estimated by Marrs that the available school funds will total \$17,635,000 during the year.

Is Stamboulsky Dead? French Have Word He Is Alive and Fighting

TWO SHOTS ARE FIRED; ONE DEAD ANOTHER DYING

Misunderstanding Causes Tragedy In Lubbock During Early Hours of Sunday

LUBBOCK, Texas, June 18.—Alvin Hooper, an automobile salesman, 30 years old, is dead and John T. Halbert, 45 years old, deputy constable, is said by attending physicians to be mortally wounded, as the result of a shooting affray near midnight in the residence district early Sunday morning.

The shooting occurred across the street from the First Methodist church on Broadway and was witnessed by several men from across the street. This part of Broadway is dimly lighted.

Following the shooting, Halbert ran toward the Lubbock sanitarium, falling on the lawn as he turned up the walk toward the main entrance. Halbert made a statement to the attending physicians and officers while on the operating table.

Halbert told the physicians that in his round he had followed a man and a woman for some distance to determine why they were on the streets at night and when they went into a house he started back to town. Later a man accosted him, Halbert said, and accused him of following him and his wife. The shooting followed.

Hooper was instantly killed. Halbert received a bullet wound in the abdomen. Halbert is well known in the city and has a family. Hooper is survived by his wife, who is prostrated by his death.

Hooper was a member of one of the best known families in Plainview. His father served eight years as sheriff of Hale county and was a pioneer cattleman of that section. Young Hooper was a native of Plainview, a World War veteran, a well-known automobile race driver and automobile dealer.

GLADDEN GIVEN SUSPENDED SENTENCE OF THREE YEARS

EASTLAND, June 18.—Jack Gladden, found guilty Saturday night by a jury in connection with the murder of A. B. Ashburn of Pioneer, was given a suspended sentence of three years in court today.

Ashburn and Gladden engaged in a quarrel in which both used instruments, outlawed by rules of sport, and the latter beat Ashburn with a hammer. Ashburn died in an Eastland hospital following an operation. The blow caused concussion of the brain.

ROTARIANS GATHER IN ST. LOUIS

Fourteenth Annual Convention International Rotary Brings Delegates From 26 Countries Together.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—Delegates and visitors from all directions were pouring into the city today for the 14th annual convention of the International Rotarians, which opens tonight. At least 10,000 Rotarians are expected.

President Obregon of Mexico has issued an invitation by letter to the convention to meet in Mexico City in 1924. Texas Rotarians are said to be supporting the Southern Republic for the next convention. Welfare work for crippled children was discussed at a meeting of the committee on proposed legislation today.

Rotary Grows Rapidly. Since 1912 the organization has grown even more rapidly than during the first seven years. Although the greater number of clubs are in the United States, and the British Isles and Canada—there are now Rotary clubs in Newfoundland, Porto Rico, Mexico, Cuba, Republic of Panama, Uruguay, Argentine Republic, China, Norway, British India, Spain, France, Denmark, Australia, New Zealand, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Peru, South Africa, Japan, Holland, and Brazil.

Each Rotary club is a complete working unit in itself, entirely independent of every other club, and is supposed to make itself a part of the community in which it is established and to adapt itself to the peculiar problems of that community. During the last few years a model constitution has been provided that all new clubs are required to adopt.

Zankof Government Resorting to Extreme Measures, Even Burning Whole Villages to Suppress Flame of Revolt.

LONDON, June 18.—Troops of the Zankof government in Bulgaria are resorting to severe measures to put down the peasant revolt, even burning whole villages, according to press dispatches received here. Adjacent countries are calling the troops to the colors and sending detachments to guard the border.

The death of former Premier Stamboulsky has not ended the revolutionary movement. Indeed the French have received a report that Stamboulsky is not dead at all, as announced by his enemies, but is heading a strong peasant force.

