SCHOOLS CLOSE UNTIL

Child Welfare Club Of Ranger Doing Splendid Work In Schools

The outstanding work of the Child Welfare club of Ranger has attracted not only the attention of state organizations and individuals, but of those in national work who are interested in and know the value of this great work.

From the beginning of its organization with 13 members in June of 1921, the club has grown to 25 members, and the work they have done has increased with each successive year. At Christmas time it has been their annual custom to send baskets of food, and distribute toys and clothing to those in need. In this work they are assisted by all local organizations.

The greatest work done by this organization during the year is the supplying of free milk to undernourished children in the public schools of Ranger, which has resulted in less sickness among the school children and better efficiency in their grades.

At the present time a school nurse has been employed through the efforts of the Child Welfare society, and a dental clinic will soon be equipped in the new high school building.

The Child Welfare club investigates carefully all cases reported or coming under its obcervation, care being taken not to give aid to transient or confirmed beggars. In case of temporary need from a sickness or lack of employment, groceries and needed clothing are provided, and employment if pos-

The Child Welfare has also quipped two public play parks in Ranger. In all of its work it has been assisted by the city commission, Parent-Teacher as-Rotarians, Knights of Columbus and Eastern Star.

If Held Up And Deliver

Following a meeting of the special committee on civic safety and imperative reforms at 5 o'clock this morning, with Gustavus (Adolphus) Coleman holding the balance of power in his hand, it was decided that the mayor, city commissioners, chief of police and all members of his staff should be locked up until further conversations for their future welfare should have been negotiated.

Sergeant Major Giff Clegg reported 15 minutes later that the orders had been carried out, but said that it was not at all certain the safety measures taken would prove effective. He explained that the fire chief had not been included in the orders given him, and the last reports of the fire chief and his firemen was that they had obtained a large supply of skeleton keys and were looking for the incarcerated officials, threatening to release them when

There was consternation in the camp of the Rotarians, who had planned to besiege the city today and hold up every person for ransom, but at last accounts, just as we go to press, the Rotary group was hopeful that the fire chief, in spite of his eagle eye, would be unable to find the missing officials so early in the morning.

The order of imprisonment for the city officials did not include Commissioners Raymond Teal and C. O. Terrell, who had, without a suspicion of straddling, lined up with the Rotary gang. While Commissioners Teal and Terrell dislike exceedingly, they said, to appear traitorous to their fellow officials, their great hearts, filled with Christmas spirit, had decided that the Rotarian raid must be supported, both because it was charitable in its intent and because they have a bandit taint in their blood and like nothing so much as holding up others for ransom. In fact, Commissioner Teal said that he might have become a pirate had he ever overcome his dislike of the sea.

Another city officer exempted from the order for arrest was J. A. Pitcock, of the personal staff of the police chief, he, like the commissioners, having charity in his heart and a taint of bandit blood in his veins.

The mayor, commissioners and police being safely out of harm's way—that is, if the interferring chief does not obtain their release and bring their own undoing down on their head—the Rotarian gang proposes to run riotously through the City of Ranger this morning. None need expect mercy. They must stand and deliver.

The Rotarians will be armed with a large supply of propoganda, it is said, and citizens may purchase their safety by investing in a supply of this propaganda. It is guaranteed to be harmless if properly used, and, indeed, will be found very helpful if carefully studied.

Raiding the official sanctum sanctorium of the Ranger Daily Times immediately after the city officials had been conveyed to confinement for their own safety, the Rotarians insisted upon the preparation of this propaganda. When a price was named, they replied with a merry Ha! Ha! "The price is your safety," it was declared by the tierce looking raiders, and immediately covered the staff with safety chains so that none might go skidding until the work they demanded had been speedily and properly performed. Truth to tell, the Ranger Times' staff worked cheerfully, notwithstanding their trembling limbs, for the opportunity of getting out an "EXTRA" always appeals to them, even though it be before daylight on a cold, win-

Rotarians Present Today, Stand This Their Defense Plea For Mercy

A FEW FACTS ABOUT THE CHILD WELFARE CLUB

When the Rotary Club gets out Saturday and sells newspapers at the "exorbitant" price of one to ten dollars per paper, every man or woman who has been in Ranger a year of two will realize what it is all about and will cheerfully pay whatever price they can afford for a paper

This annual event will recall pleasant memories to many of them; memories of the time when a ten dollar bill was worth about as much as a postage stamp is now and of the generous, good-hearted way in which the Rotary Big Newsies have always been received.

