"The ability to hear well, like the ability to do anything else, deteriorates if it is not used," stated Mrs. Nitchie. "Few persons use all their rewers of hearing. They do not concentrate their attention upon sounds. In ordinary social contacts this is not necessary, and during much of the modern business day one is trying, consciously or otherwise, to shut out distracting noises.

"Thus the power of concentration upon sounds becomes atrophied. If, in addition, one is slightly deaf, this deafness tends to be increased by the lack of effort to hear. The delicate muscles of the ear deteriorate through disuse.

"Listening to radio programs day after day both restores the ability to

after day both restores the ability to concentrate upon sounds—to listen well—and also exercises ear muscles which have become unresponsive to air vibrations. 


