BROWNWOOD, March 6.—George W. Page, for eight years superintendent of the public schools here, has resigned, effective at the close of the present term. He has been instrumental in building up the city schools and his resignation was accepted with regret.

BUY UP MOVIES

BRECKENRIDGE, March 6.—John Victor of Abilene, formerly of Breckenridge, and R. A. Landis of Cleburne, have closed negotiations by which they have bought all moving picture theatres here from Ray Sinner of Dallas and Tom Carraway of Breckenridge. The consideration is said to be about \$40,000. Dawes May Enlist People's Aid

CHARGES HOUSE AIMLESSLY KILLS VALUABLE TIME

Representative Bobbitt Demands That Amnesty Move Cease Blocking Legislation

AUSTIN, March 6.—The clash between opponents and proponents of the Ferguson amnesty measure was climaxed today with the introduction of a resolution by Representative Bobbitt calling upon the body to "get down to business and cease school-boy tactics to delay legislation for all the people of Texas." His resolution charged that dilatory tactics had been practiced for several days in the house by partisans seeking to advance the amnesty bill above educational and other needed measures.

In a heated speech Bobbitt charged that the house generally knew the amnesty bill was unconstitutional and void, in accordance with the attorney general's ruling, but many legislators were moved to lend an ear to the appeal lest needful legislation be defeated or rejected as punishment for those failing to support the amnesty bill.

Speaker Satterwhite ruled that the introduction of the resolution brought the amnesty bill up for discussion, but that no action could be taken on the bill. Further discussion of the resolution was promised for this afternoon's session, the house voting to recess after refusing to adjourn.

To adjourn would have blocked further consideration of the resolution.

C. B. & Q. ENTERS TEXAS COUNTRY

Charter Is Granted Burlington Interests for Plains Country Road.

AUSTIN, March 6.—The Fort Worth & Denver South Plains Railway company papers of incorporation of state late yesterday. The charter authorizes construction of a railway line beginning at Esterline, in Hall county, on the Fort Worth & Denver, southwesterly through Hall, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Swisher, Lubbock, Castro and Crosby counties. Signers of the application for charter include directors of the Fort Worth & Denver and Hale Holden and C. G. Burnham of Chicago, president and executive vice president of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad.

The proposed line of railway appears in line with the policy of the Burlington interests to seek a share of the plains country traffic which the proposed Texas, Panhandle & Gulf railway wishes to obtain for its own. Three Fort Worth banks are represented among the incorporators.

WARREN RE-ENDORSED

WASHINGTON, March 6.—The nomination of Charles B. Warren of Michigan to be attorney general of the United States was again ordered favorably reported by the senate judiciary committee today. No action was to be taken without a roll call.

Ranger Election Is Ordered For April 7

Formal order for a municipal election, April 7, to select a mayor and four commissioners for the city of Ranger, to serve during the next two years, was issued today by Mayor R. H. Hodges and City Secretary C. A. Love. The polling place is to be at the Ranger city hall and the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. The following election officials are named: John M. Chelton, presiding judge; H. P. Earnest and Marvin K. Collier, judges; A. N. Larson, Clyde Kilpatrick and Grady Davenport, clerks.

Public Sends Congratulatory Messages Endorsing Dawes' Senatorial Reforms

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Vice President Charles G. Dawes may carry his demand for revision of the senate rules to the country. Unmoved by the hazing he has been subjected to, Dawes through the summer may deliver a series of speeches to explain his stand.

Dawes has been encouraged by commendation he has received from government officials, members of the house of representatives and telegrams from citizens all over the country.

A vice president is expected to fill speaking engagements which the president feels should be filled and in case the president personally cannot attend. This will give Dawes a chance to smash back at his critics. He is not permitted to speak in the senate under the rules.

At present Dawes has no intention of answering his critics, because he does not wish to be placed in the attitude of seeking publicity. The very rules of the senate, which "Hell in Maria" so vigorously assailed in his inaugural address, bar

him from further utterance except in the regular course of his duties as presiding officer.

No provision is made for him to speak on any subject except interpretation and enforcement of procedure.

Resentment over the inaugural speech of Vice President Dawes, in which he demanded of the senate that it revise its rules, broke out on the floor when the upper house convened in special session Thursday.

With Dawes personally in the chair, Senator Reed of Missouri, democrat, and Senator Ashurst of Arizona, democrat, found opportunity to "razz" the vice president on points of personal privilege, although they were not able to make speeches of condemnation because there was no official business before the senate.

Senators Watson of Indiana and Curtis of Kansas joined Senators Reed and Ashurst in introducing a resolution condemning Dawes for his unwelcome attempt at removing antiquated red tape.

