These include support of the educational program of Texas recently mapped out by the heads of the various colleges and normals in the state; extension of Rotary's work among boys, and the furtherance of all "legitimate" plans looking forward to better salaries for teachers of the state.

The newly-nominated district governor was graduated from the University of Texas and is a member of the board of regents of that institution, having been appointed several months ago by Governor W. P. Hobby. He also is president both of the Orange Chamber of Commerce and of the Rotary club in that city.

At the University of Texas, Mr. Stark is known as the "guardian angel" of athletes.

OXEN CARRY DOCTOR THROUGH DRIFTS TO SAVE

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y.—When Dr. E. J. Vigeant, of Red Hook, was called to attend a very sick patient several miles in the country, he replied he could not come as the roads were heaped high with drifts.

LONDON, Feb. 26.—President Wilson's note to the surrogates called counsel relative to the Adriatic settlement was ready for consideration when the council opened its session today.

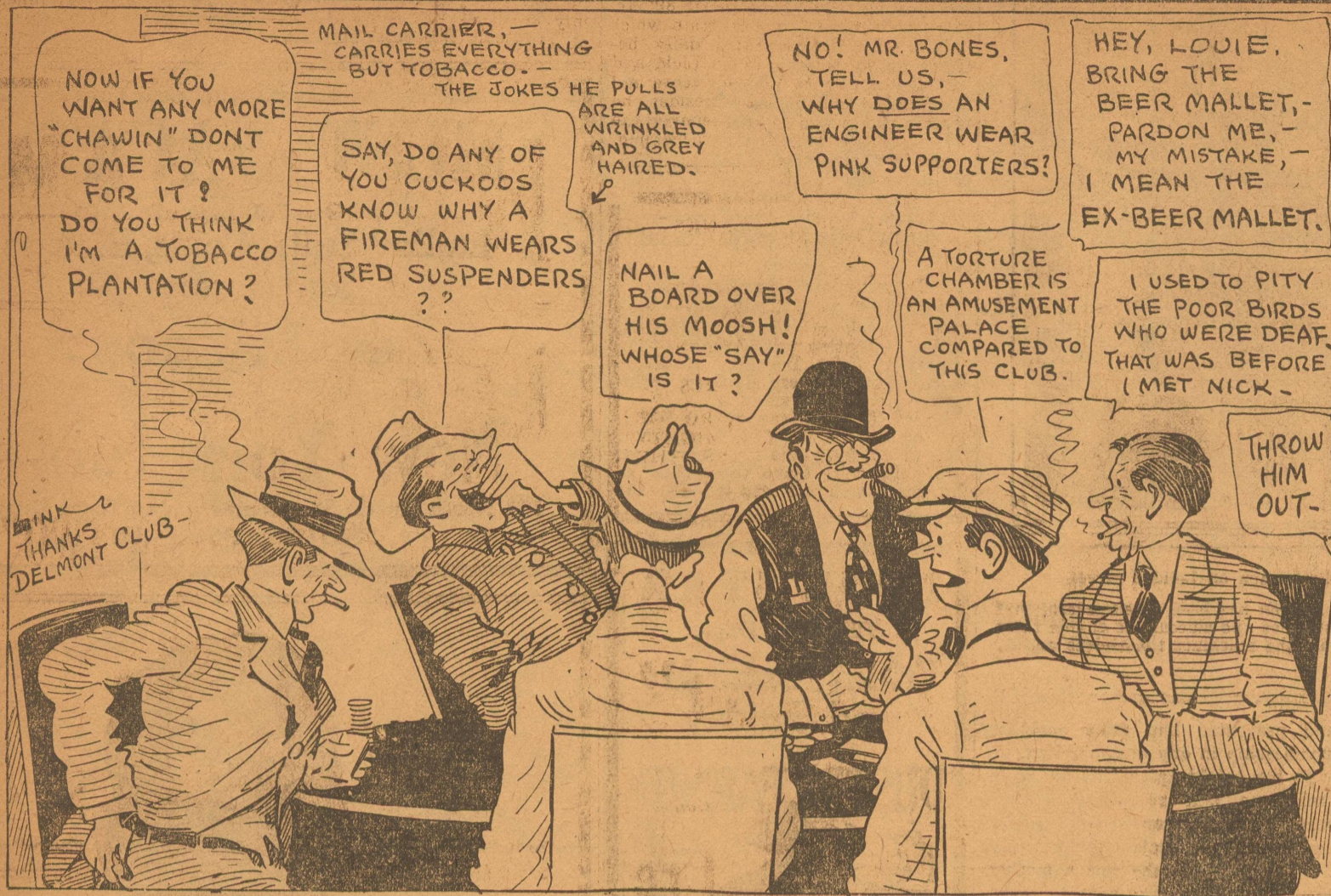

CUPID SPLITS VANDERBILT'S VAST FORTUNE

International News Service. NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Cupid is playing hob with the fortune left by Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, founder of the Vanderbilt family. Every time Cupid's arrow pierces the heart of a member of the Vanderbilt family it knocks another chip off the \$100,000,000 estate left behind when Commodore Vanderbilt died in 1877. One recent marriage and the announcement of two engagements of descendants of Commodore Vanderbilt have served to emphasize the fact that romance is breaking up one of the greatest fortunes ever accumulated in America. Deaths and marriages have divided and subdivided the original fortune, but despite this it still adheres in sufficient amounts to make the Vanderbilt heirs desirable matrimonial catches, both in this country and abroad. The marriage in London recently of the Marquis of Blandford, eldest son of the Duchess of Marlborough, who is the daughter of W. K. Vanderbilt, to the Hon. Mary Cadogan is assurance that a large part of the Vanderbilt fortune will remain permanently abroad. The Marquis of Blandford is the first to marry of the great-grandchildren of the original Cornelius Vanderbilt. There are fifty-nine of them living. Following closely on the announcement of the Marquis of Blandford's engagement, young Cornelius Vanderbilt, son of Brigadier General and

