





**Evidence Shows That Ranger Has** Steady Growth

Since Jan. 1, 25 new taps have been made in Ranger by the water works department. Since July, 1925, an increase of 212 taps are to be noted. These figures do not include additional numbers of users who already had water connections and were not using them, that now are using them.

In the past few months a num-ber of homes are using the city water that had connections and were not using it. The growth of business of the water works department has made it possible for the city to retire \$5,000 worth of bonds, more than pay running expenses of the department and put

a surplus in the treasury. Because of certain conditions handed down from former admin istrations the increase in the num ber of water users does not reflect the growth of Ranger. There is not a vacant house in Ranger that is habitable and very few busi-ness houses are available.

In his youth he decided to dedicate his life to the service of God and enter priesthood, and pre-paration for this important step was begun in his early years. He start-ed his normal course in the Catholic Normal school at St. Francis, Wis-conson, and completed it in St. Jos-onk's college. Texas, after which he went Scotland, Texas, after which he went to Dallas, Texas, where he studied philosophy. Completing this branch he entered Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis, and during the next four years studied theology. On June 6, 1917, he left St. Louis for Dallas, where he was ordained on June 10th by Bishop Lynch. Three other young priests were ordained at the same time, two being from Dallas, Rev. Joseph O'Donnahue, a convert and Rev. Frank O'Brien.
