NEW YORK, Dec. 19 .- Golf always has been a sport inclined to scatter its honors and keep its glory moving and 1923 was no exception to what has become a general rule that champions can't repeat.

Only two of all the major title holders of 1922 were able to retain their places at the top through the heated campaigns for 1923.

Gene Sarazen was able to retain his crown as the profesional champion of the United States and Chick Evans did his annual stunt of winning the western championship.

Sarazen's victory in the professional tournament came late in the season and it prevented him from having a most unprofitable year, as he failed to qualify in the British open championship. lost his title as the American open champion and fell far below his 1922 standard of play in the other important tournaments.

Walter Hagen, who shares with Sarazen the credit of being the greatest match player in America, also had an off-season. He failed to win a single championship of importance and he lost the British open title which he won in 1922.


