The following letter from Thomas L. Blanton, representative in congress from this, the Seventeenth congressional district of Texas, in which he advocates the Garner plan of tax reduction in preference to the Mellon plan, contains food for thought. Inasmuch as some propaganda messages have been sent to Mr. Blanton from Texas in favor of the Mellon plan, he would appreciate, doubtless, a few expressions in favor of the Garner plan. Mr. Blanton writes:

My Dear Editor:

Please help us disseminate the real facts on tax reduction: Mellon and Coolidge both demand that the Mellon plan shall be passed without changing the dotting of an "i," or the crossing of a "t." And this affects Texas particularly, for it would prevent the husband and wife from rendering separate returns

## **WOODROW WILSON IS BURIED**

Body of United States' Great Peace and War President Is Placed in Crypt of Washington Cathedral at the Nation's Capitol; Fifty Thousand Gather in the Cathedral Grounds and Wait in Rain Until Services in Chapel Are Ended.

coffin and carried it to the

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 .---Woodrow Wilson lies at rest. The grave today enfolded his body and the hearts of his countrymen have enshrined his memcry. Amid the rustle of oak leaves, the far-off boom of a cannon and the cadence of a bishop's voice, he was laid in the grave today. Above his resting place is the unfinished structure of the Washington Cathedral, typical of his unfinished work, but going on to completion as his faith told him he would go cn.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon, the Rev. James H. Taylor, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church, broke the funeral silence in the Wilson home by reading the Psalm, "The Lord is My Shepherd," breathing hope and peace. In the deepening hush, prayer was uttered by the Rev. Sylvester Beach, Mr. Wilson's spiritual adviser at Princeton. Then the Rt. Rev. James E. Freeman, Episcopal bishop of Washington, opened and read from a khaki covered Bible that had been sent to Mr. Wilson by a soldier in France and was among his most treasured possessions because he felt that it linked him with men he had sent to war. The benediction by Bishop Freeman ended the service in the home. Then strong

Following the coffin came the honorary pall-bearer, former classmates and associates of Mr. Wilson; President and Mrs. Coolidge, the widow and the two daughters, Miss Margaret Wilson and Mrs. McAdoo; Joseph Wilson of Baltimore, a brother; John Randolph Bolling and Wilmer Bolling, brothers of Mrs. Wilson. Outside thousands had gathered and stood with bared heads in the rain. A little group of ex-service men had gathered about a flag. At the cathedral about 50,-000 persons had gathered under

the trees, but only 500 could gain entrance to the chapel, and these had to show cards. A cold rain was falling. The lesson was from Corr. 1:15. Clear and sweet rose the voices of the choir in the hymn "The Day is Dying in the West." The Apostles creed followed and the congregation joined in the Lord's Frayer. Prayer from the Episcopal ritual and the benediction ended the service.

While the chcir sang, President and Mrs. Coolidge led the way from the chapel, al! the people following. Then alone with their dead, the widow and family said their last farewell.
