

GENEVA, Nov. 18.—The entrance of Germany into the League of Nations is expected to delay temporarily rather than to speed up the League's program for a disarmament conference.

WASHINGTON — As enthusiastically as if the weather bureau hadn't repeatedly pooh-poohed their effects, the long-range school of weather prophets keeps plugging away at the job of finding out what the weather's going to be like two or three years in advance of its arrival with us. Director Charles G. Abbot of the Smithsonian Institu-tion's astrophysical observatory has just left for Africa and Asia to choose a site for a new station where the sun's heat will be meas-ured daily, to determine what the earthly temperature will be later.



This keeps the macaroni white and firm. Drain well and chill thoroughly. Combine macaroni, peas, celery well crisped and drained, onion and pimentos cut in tiny pieces. Mix with a fork taking care not to crush or break the peas or macaroni. Add on a bed of lettuce. Garnish with ripe olives.