Mrs. Vanderbilt, startled the smart set by announcing his engagement to Rachel Littleton, younger sister of Martin W. Littleton, the well known lawyer. While Miss Littleton had lived in New York for a number of years, she was not particularly well known in the Vanderbilt set, and her engagement to the future heir of the Vanderbilt family upset the carefully laid plans of several match-making mothers of marriageable daughters. On top of all this came the announcement that Flora Payne Whitney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, was to become the bride of Roderick Tower, a son of the Charlemagne Tower of Philadelphia. Miss Whitney's mother was formerly Gertrude Vanderbilt, a daughter of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt, and she will at some future time inherit a considerable portion of the family fortune, in addition to that which will come to her from the estate of her paternal grandfather, the late William C. Whitney. The Hon. Mary Cadogan, who will some day be Duchess of Marlborough, is the fourth daughter of the late Viscount Chelsea and Lady Meux. She is a stepdaughter of Admiral Hugh Hedworth Meux, who is in command of the garrison at Portsmouth, and who played a prominent part in the relief of Ladysmith, in the Boer war, about twenty years ago. The bride is a goddaughter of Dowager Queen Alexandra. Her three sisters, all noted for their beauty, are Lady Hillingdon, Lady Stanley and Mrs. Humphrey de Trafford.

SUDAN GRASS POISONS COW. ATHLENE, Kan.—Though very few cases of Sudan grass poisoning are known to have occurred in the United States, a case was brought to the attention of the Kansas state experiment station recently by a farmer near here. A herd of ten cows was turned loose on an acre patch of the grass after a second cutting. Within ten minutes two of the animals were seen to fall. The herd was immediately driven out of the patch, but the two stricken cows died within an hour.

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THE CITY MANAGER.

The importance of man who is chosen to fill the position of city manager cannot be overestimated. For the next year he will be the most important man in Ranger, centering in that office the future of the city, determining by his capable handling of the divers problems that are coming up every day the attitude of the public toward the city administration.

The best man obtainable is not too good for the place, for in the task before him he will have as big a job as any city manager in the United States. His salary, whatever its size, can be considered as well invested as money put in paving, or fire protection. Ability never is purchased cheaply.

That sort of man will be the answer to those who say that the city manager-commission plan is not fitted to Ranger; who claim that the city

has too great an administration problem for one man to work out.