GERMAN MARKS GO TO NEW LOW LEVEL

NEW YORK, June 18.—German marks made another sharp drop today to .0006718 cents or 145,450 marks to \$1.

BERLIN, June 18.—The decline of the German mark to 143,000 to the American dollar at noon today is causing serious concern in financial and business quarters.

RACIAL OUTBREAKS IN CHICAGO'S BLACK BELT

CHICAGO, June 18.—Sporadic racial outbreaks occurred today as a result of a week-end shooting in the "black belt" of the city when two negroes were killed by police in the course of a vice crusade.

Vice is said to have been rampant in the "black belt" and the police have undertaken to correct it. Nearly 100 extra police were sent into the district today.

COURT THINKS IT TOO SEVERE TO BE SENT TO HELL WITHOUT A FAN

DENVER, June 18.—"I hope you die and go to hell without a fan!" This questionable consolation, alleged to have been administered by Mrs. Amelia White to her husband as he lay near death in a hospital, won Joseph White a preliminary decree of divorce in the county court Thursday.

FARMER-LABOR ORGANIZATION IS COMMENDED

Governor of Oklahoma Suggests Might Become Most Powerful Body in State.

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 18.—Farmers and laborers of Oklahoma were invited by Gov. J. B. Walton today to take into their own hands the formation of a definite constituent council to direct a program to relieve them of economic burdens, which he said besets them.

Speaking of a Farmer-Labor conference, the governor told representatives of 10 organizations that if partisan politics were eliminated and a definite program effected they would be the most powerful body in the state.

Referring to the so-called lumber trust in the state, he called attention to his plan for the erection of a state owned cement plant to reduce the cost of building materials, and said if the farmers and laborers would petition for such a plant, he would call a special session of the legislature at which this and other matters would be called up.

REUNION OF WORLD WAR VETERANS TO BE HELD IN MARBLE FALLS

MARBLE FALLS, Texas, June 18 Plans are being made for one of the largest reunions of world war veterans in Texas here on July 2, 3 and 4. The affair will be statewide and is under direction of the American Legion.

State and national Legion officials are expected to be present for the occasion. National Commander Alvin M. Owsley, of the American Legion, who is a Texan, has been invited. Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton, world war veteran, will be one of the principal speakers on July 4, the climax of the three-day celebration.

Lieutenant Governor T. W. Davidson, of Marshall, is scheduled to address the gathering on July 2. Arrangements are being made with other prominent speakers to be present. Goat-roping, athletic tournaments, baseball and music are some of the features scheduled on the tentative program. A free barbecue will be staged on the final day, July 4. It is planned to make the reunion an annual affair.

SHORTAGE OF DRESSMAKERS IN SECTIONS REPORTED

SCRANTON, Pa., June 18.—In the opinion of the country's chief department store executives, American women are suffering from a shortage of dressmakers. This fact was revealed a few days ago by a questionnaire sent out by the Women's Institute of Domestic Arts and Sciences, of Scranton.

BILLION DOLLAR SAVING IN YEAR IS ANNOUNCED

President Harding and Director Lord of Budget Bureau Report on Gov. Expenses.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Heads of departmental bureaus were called together today to hear formal announcement by President Harding and Director Lord of the budget bureau that the government had lived within its income the past 12 months. The meeting was also expected to proceed to a discussion of plans for the forthcoming year and to hear an outline of what the President expects the government to accomplish since overcoming a prospective deficit.

Treasury officials have figured a surplus of \$175,000,000 will be on hand at the close of business on June 30. At the beginning of the fiscal year last July an apparent deficit of \$825,000,000 confronted the treasury.

'PAY TAXES FIRST' SAYS CITY SECRETARY TO BUILDING WRECKERS

Word that men were going to tear down the old Lee or Legion hotel on South Austin street reached the office of the city secretary Saturday, and Secretary Ringold immediately gave the police department orders to stop the workmen who attempted to proceed in wrecking the building, a relic of the boom days.

