



Diet to Form New One Without Communists.

By United Press.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.-Chancellor Stresemann has backed up the central government's demand that President Zeitner of Saxony dismiss his cabinet today by sending Herr Schultz to be the civil commissionaire of Saxony. Schultz has orders to demand that the state diet form a new cabinet in place of the one dismissed. He was instructed to give the diet a chance to show its willingness to submit to the central government; otherwise to dissolve the assembly.

Following receipt of President ist members, Stressemann acted without delay. Zeitner refused the demand after an all-day session of the cabinet, declaring there was no reason why any of them should resign. He is expected Zeitner will appeal to the Saxony diet for conirmation of his refusal.

Communitsts and extremists in Saxony have called for a general strike against the central governnent's action. Chancellor Stresemann is confident that the central government's forces will be power ful enough to bring Saxony to obedi-

PLANT NO 108 SWEPT BY FLA Dismisses Cabinet and Orders Fire Starts In Compressor and Buildings Trans-

formed Into Red-Hot Furnace In Few Seconds. Fear Felt Some Workmen May Have Been Caught In Burning Structure. Loss May Reach Half-Million Dollars.


Three men were seriously burned and a loss which may reach one-half million dollars sustained in a fire at the Chestnut & Smith corporation plant No. 108, which started shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon, about eight miles from Ranger on the old Eastland road.

It was feared at 3 o'clock that some other men might have been caught in the fire and burned to death, for it had not at that time been possible to check up the employes and ascertain if all were accounted for.

The injured men were placed in automobiles and hurried to the Clinical hospital here for medical aid. They are:
