Catholics Open Lenten Season With a Mission

The Catholic mission, which opened at St. Rita's church on Sunday, met with an enthusiastic response from the parishioners. Large congregations assembled for the solemn opening at the morning services. The reverend missionary explained the meaning of this special season of grace with a sermon on "The Master's Call," in which he delineated the necessity of such spiritual opportunities for self-introspection.

At the evening service he spoke to a large audience on the object of life. To explain the necessity of religion he examined the origin of life casting aside as unscientific the various theories as taught today by pseudo-scientists. Neither "chance" nor "accident" nor "spontaneous generation" can explain the origin of the universe and the existence of the various grades of creatures in the material, vegetable and animal kingdoms. A "super-intelligence" and by that Christians understand a "supreme intelligence" namely "God" was necessary to bring into existence the world as we see it today in all its ramifications.

"What then," asked the speaker, "was the object of this Supreme Intelligence had in view when creating intelligent, free beings?"

Under the parable of the rich man of the Gospel as given by Jesus Christ the missionary showed that none of the vagaries of this our day can satiate the human heart which is created for something far nobler than the passing, transient things of time.

"A Supreme Intelligence," he argued, "must have made man for an end and purpose worthy of Himself. Evidently nothing finite, nothing material, nothing worldly could fulfill this purpose; it must then be sought elsewhere—but can be but God Himself, and He created man, as right reason and faith teach, to know, love and serve Him here on this earth."

"We were startled recently by the large number of suicides among university and college students who plunged into eternity averring there was naught worth while in this life. The explanation of such deaths, of the murders, robberies, crimes mounting from day to day here in our land, must be attributed to this false philosophy of the origin of man and his final destiny."

The sacred orator then appealed to the audience to remember the fact that we are created, sanctified and redeemed to make of this life a passage to an afterlife where there is a reward for work well done. He concluded his lecture with the beautiful words of the poet.

"Thou art, O God, my East;
In Thee I dawned.
Thou art, O God, my North,
My trembling soul like a charmed needle
Points to Thee alone.
Thou art, O God, my South;
Thy fervent love perennial gladness
O'er my soul hath flown.
Thou art, O God, my West;
Glads as the setting sun into Thy arms
Do I descend."

This evening at 8 o'clock there will be the beads, a lecture on "The Soul's Assassin," and benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Bishop-elect R. A. Gerkin expressed himself as delighted with the fine attendance at the mission services yesterday and feels assured that his dear parishioners will make the mission a grand success.