The city commission, who will share with the man who holds that position the credit he brings to it, and the blame he is given, realizes the importance of the task. Its members are giving the most careful consideration to their choice.

By him, the commission will be judged. By him, the city's smooth progress in the most important year just started will be determined.

SCHOOL BONDS.

School bonds, in the amount of \$200,000, essential to the completion of the ward schools now in progress of construction, will be voted on Friday in the directors' room of the F. & M. State bank, Main and Rusk streets. Every voter who is a taxpayer should cast his ballot.

On the first election, the bonds carried without opposition, but not enough interest was manifested by the number of votes cast to warrant the school board in taking the issue to bond buyers.

The backing a community gives its schools is judged, in the bond buyer's mind, by the interest taken in the bond election.

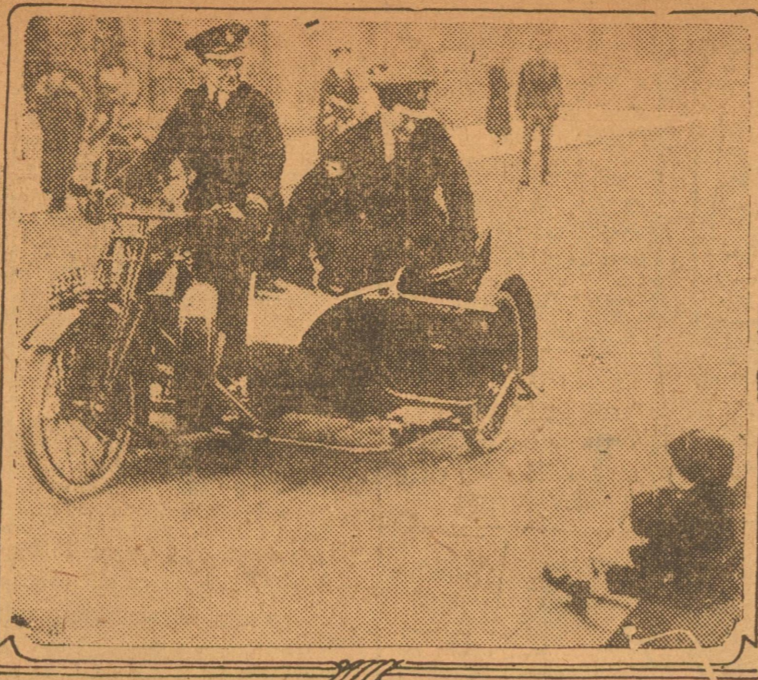

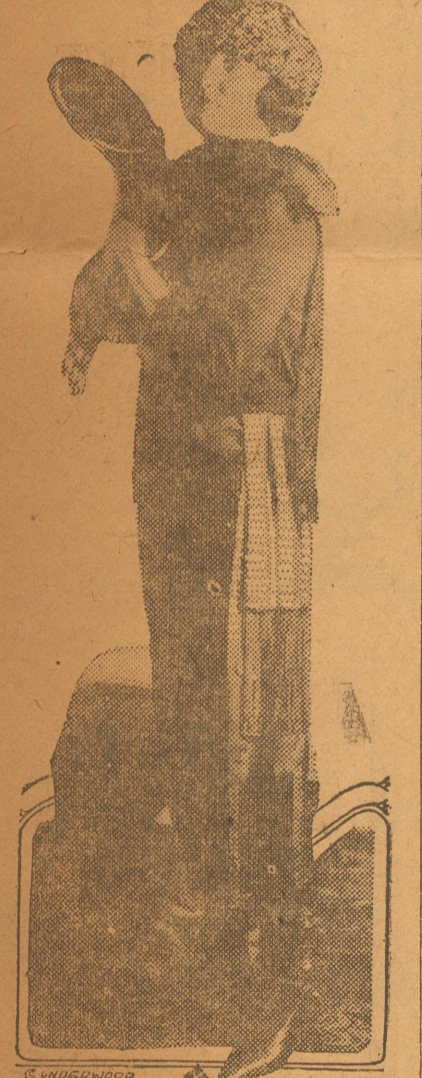
