New Prison Bill Favored Tellez Leaves Washington

GASOLINE TAX CUT TO 2 CENTS BY THE SENATE

Auto Registration Fee May Be Reduced Under The New Law

AUSTIN, March 4.—The senate committee on penitentiaries reported today favorably the substitute bill drafted by Governor Moody for the house bill providing for reorganization and re-location of the prison system.

Representative Leo Satterwhite chairman of the house committee on penitentiaries appeared before the senate committee and objected to some of the changes made in the substitute measure.

In the event the house refuses to concur the bill will go to free conference for "ironing out" of the differences.

The senate state affairs committee this morning recommended reducing the three cent gasoline tax as provided in the Dale-Wallace house bill to two cents. The committee also reported an amendment to the Dale-Wallace house bill for reduction of the automobile registration license by providing that thirty percent of the fees go to the counties, no counties to receive over \$50,000.

The committee vote on both bills was five to four.

The close vote of the committee indicates that there is to be a hard fight when the bills come up for consideration in the senate.

Prediction is made that if the senate adopted the two cent tax, the house will refuse to concur and the bill will go to free conference.

DEATH CALLS LEGISLATOR A. J. DURHAM

AUSTIN, March 4.—Representative A. J. Durham of Satural was found dead in bed at his boarding house this morning.

Representative Durham was apparently in good health when he retired earlier in the evening. He was in his seat throughout the house session Thursday. He is the second member of the house to die in this session. Representative Norman G. Kittrell, of Houston was the other member who died.

Durham was a pioneer in Uvalde county, and was serving his third term in the legislature.

Another Check Victim Is Found Service Station

Another service station in Ranger was victimized by the master forger who is putting out Magnolia Pipe Line checks. A check supposed to be a Magnolia Pipe Line payroll check, serial number 27239, was cashed by another Ranger service station, for \$23.50, and was caught by one of the Ranger banks and turned over to the police. This makes the fifth one of these checks to be caught, but authorities feel that there are quite a few of them out and are expecting others to turn up.

The forged instruments are clever fac similes of the Magnolia Pipe Line checks, and only an expert could detect the difference, it is said.

So far no arrests have been made but some developments are looked for soon.

Coolidge Signs New Prohibition Enforcement Law

WASHINGTON, March 4.—President Coolidge today signed the prohibition reorganization measure desired by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews to aid in dry enforcement work.

TEXAS-PACIFIC M'CALL WELL IS MAKING SHOWING

The Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company's well on the McCall tract, 250 yards east of the Mike Morgan, near Carbon, has touched the black lime at 2,940 feet and is reported to be making some gas and a splendid showing of oil. The well is estimated to be making now about 50 barrels and when completed it is thought it will be good for a three or four hundred barrel producer. Drilling is very slow on account of the covey condition of the hole. The prospects in this well are much better than they were in the Mike Morgan of the Independent Oil & Gas company, which came in last June for 140 barrels.

Near Rising Star in the Blake section the Phillips No. 3 on the Roy Hickman lease is reported as coming in this week for a 500-barrel producer.

The Cohen people, in this same section, brought in a well Wednesday, but the exact amount of production has not yet been learned.

Near the Turner well south of Eastland five miles, Cranfill & Reynolds' Bond is down to 1,200 feet. The pay was struck in the Turner at 1,250 feet. So this well is near completion.

Corzelius Bros. Sims on the Lyerla tract three-quarters of a mile north-west of the Turner, is drilling at 600 feet.

Arrest Made In Diamond Snatching Case

Charges of having in his possession stolen goods to the value of \$450 were filed by J. B. Ames, in justice of the peace J. N. McFatter's court, Ranger, against C. D. Baker. Bond of \$750 was made by Baker and he was released from custody.

Mrs. Ames has just gotten out of her car, about 8 o'clock one Saturday night early in the year, and was crossing the alley between the Cole and Guaranty bank buildings when her purse was snatched from her arm.

One ring belonged to Mr. Ames and was a unique and valuable ring. One stone was unset and another was in a setting. The two last named jewels being Mrs. Ames'.

GOVERNMENTS DISCUSS LAND AND OIL LAWS

Assistant Secretary Drew Declares The Ambassador Is O. K.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Alleged Mexican propaganda in the United States favoring the protested Mexican land oil laws was under discussion by the two governments today.

After hastily returning to Washington for 24 hours while on route to Mexico City, Mexican Ambassador Manuel C. Tellez left here again early this morning for the Mexican capital. Informed persons expect Tellez to return here soon.

Tellez's movements and the usual secrecy maintained by both governments regarding the recent exchange of notes led to reports that the United States has declared Ambassador Manuel C. Tellez persona non grata, and that he has been recalled by President Calles, but responsible American and Mexican officials flatly denied the reports.

Acting Secretary of State Drew announced "the reports that the Mexican ambassador's recall has been demanded by the United States is without foundation, and this government has no information concerning the purpose of his visit to Mexico City."

VARE-SMITH CREDENTIALS CERTIFIED

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The credentials of senators elect Wm. S. Vare of Pennsylvania, and Frank L. Smith, of Illinois, both republicans, were certified as in proper form in a report to the senate today, by the privileges and elections committee.

Senators Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, explained this report had nothing to do with the movement to oust these two senators on account of large primary campaign expenditures but that would be in the province of the seventieth congress, to which they were elected.

Oscar Underwood Noted Democrat Leader Retires

WASHINGTON, March 4.—One of the old veterans whose face is as familiar in congress as the capitol dome, passes from public life at noon today when Senator Oscar Underwood, democrat, Alabama, goes into retirement.

The leader of many historic tariff battles, democratic floor leader in the house and later in the senate, a leading presidential candidate in many recent democratic national conventions, Underwood is quietly retiring. He declined to run for re-election last year and bought an estate across the Potomac in the Virginia hills on the road to Washington's tomb at Mt. Vernon.

Underwood was first elected to the fifty-fourth congress and was re-elected continuously through the sixty-third congress when on March 4, 1915, he came to the senate.

FILLBUSTER KILLS MANY IMPORTANT MEASURES

Vice President Dawes Seathingly Rebukes Members For Delay

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The sixty-ninth congress went down to its death today in a bitter political filibuster which killed all important pending legislation, from the widow pension to the \$325,000,000 public buildings bill and the second deficiency bill containing funds for important government work.

The upper house was held practically impotent up until the final noon adjournment when Vice President Charles G. Dawes, champion of the rule revision to prevent filibustering lectured that body in scathing terms.

"This is the only legislative body in the world where such practices are permitted," Dawes shouted before he banged his gavel announcing the noon hour and adjournment. The house, turning the clock back continued in session for a few minutes past noon.

The closing senate session was marked by unprecedented display of partisan bitterness between republicans and democrats.

Senator Pat Harrison, democrat, Mississippi, held the floor up to the final moment assailing Dave Reed, Andy Mellon and his gang.

Despite the fact that the closing day was a rough one, the sixty-ninth congress went on record for high speed efficiency.

Thousands of bills, resolutions and matters of public importance were disposed of in the swift days since Dec. 6 when the old congress—as distinguished from that elected last November—convened in a final session to tackle the business of the nation.

With knowledge that time was short and that much emergency legislation would have to be passed, usual minor differences were shunted aside in both houses. Never before within memory of the oldest capitol attches has congress done so much in so short a time.

HIGH SCHOOL LAD KILLS HIMSELF

Underwood, the lone democrat, did not run for re-election and Stewart filled the only unexpired term of the late Senator Cummins, republican, Iowa.

Babe Will Draw \$455 Each Game He Plays in 1927

NEW YORK, March 4.—Figuring 154 games for three years, Babe Ruth's \$210,000 will average \$455 per game for the Yankee star and in actual time for an average game, about \$5 a minute.

At the end of each inning of the regular championship contests, the Babe will be richer by \$50 or better and every time he goes to bat—figuring four times for an average game—it will represent \$113.64.

But the Babe will not share in the receipts of exhibition games and the Yankees will play about 30 or 35 of them, in which Ruth has to appear.

Three Nurses Are Suspended In Poison Case

CHICAGO, March 4.—Three student nurses have been suspended and one physician has been asked to resign because of the fatal error in a local hospital in the maternity ward that resulted in the death of five infants and the dangerous illness of two others.

The children died as a result of botic acid poison accidentally administered.

It developed overnight that in addition to the five infants that died suddenly Wednesday, all within an hour of each other, that two others were in a dangerous condition, and that in all, 10 babies had been given the poisonous solution.

