SUIT BY GUARDIAN TO ANNUL MARRIAGE RESULTS IN MISTRIAL

EASTLAND, Oct. 13.—Trial of the suit brought by the guardian of Mrs. A. J. Malear to annul her marriage with her 73-year-old husband on the grounds that she is feeble minded, resulted in a hung jury and Judge G. L. Davenport discharged the jury at 5 p. m. Friday. Property worth \$25,000 is involved in the suit. It has attracted much attention.

Relatives of Mrs. A. J. Malear, formerly Miss Emma Bishop of Gorman, alleged to be non compos mentis, are seeking to have the marriage contract annulled. The suit is brought in the name of M. C. Alsbrook, guardian of the woman.

Mrs. Malear, said to have been of feeble mind since infancy, is now 44 years old. Malear is 73. They were married June 18 this year. Shortly after their marriage, the guardian and relatives of the woman took her from her husband's home and writs of injunction were secured prohibiting their living together.

Another suit was filed in the Eighty-eighth district court and habeas corpus proceeding were instituted and Judge Hill ruled that she was to choose for herself as to whether she would return and live with her husband. The woman was then confined in the Epileptic colony at Abilene. She was brought here for the hearing in the habeas corpus proceeding and was permitted to return to her home under the ruling of the court. She and Malear are now living together at their home a few miles east of Gorman.

The issue to be determined by the jury was whether Mrs. Malear is sufficiently intelligent to be competent to understand and enter into a marriage contract.

At the time she was adjudged non compos mentis in the county court at law, she had approximately \$25,000 worth of property. Her father had left a tract of over 400 acres of land in the Abraham Smelzer survey in the Desdemona oil field. The lease and royalties on the tract are said to have brought several hundred thousand dollars. She is a sister of the late S. W. Bishop of Gorman.

Frequent Culling Improves a Flock

Picking Stock Intelligently for Breeding Purposes is Essential.

The value of a flock for any purpose may be materially increased by careful and intelligent culling. This means systematically picking out the inferior chickens as the flock matures.

Provided the most desirable birds are reserved for breeding purposes, the improvement of a flock under such policy will be more distinctly manifested each year.

If, on the other hand, the best specimens out of a flock are sold or killed each year, and only the culls are retained, future improvement will be impossible. The quality of the chicks produced each year depends on the quality of the breeding stock. If the breeding stock are poor egg producers, or lack characteristics of good market poultry, or of exhibition poultry, according to the purpose for which the flock is being bred, the stock will deteriorate.

Each year the best of all the chicks grown should be selected for the production of eggs for hatching the coming season. Inferior chicks should be fattened up and either sent to

market or used on the home table.

Eliminate Inferior Chickens Early. To prevent overcrowding and to avoid unnecessary expense for feed, flocks should be culled as they grow. As soon as the chicks have reached a salable size, those least desirable should be sold.

This kind of culling should be continued throughout the entire season until the flock is reduced to a desirable size for winter. All cockerels in excess of a reasonable number reserved for breeding purposes should be sold as soon as they are ready for market.

This process of culling may be compared to the skimming of milk, the cream of course being represented by the choice specimens left after the inferior ones have been culled out.

The most promising chicks to keep for future egg production are cockerels and pullets that grow quickly into birds that have plump graceful forms typical of the variety to which they belong.

Birds that have long legs, skinny necks and ill proportioned bodies should be killed promptly.

Picking the Good Ones. Poultrymen will vary on many points to be considered in selecting fowls for breeders for egg producers. The following, however, are some important details on which most of them will agree:

To produce eggs there must be

prominence of crop and breast, indicating high food consuming power and liberal development of body and abdomen to provide ample space in which the eggs may be formed.

Legs that are long and badly shaped indicate that the fowls possessing them are likely to be poor egg producers and such legs are also objectionable in market poultry.

Birds that have heads that are rough or coarse in formation or necks that are unduly long and slim or heads with unsymmetrical or unshapely combs should be eliminated.

Female chickens with normally developed chest and abdomen, evenly poised fore and aft on legs of a length and size of the body, usually develop into good egg producing pullets. This same type of bird also produces the best table poultry.
