## POWERS CONSIDER STRONG NOTE TO CHINA

### WASHINGTON HAS HAD NO CHANGE IN POLICY

#### Indications Are That Next Communication Will be Ultimatum

PARIS, France, April 19.—The foreign office indicated today that the powers had decided to address another note to the Chinese Nationalist foreign minister at Hankow, demanding satisfaction for last month's Nanking disorder, in stronger terms than were employed in the first note. It was suggested that the note might be in the nature of an ultimatum.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—There were further indications today that the United States government is holding out against foreign pressure for stronger joint action in China, in retaliation for the Nanking outrages.

In answer to questions regarding this government's attitude toward "unsatisfactory reply" of foreign Minister Chen to identic demands of the powers, President Coolidge authorized the statement that there is no change in American policy, namely to protect American citizens and where necessary to remove them from danger.

### Mrs. J. D. McLean Dies in Temple, Ill Many Weeks

Mrs. J. D. McLean, wife of Jimmie McLean of the Boyd Motor company, Ranger, died at the King's Daughters hospital, Temple, at 7:35 Monday night after an illness of many weeks.

The deceased is survived by her husband, a daughter by a former marriage, and her mother, who lives at Granger.

It is not known definitely in Ranger when or where the funeral will take place.

The deceased came to Ranger several years ago and was employed as a stenographer in the Ranger State bank for a short while.

It was at that time that she renewed an acquaintanceship with Jimmie McLean, which resulted in their marrying shortly afterwards. She had had fine business training and after she and Mr. McLean moved back to Ranger, following a year spent in Fort Worth, she again entered the business world, and for several months was at the Ranger Times office, where her sweet and sincere personality endeared her to every member of the force.

Mr. McLean was advised that his wife was very ill late Monday afternoon and left at once for Temple, but she had passed away before he reached there, with a heart trouble that has been troubling her for many months.

A sweet wife and mother, a loyal daughter and a true friend, standing just on the threshold of life, she laid down the affairs of this earth and entered eternity at the age of 31 years.

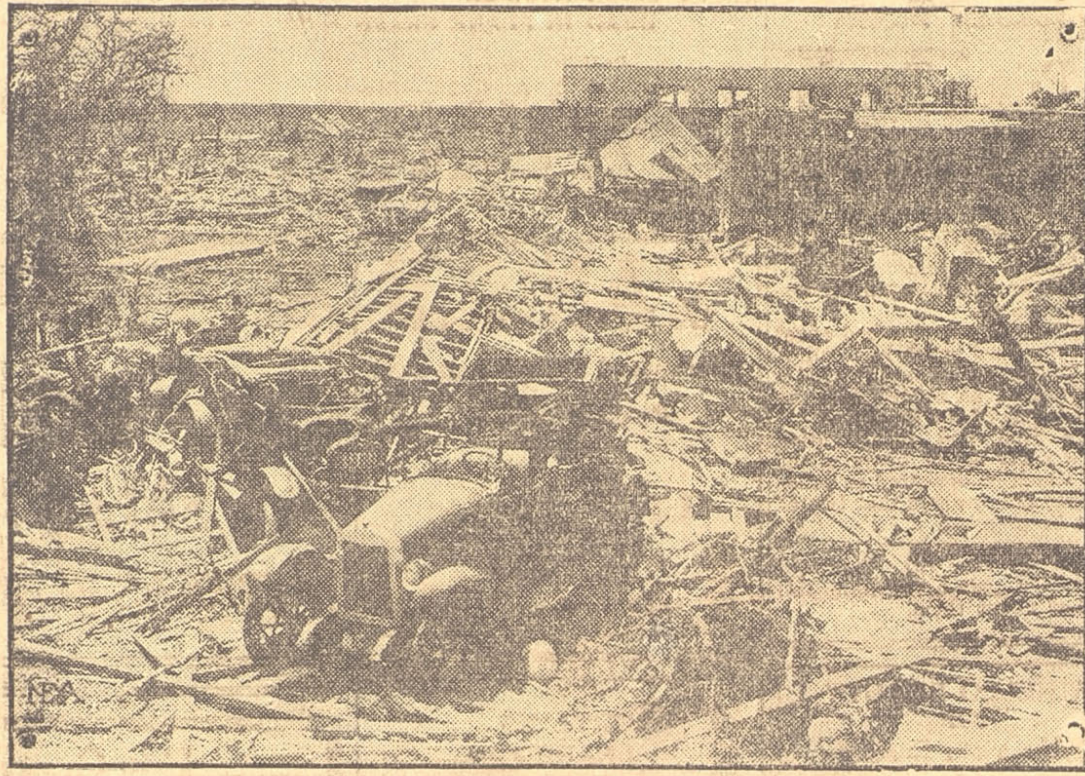
### Deputy Sheriff Hit by Sunshine Special at Clyde

