Attorney General Announces Ruling Relative to Delinquent Taxes.

By United Press

AUSTIN, Dec. 11:-In an opinion given out today by the attorney general's department relative to the general powers of commissioners' courts and the collection of delinquent taxes, it is held that commissioners' courts are without authority to contracts with attorneys to act independent of county or district attorneys in the collection of delinquent taxes.

In interpreting the law, the legal department states that these courts possess only such powers as are expressly conferred by the constitution or statutes, and in addition certain implied powers necessary to the

quent taxes shall be brought.

Under the constitution the commissioners' courts cannot contract for attorneys to collect delinquent taxes except to assist the county and Eastland Cirl At district attorneys in the performance of their duties.

This opinion in effect holds that certain parts of the delinquent tax law passed by the last legislature are unconstitutional.

"Unless you have a steel stom-ach duly guaranteed to withstand eating liquids, and iron kidneys properly certified to resist burning liquors, and a metallic heart assured to absorb abnormal action and unusual reaction, and an as-bestos covered liver attested to be immune from alcoholic diseases, immune from alcoholic diseases, and other super-organs, DON'T DRINK the fraudulent and poisonous intoxicating liquors being peddled and sold by bootleggers." Thus admonishes Palmer Canfield, Federal Prohibition Director of New York State, in a statement published in the October issue of "Physical Culture."

"Out of every one hundred bottles of liquor sold as real whisky or gin, only one has any legitimate relationship to real liquor," states

relationship to real liquor," states Director Canfield, "The other ninety-nine are noxious, unwholesome, semi-poisonous, synthetic whisky or gin. These figures are not fantastic or guess-work, but are based upon the chemical analysis of thousands of samples taken from seized liquors sold illegally. During the first year of Prohibition, about sixty percent of distilled spirits sold was straight whisky, and during the second year, the proportion had decreased to twenty-five percent, and at the present time, as the Government Chemist Quillen reports, only one percent is straight whisky.

"Specially denatured alcohol is a legitimate commercial product used in making toilet waters and hair tonics and in other trades. Ingredients are added to render the alcohol unfit for use as a beverage. Among them are sulphuric acid, brucine, iodine, wood alcohol, pyridine, benzol, carbolic acid and acctone. The manufacturers of these synthetic liquors attempt by redistillation to remove these ingredients, but it cannot be done completely.

"Real, pure, straight whisky can only be made in a proper scientific manner by those having had proper training and with proper machinery and apparatus and under hygienic conditions and with the necessary number of years for the proper aging process and the elimination of the poisonous ingredients. The bootlegger does not possess the powers of a liquor mater and the conflict in life itself.

> A telegraphic apparatus reproducing the exact handwriting of the writer of the message is now in successful operation in several of the French government stations. A special kind of ink is used. When the writing is dry each character is slightly raised. The message is then wrapped around a cylinder which revolves under a needle. As the needle passes over the raised characters an electric current is interrupted. This momentary stoppage of the current at the sending station sends a beam of light against a similar cylinder at the receiving station which is equipped with a photographic film. This, when later developed, becomes a photographic reproduction of the original message.

A specially designed copy holder for stenographers and typists is a new electrical invention. The holder is equipped with an electric lamp from which eye-straining light rays are filtered.


