FRANCE TRIES WITH THE U.S.

Would Link Her Debt to This Country to the Reparations Conference.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 .- France will agree to permit the proposed conference of experts to consider German reparations only if the commission can take up the revision of the French debt to the United States, it was learned from a reliable source

This will be the French reply to Hughes objection to limiting the proposed investigation of Germany's capacity to pay reparations.

The attitude of the American government remains the same regarding her repeated refusal to having the allied debt to the United States linked up with reparations. While the state department would not commit in advance, the inference was that Hughes would refuse to allow the debt question to be injected.

BAKERS CUT PRICE OF BREAD

In Effort to Prevent Rioting, German Bakeries Reduce Cost of Bread From 150 Billion Marks to 140 billion Marks: "Red Rebellion" Apprehended.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—Danger of a "red rebellion" in many cities of Germany was apprehended today as the army completed preparations to combat an aggressive movement by the Bavarian fascisti.

Thousands of families were in despair as they found themselves unable to buy bread today. Long lines of hungry people waiting for bread early today broke up in despair when prices advanced rapidly with the continued fall of the mark. Many of them have been without bread since Saturday, hav-

ing been unable to pay the price of 150 billion marks for a loaf instead of the lower figure formerly charged.

Hundreds of men and women rushed bread wagons in the factory districts. Many of them have been without work for a long time. The police were helpless until soldiers came to their rescue and helped them reform their lines, when they dashed into the crowd, which fell back, leaving only the bolder ones in the hands of the po-

Many of the bakeries cut the price of bread this morning to 140 billion marks for a loaf.

SPECULATORS IN GERMAN MARKS LOSE MILLIONS

Investments in German Bonds. Not Payable in Gold, Virtually Lost.

By Associated Press.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Between 500 million dollars and 750 million dollars have been lost by American investors through the collapse of the German mark, the New York Tribune said today.

The newspaper declares that Germany not only has repudiated its national debt, but had been the gainer to the extent of about two bililon dollars, the loss including the funds of thousands of small investors, it was said. Many of these are German-Americans who bought marks at 2 cents each or more in the belief that they would recover. It also includes money invested in German bonds, when it was not specified that repayment be made in gold.
