CITY ENACTS ORDINANCE A T ONCE EFFECTIVE

Forbids Building or Maintaining Gas Lines Without Permit or Franchise.

After long discussion but by unanimous vote when the question finally was put to the city commission, an ordinance carrying the emergency clause was adopted Tuesday afternoon which is designed to remove all unauthorized, derelect or 'fran-thiseless' gas lines from within the city of Ranger.

The ordinance was drawn, introduced and read by City Judge L. H. Flewellen, who explained its purport and the accessity for it to protect a fray chise given by the city and to guard against the danger of gas from leakage.

The ordinance is captioned: "An ordinance prohibiting the building. laying, constructing or maintaining gas lines within the corporate limits of the city of Ranger without a franchise or permit authorizing the same and providing a penalty."

The penalty provided for violation of the ordinance is a fine of between \$25 and \$100 and it is set forth that "each and every day during the building, laying, constructing or maintenance of such pipe line shall be deemed a separate offense.'