Deputy Sheriff Wood of Callahan county, was perhaps fatally wounded, when he was hit by the Sunshine Special east bound train at 11:30 this morning, according to Sid J. Robinson of Robinson's studio, Ranger, who was a passenger on the train and witnessed the accident.

Wood was in his car going south and attempted to cross the north crossing at Clyde, when the train hit his car and terribly mangled him. Mr. Robinson said that his skull was fractured, and it looked to him as if he was ground almost to a pulp, but there was, when the train pulled out, still a little life left in his body.

His wife, who lived just two blocks from the grade crossing was summoned.

### Tornado Wipes Out Texas Town



Sixty-one people were killed and 150 injured when a tornado practically wiped out the little town of Rock Springs, Tex. These pictures were obtained by an NEA cameraman, who went to the scene of the disaster in an airplane. As this picture shows, wreckage was strewn all over the landscape. Before the storm an automobile agency stood on this spot. The building was demolished and several motor cars were wrecked as completely as if they had been hit by a train. The trees give mute evidence of the twister's fury.

## Two Little School Girls Drown In Russell Creek

### Touring Car in Which Teachers and Pupils Were Riding Swept From Bridge Late Monday by Swollen Stream; Three Men Nearby Fail in Heroic Efforts to Rescue Entire Party

Eula, aged 14, and Edith, aged 8, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Campbell, who live near the Cross Roads school, about three and one-half miles from Ranger, were drowned yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, when a Ford touring car, in which they were coming home from school, with their sister, two school teachers, and another child, was swept off the bridge into the swollen waters of Russell creek.

The body of the youngest child was found soon after the accident and every effort was made to resuscitate her, but to no avail. The older girl was found about a mile and three-quarters down the stream, and it was said that when she was found one leg was caught by a large rock.

The three Campbell children, Edith, Eula and Cora, aged 10, with their aunt, Miss Pattie C. Wright, a teacher at Cross Roads school, and another Cross Roads teacher, W. J. Bulgier, and his daughter, 10, were returning from school, Bulgier driving the car.

### Another Victim Of Rock Springs Storm Reported

SAN ANTONIO, April 19.—Death has taken another Rock Springs storm victim in the person of Mrs. Rosa De La Fuentes, 43, who died in a hospital here. She was the mother of Benito Fuentes, 6, who died Sunday. Death of the injured here totaled 12, bringing the storm toll to 59. Three other storm victims are reported near death.

### Whole County In Southwest Texas Swept by Storm

AUSTIN, April 19.—The entire length of Gillespie county was swept late Monday by a tornado which did extensive damage to property, cattle, sheep and goats. So far as is known no one was injured.

The town of Fredericksburg, escaped damage, the path of the twister being some miles from it.

HARPER, Texas, April 19.—Harper suffered severe damage late Monday by a tornado that unroofed houses and cut a path 100 yards wide between here and the Shriner ranch near Kerrville, a distance of 20 miles. Harper is in Gillespie county. No injuries have been reported.