Puzzled and Remorseful



Mrs. Ellen Barnum, a widow who supports her five children by her pig farm near Beacon, N. Y., unintentionally stabbed her son, Joseph, 13, in the back with a butcher knife while he squabbled with his sister. Fears for his life were felt for a time, but his recovery later was expected.

Overcome by remorse, Mrs. Barnum was unable to explain the accident, saying that she had meant merely to rod her son reprovingly and momentarily forgot that she had been cutting cake, that she still held the knife in her hand. Although a charge of assault was entered against her, Mrs. Barnum was released on parole so that her farm work might not be interrupted.

FORMER ALIEN CUSTODIAN IS FOUND GUILTY

NEW YORK, March 4.—Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian today was convicted of conspiring to withhold from the government his best services.

The jury was unable to agree in the case of Harry M. Daugherty, former attorney general. Daugherty was tried with Miller. The jury had been out 7 1/2 hours.

The verdict made no findings in the case of Daugherty, the highest government official ever tried on a criminal charge growing out of his conduct in office.

This was the second trial for the two men, the jury having failed to agree at the former trial after having deliberated for approximately 80 hours.

The late republican leader in New York, King, was involved in the case and died shortly after indictments were returned. Considerable testimony was introduced and a statement from an attaché of the German dye manufacturing company. It was that representative's statement that brought on the indictment.

Seven Prisoners Escaped Jail At Albany at Large

OLD SEARCH AND SEIZURE LAW TO STAY AS IT IS

Appeals From Decision County Superintendent To Court Law Passed

AUSTIN, March 4.—The senate bill by Senator Woodward to repeal the rule of evidence clause of the search and seizure act of the thirty-ninth legislature was killed today when the house committee on criminal jurisprudence unanimously voted to indefinitely postpone consideration of the measure. The bill which was drawn primarily for the purpose of allowing the use of evidence obtained in the search of automobiles without a search warrant passed the senate by a close vote after a long and heated debate.

The house passed finally the Loftin bill providing for appeals from decision of county school superintendent to be taken direct from the board of trustees to the courts.

Refusing to print on minority report the house killed the senate bill by Fairchild for tax remission in Tyler.

The bus law introduced by Representative Beck of Tarrant county is facing a fight before it will become part of the statutes. There is a possibility of its being killed because of a lack of time.

Both houses now are down to hard work and close attention is being given every bill.

5 SAILORS BELIEVED TO BE LOST

ORLEANS, Mass., March 4.—Set adrift on a crumpled mass of wreckage after their schooner had broken up in a heavy sea, five members of the crew of the three-masted Mont Clair, are believed to have gone to their death off here today.

Two other members of the crew were rescued.

Early this afternoon one body had been recovered and Captain Edward L. Clark, of the Orleans coast guard station said it appeared that the dead man's four companions had shared his fate.

Jimmy Delaney Dies From Hurts Of His Last Fight

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 4.—Jimmy Delaney, 25 years old, St. Paul light heavyweight boxer, died in St. Mary's hospital early today from blood poisoning.

Although the doctors had given up hopes five days ago, he believed all along he would recover. Youth and vitality kept him alive all the week when the doctors said he was practically gone.

The blood poisoning was the result of an injury Delaney received in his recent fight with Malone, another heavyweight.

Kellogg Resents Report That He Will Resign

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Recurring reports that Secretary of State Kellogg will soon resign are resented by Kellogg and his friends as an alleged undercover campaign to force him out of office.

Kellogg is plainly angry whenever the subject is mentioned.

Out of the haze of reports and denials, these facts were clear:

1. There is a growing movement within the republican party and in New York financial circles to drop Kellogg.

2. Many of Kellogg's friends, while resenting the alleged campaign against him, believe that as over 70 and in poor health he should retire from active political life in the near future.

NOTED CHICAGO MAN LECTURES AT C. I. A.

