NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 16.—H. & B. Beer today wired Jess Taylor & Co. of Cisco:

The downward tendency of the market was checked today by census returns showing larger consumption in the United States than privately estimated; of lint cotton 462,000 against 529,000 for the corresponding month last season.

There was a fair recovery in foreign exchange today, due to the French cabinet having decided to raise taxes, direct and indirect, 20 per cent in an effort to prevent a further depreciation in the value of the franc. The British parliament reopened today, and according to press advices, the laborites and liberal intend to stage the biggest defeat they can possibly manage for the Baldwin government so as to give the premier no excuse for retaining office.

Therefore, in addition to the uncertainty of the political situation in England, there is the possibility of a rail strike there in the near future, and a miners' strike in the spring. These disturbing features of the situation, and a further big increase in already high taxes in France, are unfavorable for business in England and France.

Because of the large discount at which they are quoted, traders are beginning to desert old for new crop positions, Liverpool having cabled today "New crops good, owing to switching."
