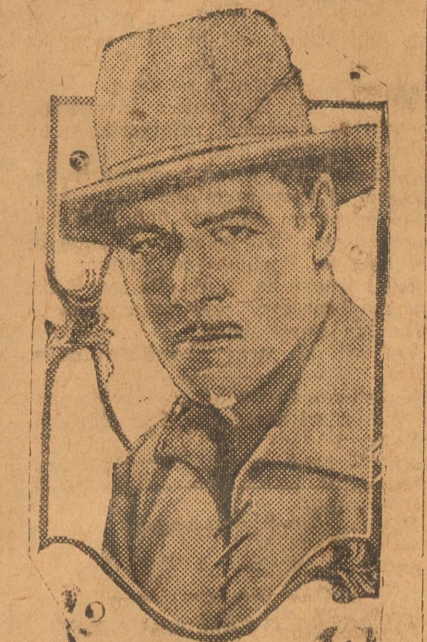

LONDON, Jan. 20.—British difficulties in China today were formally recognized as having developed major importance, when Sir Austin Chamberlain, foreign secretary, summoned Ramsay Macdonald and David Lloyd George to the foreign office to confer with him.

The opposition leaders met the foreign secretary separately, in accordance with the British tradition that the leaders of the minority parties in the house of commons be informed fully regarding serious international situations.