### RANGER MAN GETS NOTICE OF GRANDSON

### Two Are Killed In Cyclone That Hits Near Paris

PARIS, Texas, April 19.—The casualty list of the twister which struck Arthur City, 15 miles north of here, early today increased to two known dead, as reports came here from across the state line in Oklahoma. Frank Williams, 18, was killed just across the Red River in the path of the cyclone. Robert Craven was killed at Arthur City.

### Storm Destroys Residences And Injures One Man

SA NANTONIO, April 19.—One man was critically injured and his family escaped almost by a miracle when a tornado destroyed three residences five miles from Devine last night.

Devine is 25 miles southwest of San Antonio, and 95 miles from Rock Springs, destroyed by tornado Tuesday night.

H. C. Young, dangerously injured, was brought to San Antonio for attention. The storm cut a path 300 yards wide.

### CORSICANA BUSINESS MAN IS FOUND DEAD

### RED CROSS IS SEEKING \$25,000 FUND

#### No Relief Before End of Present Week Says the Weather Forecast

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Mississippi valley floods today had driven 25,000 persons from their homes and the Red Cross, calling for \$25,000 relief contribution, termed the disaster a major one for the first time. Meanwhile the weather bureau forecast new flood crest levels for tonight or tomorrow with no definite drop in sight before the end of the week.

### THORPE WELL MAKES 2,200 BARRELS DAY

The Thorpe No. 1 well of the Mc-Lester Oil corporation in the Ramsower pool is proving to be one of the wonders. With the bit driven but six inches deeper, production has increased to 2,200 barrels a day, according to information received in Eastland late Monday afternoon. In addition to making 2,200 barrels of oil, it also is spouting around 4,000,000 cubic feet of gas that is testing three gallons. This well is about eight miles northwest of Eastland.

Just what the Thorpe well eventually make is not known. The increase of the flow of the well has caused several new locations to be made by Gordon et al. The Ramsower pool now is expected to get the biggest play in this section.

The Good No. 1 of Davison et al., now is down 2,230 feet and is running true to form of other producers in that field. This well is an offset to the gusher.

The Watson well of Root-Fehl et al., that was given a dose of nitro shows practically no change.

Announcement was made by G. A. Davison late Monday afternoon that the Phillips well, two miles east of Eastland on the highway, will be plugged. The available production by pumping even from the lower Ranger sand found, is not sufficient to make it pay expenses.

The latest advice from the Spencer well are to the effect that it is making 33 barrels an hour from the 2,995-foot level.

### MODERATE LEADER MAY PROCLAIM GOVERNMENT

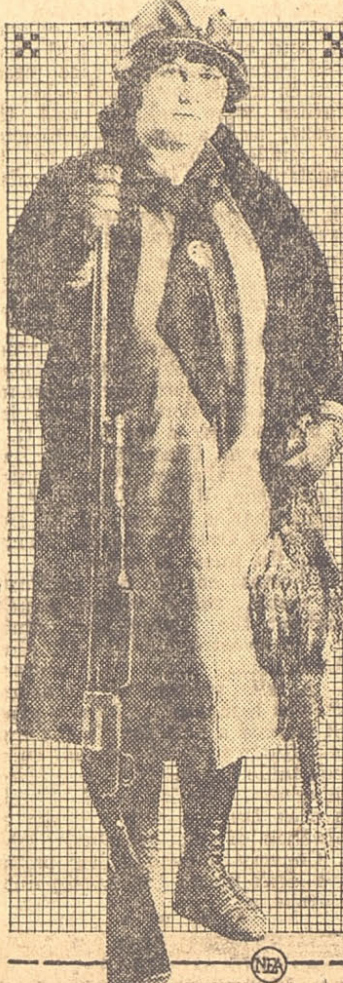
### Try Quits They Are Far Better Than the Quarts

### MADDOCKS SAYS MORE HOMES RANGER'S NEED

(Editor's Note—For months, yes, for years, the cry has been going up in the city of Ranger for more and better homes. Here is the same cry sounded again by one of the city's leading business men. The series of stories instituted by the Times on the city's needs has already accomplished good. A few days ago a minister called attention to the need of closing places of business on Sunday that employes might attend church services. As a result 17 filling stations closed yesterday.)