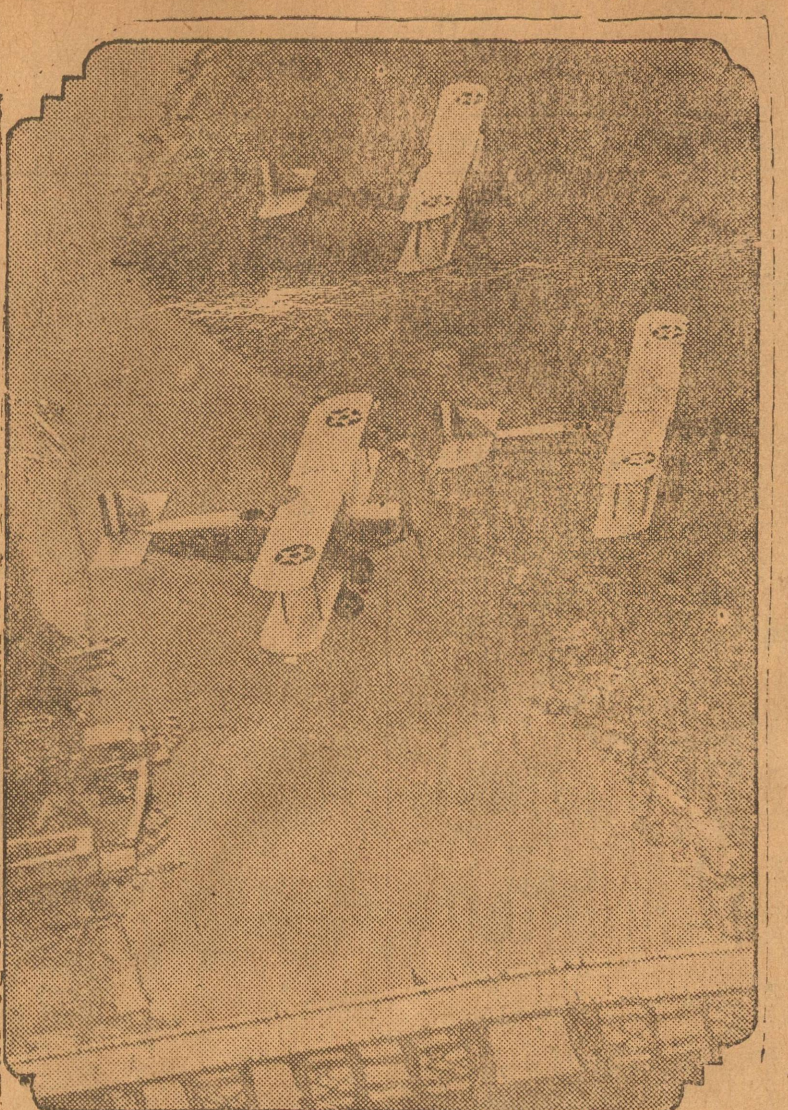

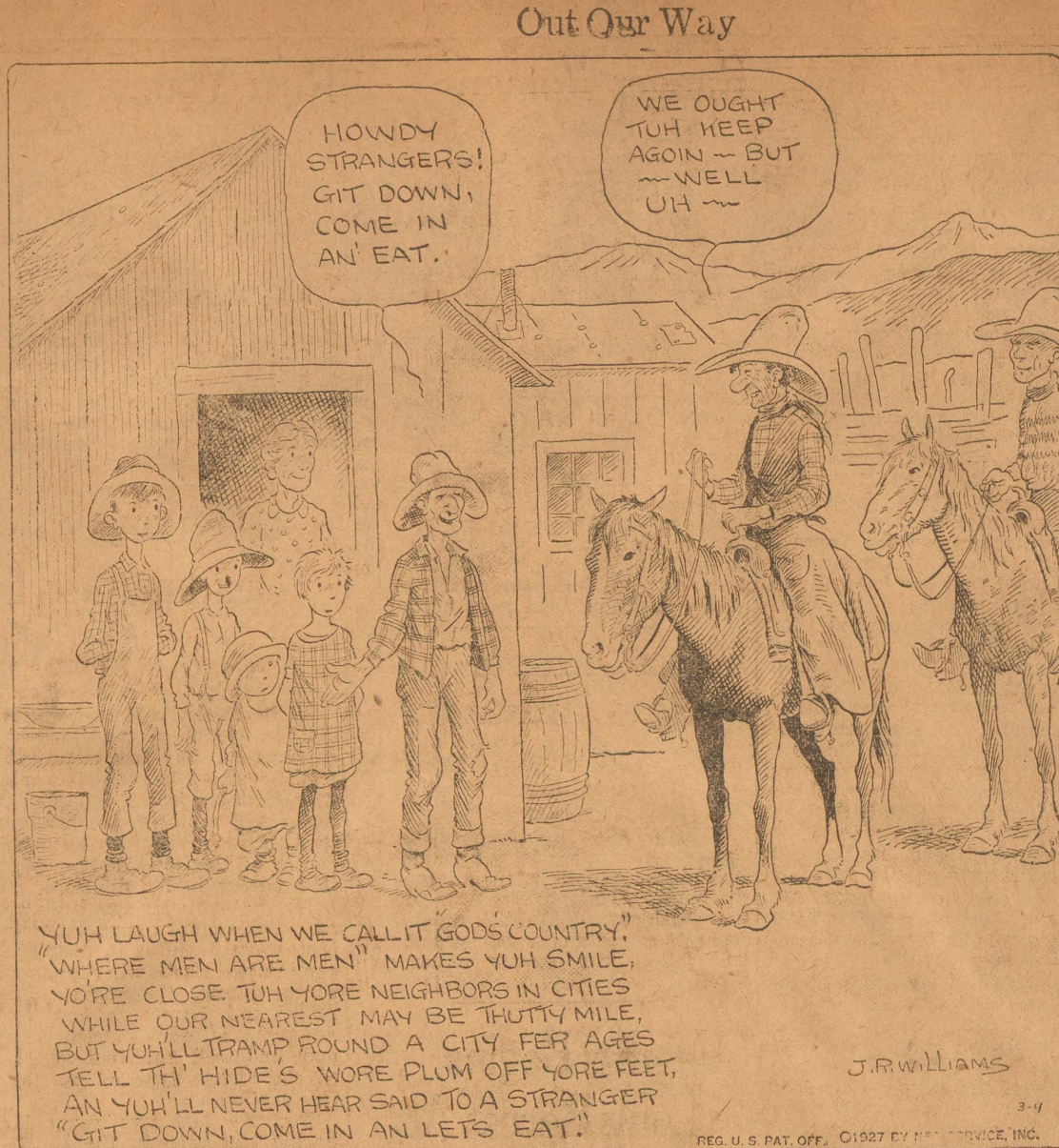

BUSINESS SURVEY OF WEST TEXAS MADE BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REVEALS ERA OF PROSPERITY

Special Correspondence.
STAMFORD, Mar. 4.—With the passing of the "first of the year" and as business men of West Texas complete their invoice it has been found that West Texas business is in the soundest condition in the history of the region. Reports gathered by the West Texas chamber of commerce from throughout the territory served by the organization reflect a healthy condition of business. Farm-

ers of West Texas, who thought they were ruined by the collapse of cotton, have found that their resources were greater than they had expected. Business men who were depressed when the usual fall buying rush failed to materialize, find that their business has remained at a steady level without the usual slack period following the holidays. The farmers who thought they could not buy in the fall, have found that they are in better condition than they had anticipated, and as a result the fall rush has been spreading out over the several months period, and the business man is finding that the goods on his shelves have moved out better than he had anticipated.

Reasons.
The reason for the present condition of West Texas business is threefold. Firstly, West Texas as a whole has made good crops each year for the past seven years. The region was in such good condition that one slack year could not undermine the farmers and business interests of the region. Secondly, the farmers of West Texas have taken up a program of diversified farming to an extent few people realize, and they are in position to live at home, producing their crops at a minimum expense. Thirdly, a great oil play is spreading over all West Texas. Millions of dollars in oil leases and royalty money has more than replaced the losses caused by an overproduction of cotton.