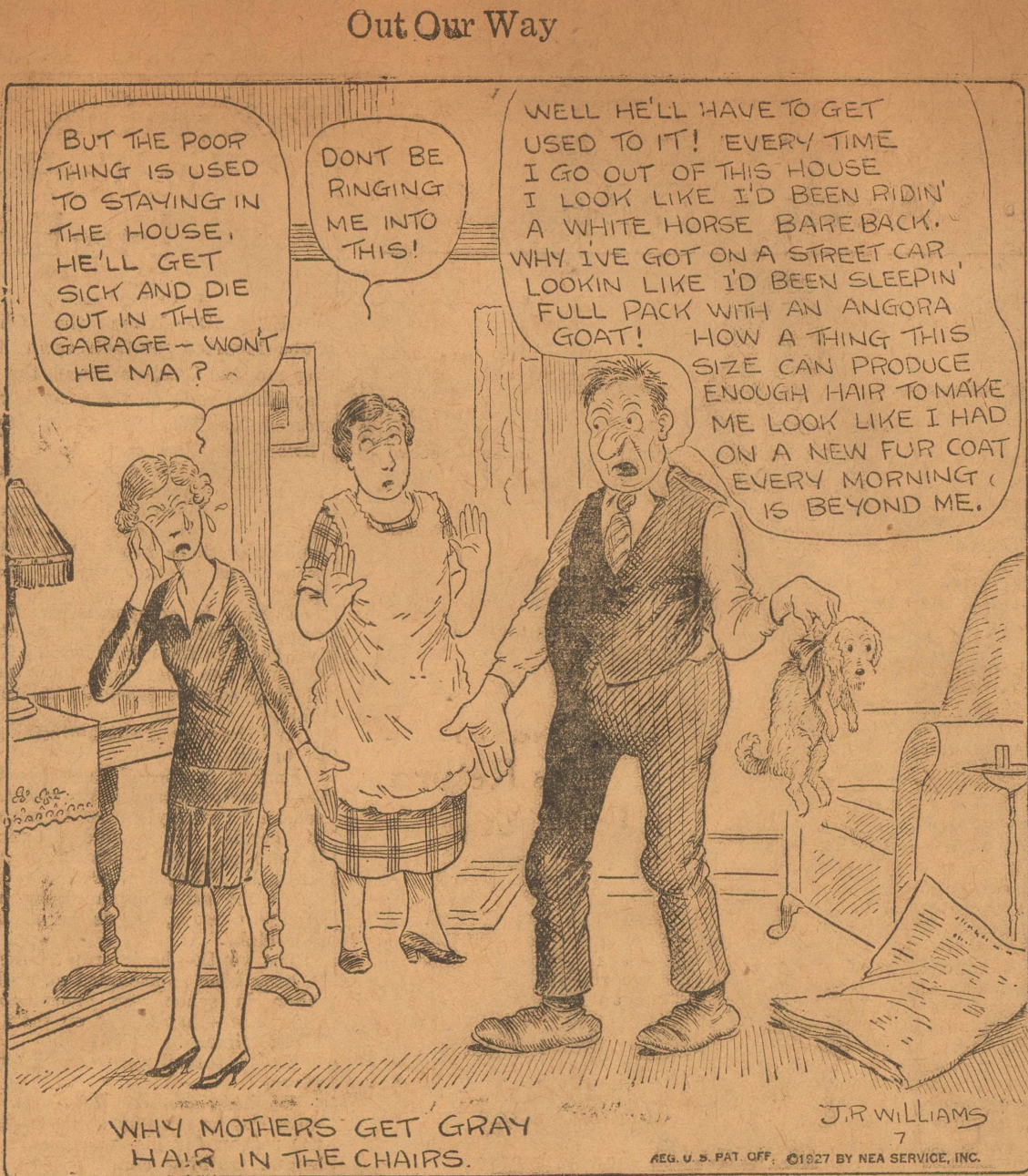
Baird Prepares Great Program For Convention

Woman Machine Operator Wins Efficiency Prize

SCHENECTADY, March 7.—Twenty-seven employees of the General Electric company were today given four shares of General Electric Common stock and certificates in the fourth annual awards by the Charles A. Coffin foundation in recognition of outstanding services performed by them during 1926.

The winners comprise nine shop workers, two foremen, eight engineers, five commercial men and three from the administrative department. They were elected from among 75,000 employees of the company by a committee headed by President Gerard Swope, the work of the machinist finding equal recognition with the achievements of electrical engineers and salesmen.

Outstanding among the awards this year, was that given Miss Florence Kuhn, the one woman to be honored and the second in the history of the foundation to be rewarded. She has been in the employ of the company less than two years as a machine operator at the Decatur, Ill., plant. This was her first factory experience.

Some time ago she was called upon to substitute for another girl employed who was ill. This work was different from what she had been doing and she could not keep up the pace set by the other girls. But she studied the process of this work which was on armatures of small washing machine motors, and developed a method of doing it faster and better. As an immediate reward she received \$100, under the company's suggestion system and was transferred to a more important position. Because of her alertness and skill in doing work to which she is unaccustomed, she is now often used as a substitute operator in various lines of work.