C. E. Maddocks, insurance and real estate man of Ranger, was interviewed as to his opinion of Ranger's greatest need.

"Ranger needs more homes to be built," Mr. Maddocks said. "We have only one desirable modern house for rent on our list at present, and it will be gobbled up before morning."

"We have calls for every day from would-be renters and the supply of rent houses in Ranger has never equaled the demand."

"Somebody ought to build some rent houses—nice ones, with lawns and sidewalks, and the things that make a house look like a home. They would bring in a good revenue year in and year out as the rent price hardly ever fluctuates in Ranger. In fact rents are too high in Ranger and there is a good field for some one to build some rent houses here, rent at a reasonable figure, and derive a nice income from them," he said.

"There never has been a time in Ranger that one could not find a renter for a modern attractive house, and there will never be a time when one will go begging."

"I am glad to see people building better homes, but everybody can't build or own their own home and I think right now the greatest need in Ranger is more and better rent houses, so that when a man pays say \$50 a month for a house, he will get a house that is a real home in every sense of the word. That's stiff rent for the average man and a place that rents that high should be worth the money."

Mr. Maddocks has charge of many rent houses in Ranger and he has been in the business for a number of years, but he says there is never a day but what somebody wants to rent a house in Ranger.

### REPORTS SAY ATHLETIC ROW TO BLAME

#### Bizzell, President Of Oklahoma University Is One Possibility

AUSTIN, April 19.—Names mentioned in connection with selection of a successor to Dr. W. M. W. Splawn, as president of the University of Texas whose resignation to the board of regents was received and accepted Monday night, includes Dr. E. C. Barker, professor of history, and Dean H. Y. Benedict, who has been connected with the institution many years and also Dr. W. B. Bizzell, president of Oklahoma university. It was said today that the regents would make an effort to select the president from the faculty.

The resignation of Dr. Splawn was a surprise to the board of regents faculty and student body. It is effective Sept. 1, 1927.

Dr. Splawn said his purpose in resigning was that he be returned to the position of professor of economics which he held when elected president, July 5, 1927. His request was complied with.

The president's salary is \$10,000 per year. As professor of economics Dr. Splawn's salary will be \$4,500. He was recently appointed a member of the railroad arbitration board. Disagreement over the athletic policy in the university is said to have prompted Dr. Splawn to resign and has also caused Ed Howard, publisher of the Wichita Falls Daily Times, named as a member of the board of regents, to threaten to withdraw from the board, it was learned today.

Much Gasoline Is Going to Storage Outlook is Good

With the wholesale price of gasoline remaining unchanged and no prospects of an immediate advance or decline, the movement to storage continues heavy and the demand is good with prospects of improvement as the open season advances. The movement to storage tanks is unusually heavy, according to information given out in Eastland by large manufacturers.

It is stated from authoritative sources that several of the largest manufacturers of both motor fuels and natural gas stocks are not supplying the trade with more than has been contracted for and are placing the bulk of the supply in storage. Contracts for delivery in 60 days are taken, but are not solicited.

The advent of the open season is expected to not only increase the demand for gasoline, but also to strengthen the market. The stocks of motor fuel show a decline while the demand shows an increase. Not only do the storage stocks show a dropping off as compared with last year, but the price is far below.

Quite a number of the big concerns are buying stocks for storage while the price is below the actual cost of production, believing it a good investment, because of the anticipated demand later in the summer.

### Ford Attorneys To Ask Mistrial In Big Libel Suit

Ground for the move is understood to be alleged prejudice of a woman juror. It is known that one of the women members of the jury was brought before Judge Raymond late yesterday and questioned.