DENIES KILLING MRS. ANDERSON

Palestine Engineer, in Dallas Jail, Declares Innocence of Wife Murder.

DALLAS, March 6.—W. A. Anderson, I. G. N. engineer, accused of killing his wife at Palestine, was lodged in the Dallas county jail today for safe keeping. He denied killing his wife. She was found with her throat cut.

PALESTINE, March 6.—W. A. Anderson, I. G. N. passenger engineer alleged to have confessed to the murder of his wife whose body was found in a bedroom in their home here Wednesday, her throat cut and head crushed, is not held in the Anderson county jail, according to reports. Anderson is said to have made his confession on the stipulation that he be held in an adjoining county jail. Authorities late Thursday refused to divulge Anderson's whereabouts.

MINERS HAVE CLOSE ESCAPE

Seventeen Men Overcome By Bad Aid, Following Shot in Workings.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 6.—Seventeen men overcome by bad air were rescued today from Peabody mine at Riverton, a mining town near here, after reports of an explosion had been circulated. Presence of the bad air in the shaft is believed due to a "window shot" last night in which a short firer was overcome by the fumes and a mine examiner injured. The 17 men left in the mine following the escape of their 83 companions were carried to the hospital where they were revived.

WILLIAM BREWER ENDS ACTIVE LIFE

Pioneer West Texas Odd Fellow and Mason Dead at 81.

William James Brewer, formerly a citizen of Gorman in this county and known to many Odd Fellows and Masons of this section, died at the home of his son in Dallas Tuesday at the age of 81 years. "Uncle Billy" as he was familiarly called by those who knew him, had been an Odd Fellow for 61 years. He was twice grand chaplain of the grand lodge of Texas, I. O. O. F., and was for 15 years a member of the committee on secret work of the order.

Mr. Brewer came to Texas alone when he was 14 years old, settling near Weatherford. He enlisted in the civil war and served until it ended. For 20 years following the war he lived in Missouri where he owned and operated lead mines. It was while engaged in the mining business that his eyesight was injured by an explosion. This injury to his eyes finally resulted in his becoming totally blind.

In spite of his blindness Mr. Brewer spent 20 years traveling alone over Texas giving lectures and conducting schools on the work of Odd Fellowship. He is survived by three sons and four daughters. The body will be taken to Rising Star, Texas, following funeral services at Dallas, Saturday. A second funeral service will be held at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon at Rising Star with the Odd Fellows of Gorman in charge.

Firemen's Efforts Minimize Fire Loss

Excellent work of the Ranger firemen, virtually saved the entire lower floor of the R. M. Davenport residence in Highland park, Ranger, from flames Thursday afternoon which started on the upper floor through defective wiring, and damaged the roof of the building and walls of the second story so they will have to be replaced. All furniture on the second floor of the building was damaged by flames, but nearly everything on the lower floor was saved, although some of it was damaged by water and smoke. The building was valued between \$10,000 and \$15,000 and was insured for \$4,000. The furniture, valued at \$8,000 to \$8,000, was insured for \$2,000. The water pressure was weak when water first was turned on the fire, due to failure to keep the standpipe on Eastland hill properly filled, but it was sufficient to keep one line going. An effort to run two streams of water from one hose failed. Fire Chief Murphy said today the fire was doubtless due to defective wiring of oil boom days, when less heed was given to efficiency than now.

SIX KILLED WHEN TRAIN STRIKES AUTO

WILLIAMSPORT, Ind., March 6.—Six persons were killed here today when their automobile was struck by a car. The dead are: Mrs. Roby Bodine, 23, Williamsport; Miss Clara Hurd, 21, cousin of Mrs. Bodine; Marysville, Ohio; Gertrude Bodine, 5; Mabel Bodine, 3; Ellsworth Bodine, 6 months; Fred Bodine Jr., 18 months. The children were sons and daughters of Mrs. Bodine.

Bossie Is Liberal With Lactal Fluid

Mrs. R. J. Taylor, living on the Bankhead highway several miles east of Ranger, has a Jersey cow which is giving 7 1-2 gallons of milk daily. "The milk given by this cow on Thursday weighed 60 1-4 pounds," said Mrs. Taylor. The cow is six years old and recently gave birth to her fourth calf. Mrs. Taylor said the cow had been a splendid milk and butter producer ever since giving birth to her first calf.