The secretary said three or four persons are claiming to be owners of the property, and that he would not permit it to be torn down until delinquent taxes on the property had been paid. He said furthermore that no permit to wreck the dangerous structure has been taken out.

MOTHER OF THREE YOUNG CHILDREN DIES

Mrs. J. D. Preston, 27, mother of three young children all under 8 years of age, died at a sanitarium in San Angelo yesterday after a year's illness. She had made her home here with her family for about four years. The children are, Buster 7, Bobby 4, and Billy 2.

The body will be brought to Ranger for burial tomorrow afternoon, arriving here on Texas & Pacific passenger train No. 4. Funeral services will be conducted at the Milford funeral chapel at 3 p. m., Tuesday. Rev. W. H. Johnson will officiate. Interment in Evergreen cemetery.

ERWIN R. BERGDOLL TO BE RELEASED FROM JAIL

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 18.—Erwin R. Bergdoll, son of a wealthy Philadelphia woman, will leave Leavenworth Wednesday after serving two years for evading military service during the war. Bergdoll's sentence was cut 14 months for good behavior. He is a brother of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, who escaped to Germany after evading the draft.

Bergdoll will go to his home in Philadelphia immediately after his release.

EVER HEAR OF BLUE QUAIL?

They May Be Domesticated and Raised in the Poultry Yard, According to the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, Which Wants Them Preserved

LAMESA, Texas, June 18.—A campaign for the preservation of the blue quail and its domestication has been undertaken by the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce. In announcing its campaign the chamber said:

"The blue quail is the oldest bird whose flesh has during all periods of history been a sustaining and delicious food for mankind. It is a bird that can be domesticated and if not shot at or otherwise mistreated can be more easily raised than any other domestic fowl. Many farmers in our county are now raising them around their homes and in some instances they roost with chickens.

British Warship Seizes Cargo of Arms from Turks

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 18.—A British destroyer in the Sea of Marmora has seized a Turkish transport loaded with arms, according to advices received here today. The munitions were being shipped from Thrace in Europe, which was disputed ground between the Greeks and Turks following the war.

FRENCH COMPLETE THEIR CONTROL OF RUHR TRANSPORTATION LINES

ESSEN, June 18.—The French today seized 170 locomotives and 2,000 freight cars on branch lines between Dortmund and Essen, thus virtually completing French control of Ruhr transportation lines. Industrial conditions at Dortmund, Bochum and other points are reported growing worse daily.

TRIAL OF TWO RANCHMEN SLATED TO BEGIN TODAY

LUBBOCK, June 18.—Milt Good and Tom Ross were scheduled to go on trial on indictments charging murder in connection with the shooting at Seminole on April 3 of H. L. Robertson and W. D. Allison.

One of the expected first moves of the defense will be a motion for continuance of the trial on the grounds that important witnesses are missing.

REPORT OF POISONED CABBAGE LEAVES DENIED

BRADY, June 18.—Reports Saturday that 22 fishermen were ill from eating fish, who had eaten poisoned cabbage intended for grasshoppers, were without foundation, according to physicians and officials of the Brady sanitarium. The doctors pointed out that no poison was in the cabbage and declared that there had been no freshet sufficient to carry the poisoned bait to the river.

COTTON BREAKS UNDER STRESS OF LIQUIDATION

NEW YORK, June 18.—Renewal of liquidation in the cotton market today caused a break of 85 points in July cotton, or slightly more than \$4 a bale. The price of July middling went to 27. Futures also were affected and October broke to 24.34.

TWO VILLAGES BURIED BENEATH MOLTEN LAVA

Volcano In Active Eruption, Growling and Throwing Flames Into Air.

CATANIA, Sicily, June 18.—Hurling thousands of tons of burning lava high into the sky from a flaming crater which is belching the molten destruction in apparently inexhaustible quantity and with increasing force, Mount Etna is in eruption and already has destroyed five villages and threatens a score of others.