Hogs on Farms.
One striking evidence of this is available. Col. Lee checked up on the hogs between two well-known West Texas cities. On a fifty-mile drive between Big Spring and Lamesa, he looked over each farm house and found that very few farmers had any hogs at all. Less than half a dozen hogs were seen on the entire trip.

Oil Activity.
The oil activity has become more intense. Only in the Panhandle and in the other oil fields of West Texas, but in almost every county, leasing is active, and there are very few counties west of Fort Worth in which from one to twenty wild cat wells are not being drilled. Spectacular play is occurring along the Texas & Pacific railway. The Ranger, Eastland and Cisco sections have always been active and are now experiencing the greatest play since the big boom

Baird and Putnam are having a big shallow oil play. Abilene is receiving a strong reflection from activity in Merkel, Trent and Noodle Dome. Sweetwater is dividing this play with Abilene. To the west, Colorado and Big Spring are having the greatest period of oil development in the history of either town. Howard County's noted Chalk field is developing into a real field. Midland marks the point from which play west is truly spectacular. Spreading out in a great crescent the play has come up from Big Lake to the north-west. Upton, Crane, Pecos and Crockett counties are undergoing great development. Recently in Pecos county the third largest oil well in the history of West Texas came in with a roar. This was followed by another well on Texas University lands in Crane county.

