

Every sack of feed, every pound of meat bought by the farmer has been produced by some farmer somewhere. And it is foolish to argue that a Texas farmer can buy this feed and this meat cheaper than be can produce it, especially since there has been tacked onto it the profit of the er has to pay.

We do not have to seek far to find examples of the farmer who believes it is cheaper to buy feed than to produce it. This year an Eastland county tenant farmer rented a 40-acre farm on the halves. He planted it in feed but he soon concluded that it was cheaper to buy his feed than to produce it and sold his 40-acre feed crop for approximately \$40, just what he had spent in preparing the land and planting his crop.

The farmer fho bought the crop

spent an additional \$100 working the crop and now declares he has at least' \$1,000 worth of feed on the 40 acres. In addition to this he has the very bright prospect for a second crop that will net him several hundred dollars should it materialize.