SEVEN CAUGHT ON AUTO LAWS

County Officer Hammet Gets Busy Enforcing Traffic Regulations

Seven arrests, all for speeding, were made Thursday afternoon on the Bankhead highway between Ranger and Eastland by County Motor Traffic Officer Hammet. "All were men," said Hammet today. "Of course I would arrest a woman for speeding just as quickly as a man, for it is the law violation I see and not the driver, but as it happens nearly all the speeders are men."

Hammet said he had been warning all persons driving cars with mufflers open or not equipped with mufflers that mufflers are required by law, and failure to use them on the highway would result in arrests. "I have been giving warnings," he said, "tomorrow I shall make arrests."

Children Start Fire

The Ranger firemen answered a call to Ranger heights at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Children playing with matches had set fire to the dry grass and residents became alarmed at the spread of the flames. The firemen soon had the blaze put out and returned to the station, but somewhere they overlooked a spark, for at 2:15 o'clock the fire had got started again and they had to go back with the truck and spread some more water over the top of the hill.

SENATE PASSES TAX REMITTANCE MEASURE

AUSTIN, March 6.—Senator Parr's bill, to remit for a period of 25 years, 25 per cent of the state tax collected in Cameron county to enable that county to raise \$1,500,000 for a flood control fund, was passed finally by the house late Thursday, 32 to 31. The recent visit of the lawmakers to the lower Rio Grande valley is said to have enlightened them relative to the need of flood control and changed a number from opposition to support of the measure.

WEEKS DEMOTES MITCHELL AS HE PLANS SAFETY

Recognized Highest Aviation Authority Fired As He Plans Country's Protection.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—Acting on Secretary Weeks' recommendation, President Coolidge sent Sechert's nomination to the senate at noon today.

FORTRESS MONROE, Va., March 6.—Thirty army airplanes dropping 100-pound bombs containing heavy explosives demolished an army post built and heavily garrisoned by the imagination here today.

Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant chief of the army air service, in a fast pursuit plane, directed the experiments.

As Mitchell came back and stepped out of his plane, Lieutenant Moffett, one of his associates, notified him he was to be superseded by Lieut. Colonel Sechert, as assistant chief.

"I will abide by any decision of the war department with regard to myself," was Mitchell's only comment.

Senate, Through Night Sessions, May Finish Prison Probe Saturday

AUSTIN, March 6.—Night sessions of the senate will be carried on until all testimony of a corroborative nature to be heard on the state penitentiary probe shall be completed, it was agreed at the opening session Thursday night. Only additional or new testimony will be heard on the probe, acting as a committee of the whole. Chairman A. J. Wirtz of Seguin explained as an effort will be made to wind up the hearing at Saturday's session.

FIREMEN TO BE GIVEN WELCOME

Eastland and Ranger Preparing to Entertain Visiting Delegates.

Chambers of commerce of both Eastland and Ranger are preparing to co-operate with the fire departments of the two towns to entertain a large number of fire department officials from throughout the state who will stop over at the various West Texas cities when they attend the forty-ninth annual convention of Texas firemen at Cisco May 11, 12 and 13, according to Fire Chief Murphy of Ranger and Chief Fred Michael of Eastland. Sweetwater, Abilene, Weatherford and other towns are also arranging entertainment for the visiting firemen in their brief stops at those towns, it is stated. Chief Fred Michael of the Eastland fire department announces that the Chamber of Commerce had agreed to look after entertaining the visitors in Eastland on the occasion of the forty-ninth annual convention of firemen's meet in Cisco on May 11, 12 and 13. Fire Chief Michael of Eastland has received a letter from Olin Culbertson of Hillsboro, secretary of the state association, advising him that all railroads of the state would furnish free transportation to all regular accredited delegates from their home towns to Cisco and return. A letter from the Brenham fire department to the Eastland department, states that Chief E. P. Davis of the Brenham department, was being urged for fourth vice president of the state organization. Mr. Davis is a member of the committee on standardization of hose couplings and will have charge of the races at the Cisco meeting.

ALLEGED OIL STOCK SWINDLER CAPTURED

KANSAS CITY, March 6.—Warrants charging use of mails to defraud in the sale of alleged fake oil stock were issued here today for J. S. Trowbridge, cashier of Courson & Matches. L. H. Courson, a member of the firm is under arrest in San Antonio on similar charges, according to George M. Hunter, secretary of the eBtter Business bureau, which uncovered alleged unlawful stock sales carried on by the company.

PARIS, March 6.—Gloria Swanson, American movie star, today was discharged from the hospital to which she had been confined with a serious illness nearly four weeks. She has gone to Versailles for a brief vacation and plans to sail March 18 for New York.