Trial of the case was continued today until Thursday because of the illness of Senator Reed, council for Ford.

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## Recommend Ray Sentence 5 Years Be Suspended

After deliberating for almost 20 hours the jury in the case of Togo Ray returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter as per the agreement with the state's attorney and fixed the punishment at five years in the penitentiary. The jury recommended that the sentence be suspended. This morning Judge George L. Davenport had them brought into the court room and questioned them about the chances of their getting together. The foreman stated that they stood 5 to 7 on one issue. The court sent them back to deliberate further.

The issue on which the jury had so far failed to agree is believed to be that of a suspension of sentence. Ray, who is charged with murder, was tried once and got a sentence of 15 years. At the beginning of the trial this week defense attorneys and the state's attorneys agreed on a manslaughter charge and Ray went to trial with that understanding.

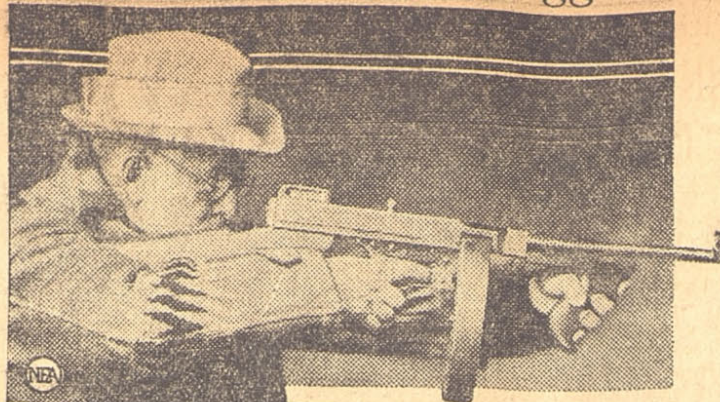

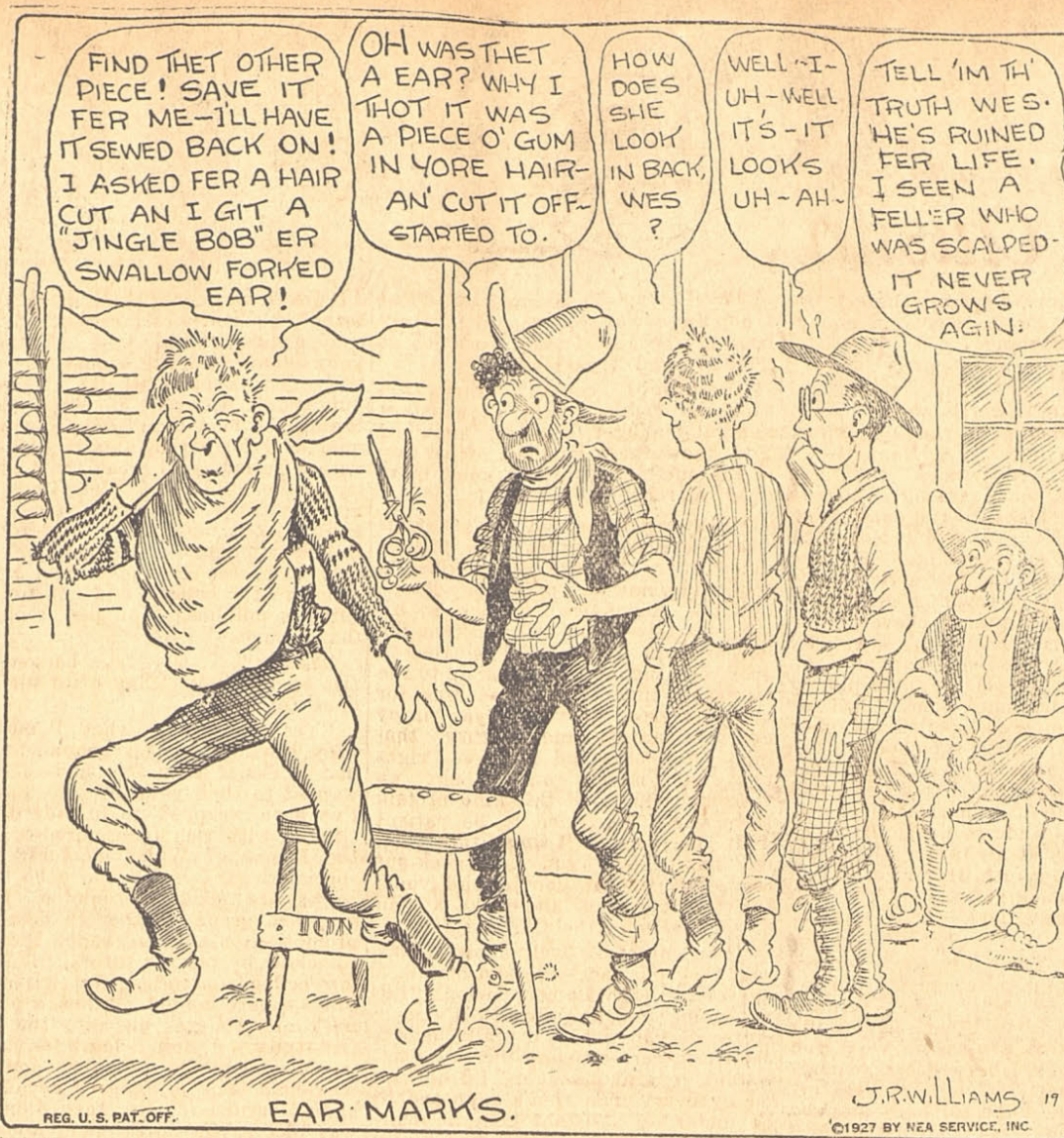

### Swing to Smith Big Talk Now In Some Sections

By RODNEY DUTCHER, NEA Service Writer. WASHINGTON.—One hears that Governor Al Smith is gaining strength within the democratic party and that he is more likely to be nominated than anyone else. An attempt has been begun to identify him to the public with at least one national issue, the hydro-electric power issue, and it is not unlikely that Governor Al's scope will be similarly broadened as the time draws nigh for the party to deposit in someone's hands the little red apple which last turned to a decayed raspberry in the hands of the estimable John W. Davis. In these days prior to convening of the next congress one man's hazy conjecture