Chicagoan Again Champion Three Cushion Player

By United Press.
CHICAGO, March 7.—Augie Kieckhefer, a Chicagoan, who traces his lineage back to Germany, once more tops the three cushion billiard experts.
Kieckhefer, who has been knocking the ivory balls about on the felt-covered tables for a decade or so, regained the title, which he had held twice before, in the recent national three-cushion champion tournament held here.
And in this tournament he proved that there probably isn't a billiard player in the country, who goes three cushions on all shots, that can beat him over an endurance route.
During the Chicago tournament Augie had his erratic moments but he also furnished the crowd with some of the most brilliant shooting that anybody ever saw in a billiard match.
Perhaps his most outstanding performance was his finishing of three games with a record of 35 or less innings for each game.
In the final match of the tournament Kieckhefer defeated Otto Reisel, then the champion, 30-20. And to do this he ran 50 billiards in 31 innings. This despite the fact that Reisel is known as one of the best "oil"—or safety—players in the game.
In another match Kieckhefer scored his 50 points in 35 innings. In the other stellar performance he went out in 32 innings. For the entire tournament he had a grand average of one and two-fifths of a point—something unheard of in tournament billiards until the little German did it.
Kieckhefer is one of those players who shoot best under a heavy strain. Seemingly the more important a shot is, the more likely he is to make it.
Like Hoppe, Kieckhefer has the nerve to take a chance on making a tough one. Many times during the last tournament he elected to try what looked like almost impossible shots, instead of playing safe. And he it said for him he came out much the better for it.
Kieckhefer first came into national prominence in 1918. That year he annexed the national three cushion title. Six times after that he defended it against challengers, finally losing to Alfredo De Oro, 150-148.
In 1921 in a tournament at Pittsburgh he won the title again. Later he lost it to Johnny Layton in the same hall in which he won it. Layton beat him 180-173.
The present championship, to Kieckhefer, probably brought with it a taste of rather sweet revenge, for Reisel, the man he beat in the final match, had beaten him in Philadelphia about a year ago.
Incidentally Reisel ran his 50 points in 16 innings, the present world's record. Kieckhefer had 23 when Otto went out, which in itself is a cracking good showing for 16 innings.

British Movie Men Plan Fight On Americans

LONDON.—The government is planning shortly to take definite action, by parliamentary law, to compel moving picture houses here to show British films. This will mark the beginning of a determined attack against the American monopoly of the film industry.
The draft of the bill, which will probably be introduced at the present session, has for several months been in the hands of the Cinematograph Exhibitors' association, the Photographic Renters' society, and the Federation of British Industries, represented by a parliamentary committee.
It has been decided that the best way to get British film before the public is to force the renters, or those who supply and distribute pictures to the theatres, to handle a quota of British films, regardless of what merit they may have. As a beginning about 10 per cent of the total number of pictures handled will have to be British, and this quota will be increased when the producers can meet the demands.
The term "British film" is defined as one made by a British-owned and British-controlled company. The studio scenes must, as far as possible, have been taken in a British studio, and three-quarters of the salaries and wages, not including the fees paid to the directors and star, spent on the production must have been paid to persons living in Great Britain. The director and star may be foreigners, which means that American acting and direction may be used.
The burden of rehabilitating British film production will be evenly distributed on renters and exhibitors. The exhibitors have already complained about the prospect of this burden. They tried to impress the board of trade that they should be relieved of such responsibility, but they were not successful. The board of trade explained that if the quota was made obligatory only on the renters, there would be not the slightest guarantee that the pictures would reach the screen. In other words, it was foreseen that the exhibitors, if not made responsible, would sidetrack the small percentage of home production for the better box-office attractions from America.
There will not be the slightest difficulty in an American house obtaining its requisite British quota pictures. It can arrange for a corporation here to produce with British money four or five films yearly, which would meet the quota required, guarantee the corporation negative cost plus 10 per cent interest and about 50 per cent of the gross takings all over the world.
A half-dozen American films now practically control the market here and they have no intention of allowing it to be legislated out of their hand, if this can be avoided. There appears to be no reason why they cannot open British houses, as many American industries have done, and produce the genuine article over here as British.

Hollywood Greet World's Tallest Man

Liu Yu Ching, the world's tallest man, has taken the stars by storm, and is at present the center of the colony's merry whirl. When a mere youngster he ran away from a circus, and since then has done everything from cooking to acting. Right now he seems to be getting by Lorraine Eason and Thelma Hill with a whole lot of spare. Liu is well over eight and a half feet, and neither of the girls can get within a yard of him.
His last role was a large one in "Tarzan and the Golden Lion," FBO a rip-off of the famous story by Edgar Rice Burroughs.