The play has crossed the Texas & Pacific railway west of Odessa. At Jenkins a good well has been found, and in Winkler county scenes rivaling those of the great central West Texas oil boom are being enacted. The play has spread to the west until at the present time, wild cat drilling right up to the foot hills of the Davis and Delaware mountains. President Lancaster of the Texas Pacific railway recently prophesied that three towns of fifteen thousand and population are due to build from Big Spring west. The Texas & Pacific railway has seen the western division on the road change from the red to the black side of the ledger and apparently the oil play has just begun.

Coleman County.
To the south of the Texas & Pacific in Brown and Coleman counties another big play is in progress. The Fry pool in Brown county has come into the limelight as one of the really big pools of the state. Cross Cut and Cross Plains continue active and operations continue there at a rapid pace. The same is true to the north in Shackelford and in Stephen counties. The Cook pool near Albany has reached the two million barrel mark although the pool is barely one year old. Jones county is receiving an active play with considerable production already being made in the southern part of the county. Wild cat wells are going down all over the county and farmers there have forgotten cotton prices as the lease money flows into their pockets.

Archer county and Young county are each receiving great oil play. In fact, the entire area generally known as the Wichita Falls belt is back into prominence as an oil section. The same thing is true of the Panhandle. Operations in the Panhandle are now confined to a small area. A section forty miles wide and a hundred miles long is already semi-proven, and activity there has been intense for more than a year.

Live Stock Industry.
The cattle industry in West Texas too is in flourishing condition. The cow man has staged a successful comeback. The ranges are populated by the best cattle Texas has ever seen. The ranchmen have found that proximity of farmers has provided plenty of feed and at a low price. Many of the cattlemen have adopted the practice of finishing their cattle on home grown feed, and are securing good results.

The sheepman too is contributing his part toward stabilizing business conditions in West Texas. Both meat and wool are bringing fair prices. Range is good, and the lamb crop is bringing smiles to the faces of sheep raisers.

And finally, the poultry industry with its companion, the dairying business, has grown by leaps and bounds. It is estimated that the poultry population of West Texas has increased by the millions during the past twelve months. Hatching plants with total capacity reaching more than a million eggs have been installed at points throughout the region. Poultry associations have been formed at many points. At others, private business has provided dressine and storage plants. Prices have proven satisfactory with a strong demand for all produce. This industry has done more, perhaps, to stabilize general farm conditions than any other one thing and interest continues unabated.

The towns of West Texas reflect this general prosperity. The business and bank failures of West Texas have been no more than in any other year. Merchants report that collections, which were slow for a time, have picked up. The good season in the ground has raised the spirits of the farmers. Seed is going into the ground for many crops. Grain is already growing. It is expected that when all crops are growing and the agricultural population gets to work in earnest that a sharp increase in general business will be noticed.

Ranger Woman Field Secretary Of Delphian Clubs

Mrs. J. F. Dreinhofer, of Ranger, has been appointed field secretary for the Delphian society and will enter the ranks of the first and the only of this month. Mrs. Dreinhofer will work in the state of Texas for the year and her work will be to assist the state supervisor in organizing Delphian clubs, throughout the state.

House Adopts Reorganization Of Prohibition

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The senate amendments to the prohibition reorganization bill were accepted by the house today. The measure now goes to the president. The bill creates a separate department of prohibition and places dry agents under civil service.

Congress Begins Long Recess At Noon Friday

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Congress is in for a long rest or the people are in for a long rest from congress—either way you want to put it. The old sixty-ninth congress which adjourns at noon today is dead forever. The new seventieth congress, elected last November, does not come into action under the constitution until the first Monday of next December. This provides a nine months rest which can only be broken if President Coolidge calls a special session which does not seem very likely unless some national crisis arises.

Moody Signs Two Bills, One on Fish Seining in West

AUSTIN, March 4.—Governor Moody has signed and filed the house bill providing for a more efficient road system for Washington county, and the house bill permitting the seining of sucker, buffalo, carp and shad in Correll, Hamilton, Erath and Hood counties in July, August and September.

