Eastland County May Recover \$650,000 on Deposit in Security State.

EASTLAND, Nov. 27 .- It appeared today that the chances are still good for Eastland county to recover more than \$650,000 lost in the failure of the Security State Bank and Trust company about two years ago. It seemed a cinch that the calamity howlers would not have much to cry about

The district clerk's office Monday received the official mandate from the court of civil appeal at El Paso, upholding Judge Davenport's denial, in district court, of the attorney general's plea of privilege.

This is the second court victory for Eastland county in its suit to recover the lost county funds and greatly encouraged those interested in the case.

The county's lawsuit is now pending in the court of civil appeal at Fort Worth and an early hearing is expected. It seems probable that the case will go to the supreme court, but with all the rulings so far favoring the plaintiffs, it looks very encouraging for Eastland county.

When the Security State Bank and Trust company went to the wall, it was the depositary for Eastland county. The county had in the bank something more than \$650,000, including school funds.