A great wall of lava, 30 feet high, flowed over the village of Lingua Glosa and advanced more than 300 yards. Coscordate also has disappeared. The inhabitants of the towns had been warned for days by the rattlings and mutterings of the great volcano and virtually all had fled from their homes taking with them all the possessions they could carry. No casualties have been reported.

The roads leading from the territory about Mount Etna is lined with the carts of refugees and their families. They are traveling as rapidly as possible, for each moment the thunderous reports from the volcano added new terrors to their hearts.

The eruption began at an early hour Sunday morning with a terrific explosion as though the end of the world had come. The whole end of the volcano appeared to have broken out. The population of the villages at the foot of Mount Etna rushed from their homes and scattered in the streets and immediately thereafter the stream of refugees began to move from the villages to more distant and safer fields.

LAVA FROM MT. ETNA DESTROYS VILLAGE NEAR THE VOLCANO

London, June 18.—An Exchange dispatch from Rome quotes an unconfirmed dispatch to a Naples newspaper to the effect that the town of Linguaglosa has been destroyed by lava from Mt. Etna.

MOUNT ETNA GROWLING WHILE EARTH TREMORS TERRIFY VILLAGERS

ROME, June 18.—The eruption of Mount Etna is increasing and new craters are appearing in the mountains. Vast clouds of dense smoke pouring from the crater are visible for miles.

Inhabitants of villages along the slope are fleeing. The whole population of the region is terrified. Earthquake shocks have added to the terrors and have driven many of the inhabitants from their homes.

OVERSON RETURNS FROM MEETING OF DIRECTORS WEST TEXAS C. OF C.

Budget for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was definitely fixed at \$90,000 at a meeting of the directors in Sweetwater Saturday, Judge Ove Overson, one of the directors said on his return to Ranger. The directors set in motion plans to raise from \$50,000 to \$100,000 to be used in the national advertising campaign for West Texas.

Mr. Overson said the number of directors will be increased from 40 to 50, the ten additional members to be named at the next meeting.

The next convention date was tentatively set for May 13, 14 and 15 at Brownwood. A suggestion was made by Judge Gamin of Sweetwater, Mr. Overson said, that a historical department be a part of the chamber. Action will be taken on this suggestion at the next meeting.

The directors ordered the continuation of all the present chamber departments.

DOG HILL PARAGRAPHS

"Three-quarters of a century ago," the new forest service bulletin states, "the southern part of the west coast of France, including the Landes and Gironde departments, was largely an unhealthy waste of sand and swamp.

"Out of this area of swamps and shifting sand dunes, with a malarial, scanty, and poverty-stricken population, the French government through reclamation and the planting of maritime pine has made one of the most prosperous and salubrious regions of France.

"The reclamation and reforestation of something over 1,500,000 acres cost on the average only \$6.41 per acre. The estimated net forest revenue of the Landes district is \$2,702,000 per year, or about \$2.22 per acre.

"Europe affords many similar examples, declares the Forest Service. The contrast can be found in former great timber states, such as Pennsylvania, Michigan and Wisconsin, where hundreds of prosperous communities were built up around cooperation or woodenware plants and sawmills only to be abandoned when the system of timber mining exhausted the great forests without any attempt at replacement or reforestation.

Many specific examples of towns and counties which have suffered from timber mining are given in the bulletin, which, among other things, states:

"The departure of local industries takes much in addition to the enterprises themselves. It removes opportunity for the employment of labor, cuts heavily into local markets for the farmer, and likewise cuts down the trade of local merchants.

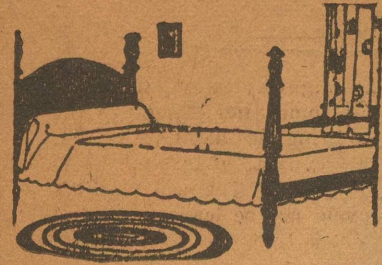