is as good as another's, but it is hard to believe that Smith's nomination is as nearly certain as many insistent persons would have us all believe. The swing to Smith may be in progress, but various obstacles remain. And there are those who will stick as many more obstacles into his path as they can.

Millions of democrats would almost rather take poison than a candidate from New York. Some of this feeling doubtless is traceable to a stupid hatred of New York and all its works. Bitter memories of the last national convention intensified the sentiment. But there is much more to it than that. "The democrats," says an important southern politician, "haven't had an electoral vote from New York since 1892, except in 1912, when the republican party was split. "The same is true of New Jersey, where the democrats couldn't even win for Wilson in 1916. "We haven't had an electoral vote from Illinois since 1892 and that was the only time since the civil war. "We haven't had one from Rhode Island since 1912. "Never in the history of the party have we had an electoral vote from Massachusetts, except in 1912. "We haven't had one from Pennsylvania since 1912. "Nor from Delaware, except in 1912, since 1892. "We're not afraid of losing with either Smith or McAdoo. If McAdoo wins he will have a better than fighting chance to win with the vote of the south and west, discarding the north-east. If Smith is nominated, we might well win with a combination of southern, western and northeastern states and will lose some of the doubtful states. "But we've got to be shown that Mr. Smith can do better for us than Mr. McAdoo." Speaking of the progressive vote, however, it should be added that some of the late Senator LaFollette's best friends here are confident that Smith, if nominated, would inherit virtually every vote that was cast for the LaFollette-Wheeler ticket in 1924.
