HIGHER PRICES

Advance to \$1.75 a Barrel for Best Grades Announced; Drillers Active.

Following announcement early Saturday by the Prairie Pipe Line company and the Texas Pipe Line company that crude oil prices had advanced, effective yesterday morning, the increase being 25 cents a barrel for oil of the highest gravity and 20 cents a barrel for the lesser grades, all other oil companies announced they were also authorized to pay the higher prices.

This makes the fourth increase in orices within a few weeks. Heretofore the advances have been about 10 cents a barrel, but this time the priced has jumped 20 and 25 cents barrel. The new prices are:

Under 33 degres gravity, \$1.15. Between 33 and 35.9 gravity, inlusive, \$1.40.

Between 36 and 38.9 gravity, inlusive, \$1.60. Oil of 39 degrees gravity and





RENTS AND TAXES.

Estimates made by the United States bureau of labor statistics per cent of the total expenditures over the demand that rented propcripples the purchasing power of the great public, and some method should be devised to protect both parties.

GOVERNMENT AND RAILROADS.

The railroads of this nation certainly have no complaint against government treatment. About the first of January, 1918, the government took them under a guarantee to eeach road equal to their annual average earnings for the three previous years-the largest in their histories. Under this agreement the people paid the railroads \$1,450,-000,000. Then they were turned back to the owners, under a similar guarantee for six months longer, and to help pay the big boosts in official salaries we not only paid them \$551,000,000 more but permitted them to increase freight and passenger rates nearly a third. All this in 32 months. It is also true that a third of this loss came under private management during a fifth of the period. The transaction really proves nothing as to government management, except that under stress of war preparation the government does not stop at expense or extravagance-neither do the prof-

Secretary Mellon insists that business is being crushed under the surtax. This, too, in face of the fact that the surplus profits tax has been abolished, that billions of surplus earnings have been dispersed in stock dividends, other billions invested in tax-exempt securities, and the past year's records show the greatest profits in history. Perhaps Mr. Mellon is correct, but if so the ordinary man is incapable of comprehending the three principles of arithmetic.

The Chemical National bank, New York, has paid 100 per cent dividends per year for 80 years. The net profits for 1923 totaled \$10,228,247. The capital stock has been increased by 900 per cent stock dividends to \$40,000,000, and this is earning more than 25 per cent. Some of these days some one will contend that money is a public utility, and its cost should be regulated like the railroads and others.

According to Senator Brookhart the Mellon plan of tax reduction would save Henry Ford about \$25,-000,000 in taxes each year. Can anyone blame Henry for being content with things as they are.

The old Lackland ranch has an electric light and waterworks system. There are 19 laying rooms, each having a capacity of 150 birds. There are seven brooding rooms, each with an estimated capacity of 1,000 baby chicks. The laying rooms have a total capacity of almost 3, 000 birds, and the brooding rooms 7,000 baby chicks.

There is a small cottage on the property for the manager and rooms for employes.

A three-acre field at the rear of the laying room shed may be used for growing alfalfa in the spring if there is sufficient precipitation.

The ranch is now in a process of reconstruction. The 4,800-egg capacity incubator is being overhauled. The brooding rooms will be refloored. The chicken yards have been cleaned up of weeds. Trap nests have been installed in some of the

All of the stock will be pedigreed and trap-nested. The success of the new management will be built upon the principle that a chicken to show a profit of three or four dollars on eggs, must yield 200 eggs yearly. A yield of 100 eggs per year is barely enough to make expenses upon this particular hen. Eighty eggs a year means expenses, and no more.

Keeping Egg Record.
On the wall of the room is a record of production, or as poultrymen eall it, a monthly trap nest record. The pullets are numbered. For example No. 130 laid an egg every day, except on two occasions, up to Jan. 16. This is considered very good. No. 151 did not do so good. If 151 doesn't improve in production, she will be thrown out.

"Trap-nested stock will give you heavy production," Maloon said. "Pedigreed stock will bring good prices. We will be in a position to sell baby chicks, with a guaranteed egg production.'

By careful organization, Maloen believes the ranch, which is owned by a corporation, consisting of Ranger business men, can be made into the best plant in the county

The Cantecler is a mixed breed of Dark Cornish, Rhode Island Red, White Wyanhotte, White Leghorn and White Plymouth Rock. It is said the Chantecler has all the qualities of these birds.