Last Christmas, 1922 the funds received through the sale of papers and the voluntary contributions from the club members made a toal of nearly \$800. To this was added other money from other sources making nearly \$1,200 for the Child Wel-

MONEW CAREFULLY SPENT if you think the Child Welfare club

wasted the money you might ask any merchant in town who has sold anything to the club, or ask any people who have received help through this channel. Their aim is to give immediate relief to suffering if the case is worthy and assist in getting their wards on a self-supporting basis. In one instance they fitted up a family with a horse and wagon-not a handsome rig and a fiery charger, but a regular "old grey.

Another one of their major activities is supplying free milk in the schools to undernour shed nupils. Go to any school and look at the health charts and see how the grades of these kids begin to climb and how they begin to pick up weight after they have been supplied with nourishment. They also fostered the movement which succeeded in nutting on a nurse for full time work in the schools, giving the ki'ds practical instruction in diet, hygiene, etc.

Baskets. First they make a systematic survey of the city and find what is needed, or what most people think is needed. Then they investigate the cases and revise their list, striking off all professionals in the art of begging and then give genuine help to those who are unfortunate enough that their Christmas dinner seems doubtful.

Thus goes the work of the Child's Welfare club. The things mentioned above all come within the knowledge of the writer, and there are doubtless many accomplishments of this club that are known only to those active in the work. The writer knows they are not boastful of their deeds. You might talk to Mrs. John Thurman or Mrs. Clyde Craig all day and if you did not show an interest in welfare work to the extent of asking them some questions, you would certainly not be burdened with voluminious talk about the subject on their part. SOURCES OF REVENUE

Now about their sources of revenue. They are not entirely supported by any particular body. They take money from whatever source they can get it and have never been known to step out and demand that they shall have a certain amount, but they usually, because of wisely used finances have a few dollars on hand for emer-

For the past four years the Rotary club has sold a special edition of the Ranger Times on the streets of Ranger and the entire receipts from the sale of these papers has been given to the Child Welfare club. The Special Edition has been generously donated by The Times, and the Rotarians give their time, and in view of this the paners always bring a high price.

The Rotarians will be out selling papers Saturday morning, Dec. 22, and all Rotarians who fail to report for duty are fined \$10 and costs for contempt of charity and the Welfare club gets the money.

Child Welfare Club CONVICT REMEMBERS Of Ranger Doing Splendid Work In Schools

The outstanding work of the Child Welfare club of Ranger has attracted not only the attention of state organizations national work who are interested in and know the value of this great work.

From the beginning of its organization with 13 members in June of 1921, the club has grown to 25 members, and the work they have done has increased with each successive year. At Christmas time it has been their annual custom to send baskets of food, and distribute toys and clothing to those in need. In this work they are assisted by all local or-

The greatest work done by this organization during the year is the supplying of free milk to undernourished children in the public schools of Ranger, which has resulted in less sickness among the school children and better efficiency in

their grades. At the present time a school nurse has been employed through the efforts of the Child Welfare society, and a dental clinic will soon be equipped in

the new high school building. The Child Welfare club investigates carefully all cases reported or coming under its obcervation, care being taken not to give aid to transient or confirmed beggars. In case of temporary need from a sickness or lack of employment, groceries and needed clothing 'are provided, and employment if pos-

The Child Welfare has also equipped two public play parks in Ranger. In all of its work it has been assisted by the city commission, Parent-Teacher association, women's clubs, Lions, Rotarians, Knights of Columbus and Eastern Star.