WORLD'S RECORD TRIO COMING TO RELAY CONTEST

By LLOYD GREGORY AUSTIN.—Three world record holders, one of whom is also a 1924 Olympic champion, will be included in the ten-man team Harry Gill, famed coach of Illinois university, will bring to the Texas relay games to be held in Austin, March 27. Definite assurance of the entry of the Illinois team has just been received by L. Theo. Belmont, varsity athletic director.

Coach Gill will enter four-man teams in at least three of the five relays open to university athletes. Competition will be staged in two mile, one mile, one-half mile, one-fourth mile and a mile and seven-eighths relay races.

Strongest Man Coming. Heading the Illinois team, undoubtedly the strongest team in the middle west, will be Dan Kinsey, holder of the world's record for the 75-yard indoor high hurdles, and Olympic 110 meter high hurdle champion. The other world record holders on the Illinois team are: Dean Brownell, veteran pole vaulter, who holds the world record for the indoor pole vault, and "Bud" Evans, who holds world records for the 200 meter and 220 yard dashes on a one-turn track.

Champion High Jumper. Other outstanding athletes on the Illinois team will be: Wallace, a half-mile, and Barnes, pole vaulter. A former Illinois university star, who is also a world record holder, will compete in the person of Harold Osborne, high jumping champ of the globe, and winner of the 1924 Olympic decathlon. Ray holds the record leap of 6 feet 8-1/4 inches for the high jump.

Coach Gill of the Illinois team ranks with the greatest track coaches in the country. His track and field combinations have won national college titles a number of times. Gill, himself, was a national champ in several track and field events when he took up coaching at Illinois some twenty years ago.

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

The program, although yet in its incipency, promises much. The committee on novelties is arranging the poultry pageant. The committee is headed by O. R. Brady, a poultry

raiser, and includes Dr. C. C. Craig, Raymond Teel, W. W. Housewright and J. B. Heister, all fun-making specialists, there is no telling to what height of the sublime and ridiculous it may soar.

Ranger poultry raisers, meeting last night, took into account that only seven months separate the present from the opening of the chicken carnival and determined to lose no time. Each chairman was instructed to be ready with a tentative program at the next meeting, Thursday night, March 19.

Plan Film Exhibit.

Mrs. R. J. Taylor, chairman of the educational program, named W. A. Ratliff and Ed Jones on her committee. She expects to arrange both a speaking program and a movie exhibit of chicken farming. D. W. Maloon is to be assisted by Dr. R. H. Hodges, R. S. Balch and A. Daventport in providing buildings, grounds and concessions. They must provide quarters for the show, arenas for the battles of the game birds and concessions for other attractions.

Variety of Exhibits.

J. W. Sanders, who with W. C. Gorman and Tim Woods, is to arrange for a display of utility fowls, suggested that each poultry raiser donate a pen of four pullets and one cockerel, to be displayed in the various Ranger stores, which will be given as prizes to members of boys and girls poultry clubs. The competitions for these pens are yet to be arranged. Mr. Sanders said he proposes to give five of his choicest birds.

One or more model poultry houses may be built and displayed at vantage points in Ranger. Ratliff and Jones said they would provide the chicken sandwiches to be given away free during one hour of the week as an added attraction at one of the exhibits.

Just to present a contrast between the blooded and scrub stock, it was suggested that a special prize be given for the pen of six most "onery" chickens exhibited.

Will Show Full Week

It will take some planning to arrange a full week for the chicken carnival, but Ranger poultry raisers believe it can be arranged. In addition to the poultry displays C. E. Slack, Ranger's lone pigeon fancier, promises to have an exhibit of pigeons that will demonstrate what it is possible to accomplish in this line.

Poultry interests in Eastland county promise to become very extensive and Ranger's poultry breeders are determined that the first chicken carnival in Texas, staged in Ranger, shall attract visitors from far and near and that none who attend will be disappointed.

A committee consisting of O. R. Brady, O. S. Driskill, and J. R. Sanders was named to go before the Ranger Rotarians, the Ranger Lions and the Retail Merchants association and invite the members to attend the meeting of the poultry raisers Thursday night, March 19, and join them in making the chicken carnival a success.

DATE FRUIT CUP.



HIGHER COURT AFFIRMS RISING STAR VICTORY

The supreme court of Texas has affirmed the judgment of the court of civil appeals in the suit originally brought by the city of Rising Star against J. M. Dill, decided against the defendant and appealed by him. The suit was a test case to determine the right of taxpayers in Rising Star to resist payment of taxes on the ground that Rising Star had no lawful right to make such a tax levy and the taxes were unlawfully assessed. Joe F. Orr and Marshall McCullough of Eastland were the attorneys for Rising Star.