The dewberry is called "Young" for its originator, B. M. Young, of Louisiana and bears fruit larger than the popular Lucretia variety, is much sweeter than the Logan and of an exceptionally high dessert quality, the department said.
Soil and climate in southern and southeastern states is adapted for raising this berry, which is an attractive deep wine color, according to the department.

The fans had not heard much of him before the departure and immediately there arose quite a bit of wonder as to the why of the big price.
English is comparatively a newcomer in baseball, having spent only two years in the minor league. Toledo got him two years ago when he was playing sandlot baseball in Newark, Ohio.
And the why of the big price seems to be this:
English is one of those shortstops that rarely misses a grounder. The reason he rarely misses is natural—his hands. He is said to own the largest pair of hands in organized baseball. They lap around a bat in about the same manner that an ordinary person's hands go around a golf club.
The youth—he is only 19—is said to have been so ashamed of his hands when in school—so conspicuous is their size—that he sat on them most of the time.
He is forced to wear a special glove.
He isn't ashamed of those hands now. For he proudly exhibits them as the reason for his presence in a big league training camp.

Child Raising Conference Is New Under Way

By United Press.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 7.—Practical psychology as applied to child raising is to be given a trial by representative families from 10 middle-western states.
A three-day school in parenthood which more than 2,000 fathers and mothers are expected to attend opened here today for a three-day session.
The Kansas City children's bureau and the child research of the University of Kansas, who are sponsoring the mid-west conference on education for parenthood, hope to preserve the moral and integral structure of America's youth, termed as "the nation's most valuable asset."
Strikingly modern in its nature, the three-day program of lectures will feature a score of child research and education experts from colleges and universities all over the country.
The atmosphere of the convention bears no similarity to that of the usual parent-teachers convention. Child health and feeding are left to the dietitian or family doctor; the lecturers will give advice on child training. They claim that strength of character and right habits depend more on the skill of parents in training the child than on his natural instincts and abilities.
Latest contributions from research and actual practice in the science of training a child from birth through the adolescent age will be discussed from every angle by the lecturers.
There is no reason, they claim, why a child should grow into an adult lacking the facilities that make for success. It is possible to instill aggressiveness, morality, evenness of temper or confidence into a child by proper training in early childhood, they hold.
Some of the many lecturers on the varied program are designed to point out the responsibility of the father in training of the child, as well as to appraise the efforts and achievements of the mother in the eyes of the father.
Experiments in training children under nurses in six schools will form the subject of other speeches and papers.
Among others, the specialists who will participate in the lecture program are Dr. E. A. Kirkwood, president of the state normal school at Fitchburg, Mass.; Mrs. Sidonie Gruenberg, director of the child study association of America; Dr. Helen T. Wooley, Columbia university; Prof. Hugh Mearns, University of New York; Dr. Bird T. Baldwin, Iowa child research station; Dr. Lois Hayden Meek; Patty Smith Hill, Columbia university; Dr. C. E. Germaine, University of Missouri and Dr. Ernest Groves, Boston university.

American Money Invades Canada For Investment

AMERICAN MONEY ... 24.
SYDNEY.—The economic penetration of Canada by the United States is extremely serious from the British point of view declared Sir Hugh Poynter, first cousin of the British minister, Stanley Baldwin, and Rudyard Kipling, when he arrived here to represent the Australian interests of Baldwin, Ltd., the famous English steel manufacturers. Poynter has been for the last five years managing the interests of Baldwin in Canada.
Poynter said that in Canada American money and interest could be felt everywhere, and at times it reacted with alarming financial results to British manufacturers and workers generally.

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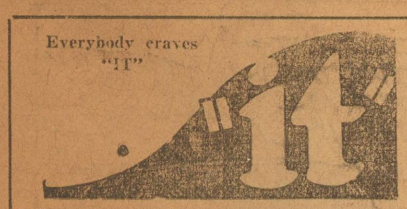