Action on Radio Commission Is Deferred

WASHINGTON, March 4.—All hope of senate action on President Coolidge's appointees to the radio commission was abandoned by Senator Watson, republican, Indiana, chairman of the interstate commerce committee to which the nominations were referred. Consequently Watson said President Coolidge could give recess appointments to the nominees, three of whom have been criticized by Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, as "hand picked Hoover men."

S. M. U. Admitted Into Association Of Big Colleges

DALLAS, March 4.—Southern Methodist University has been admitted as a regular member of the Association of American Colleges by the unanimous vote of that body, according to a recent notification from Dr. Robert L. Kelly, New York City, secretary of the Association to Dr. C. O. Seelman, president of the university. Application for membership had not been presented by the school until this year.

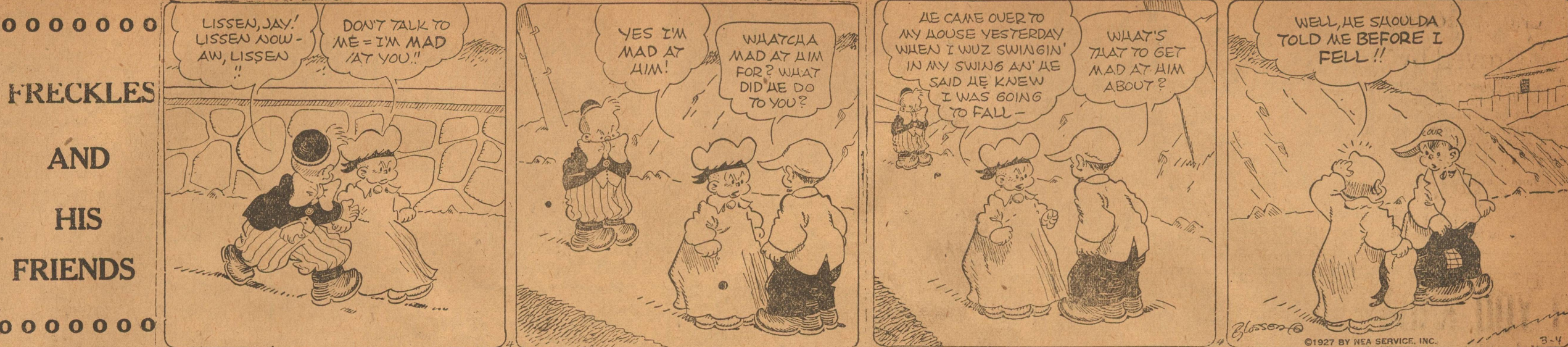

KEATON KNOCKED DOWN BY EXPLOSION IN FILM

Some of the big scenes in "The General," the new Buster Keaton comedy which comes to the Lamb theatre, Ranger, and Connelley theatre, Eastland, Friday and Saturday, nearly ended in tragedy when the picture was being made.

Audiences do not know that men are fighting desperately for their lives as some of the action in the big comedy is flashing across the silver-sheet. One of these scenes is the attempt of the Northern raiders in the

civil war story to swim a rapids to escape their Confederate pursuers. On the day that this scene was made on the McKenzie river in Oregon, Buster, as his own director, kept the cameras grinding as long as possible, then plunged into the rapids himself and saved two of the supporting players from drowning.

The rapids through which the actors swam are so rough that boats are not permitted to descend them. A battery of cameras had been placed on rocks in mid-stream, and during the height of the "shooting" one of them fell into the raging torrent and was demolished.

The scene is considered one of the most dangerous ever attempted, both

from the standpoint of actors and the camera men.

Another scene that kept the Keaton first-aid stations busy on the day it was made was the blowing up of a dam by Buster while the raiders were under heavy Confederate fire. The dam blew up with a vengeance, showering members of the company with rocks and requiring stitches in several heads.

Buster was thrown down by the force of the explosion, but he kept his wits and his frozen-face, and indicated to the cameraman that he wanted the action to continue till the end of the scene.

Minor casualties were frequent during the filming of "The General,"

which took six months to make. The cast numbers thousands. The equipment in the picture includes three civil war locomotives and trains, historically accurate in every detail.

Produced by Joseph M. Schenck, "The General" is Keaton's first United Artists picture and is the costliest comedy ever made.
