CENSORSHIP IS ESTABLISHED IN MEXICO

OUTBREAKS REPORTED OVER WIDE AREA

Only Government And Diplomatic Messages Are Uncensored Now

MEXICO CITY, April 22.—Harassed by outbreaks of rebel bands in widely scattered parts of the country the Mexican Government today was censoring all outgoing telegrams and cable messages except those of a government or diplomatic nature.

WOMAN GUILTY MANSLAUGHTER GIVEN 10 YEARS

FREEMAN, N. J., April 22.—Mrs. Christina Stovle, who killed her 16 year old daughter when she found her with a new born babe in her arms, was found guilty today of manslaughter by a jury which deliberated approximately 19 hours.

The case of the mother who shot her daughter to avoid the disgrace and humiliation which she thought had been brought on the family was disposed of by the court in less than three days.

The defense was a stirring plea for suspension of judgment due to the state of mind at the time of shooting. Counsel pictured to the jury the action of the mother when she discovered what had happened to her daughter and argued that her mind was broken down and that she acted strangely to all maternal impulses.

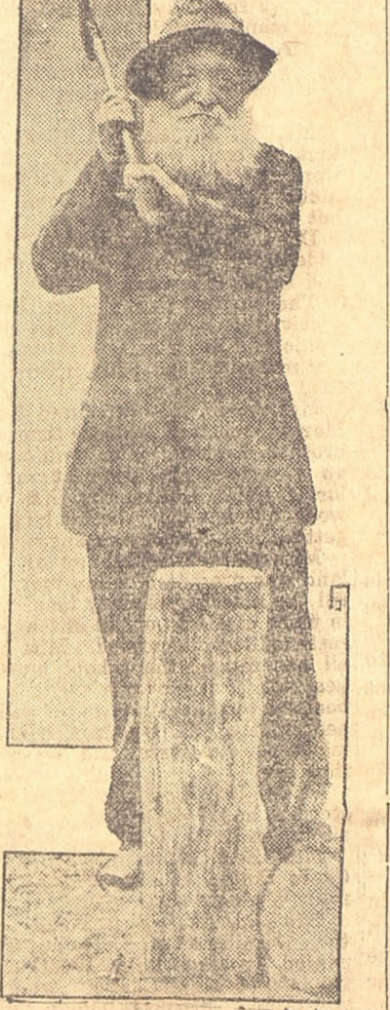

POTASH.
The United States bureau of mines has awarded the contract for the drilling of two more potash test wells in the great potash bearing region of western Texas and New Mexico. These two tests are to be drilled in southeastern New Mexico.

No doubt two or three potash tests by the government would already be going down in western Texas had it not been for a joker that crept into the bill appropriating money for that purpose, said a joker providing that the owners of land on which the tests were to be drilled should bear the expense of the drilling.

Western Texas counties are known to be underlain with vast stores of this valuable mineral salt, as it has been encountered in large beds in test wells drilled for oil. It has been estimated that potash deposits in the western part of this state are far larger and richer than are the famous potash beds of the German empire.

West Texas may expect some day to see the potash industry one of the largest in this section of the country.

Democrats Fear Wet Candidate May Split Party

WASHINGTON—Senator Borah's prediction that Governor Al Smith of New York would turn prohibitionist if he were nominated for the presidency serves to emphasize all over again the confusion that continued to reign in the democratic party.

I must have been noted ere this that three men conceded good chances for the Democratic nomination—Smith, Senator Jim Reed and Governor Ritchie of Maryland—are all wets and that the only outstanding dry candidate, W. G. McAdoo, is generally conceded to have lost strength.

Yet it will be admitted that the backbone of the Democratic party, the south and west, is dry.

And considering that fact, it does seem a little early to bolt the crusading Mr. McAdoo from the picture without offering someone else at least equally as strong to stand as the hope of the Democratic dries.

The confusion within the party ranks is only matched by the confusion of the innocent bystander who observes that there are some forty-odd creeds in the party when 1928 is discussed and that each faction insists that its own method is the only way to save the party.

She one thing that seems most unlikely at this time is that the party will nominate a wet candidate and run him on a wet platform. Some of the most astute politicians declare that the party would promptly split into two factions if any such course were adopted.

Most political experts seem to think that there will be a wet candidate on a straddling platform and that the issue will be soft-pedaled as effectually as possible. Hardly anyone but Borah has gone so far as to suggest that Smith will pose as a dry, but Borah is no wind-bag given to talking through his hat.

There are numerous substantial Democrats who will tell you that the party is nearly all set to side-track both Smith and McAdoo and agree on a strong candidate. But others who insist that the Smith-McAdoo fight is the big thing before the party, that it must be fought out if the party is to live and that either Smith or McAdoo could run from three to five million votes ahead of the next best Democrat who could be named. Still others either can't see any possibility but McAdoo or any satisfactory outcome but Smith.

The tremulous undercurrent fanned by the religious issue cannot be ignored, although one seldom hears of it in public. Great numbers of Catholics will never believe that anything but his religion could keep Smith from the nomination and some anti-Smith politicians declare privately that if Smith is not nominated, the party candidate will obtain hardly a Catholic vote.

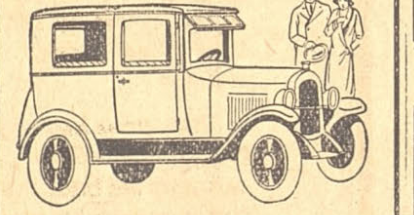

COURT OF APPEALS AFFIRMS ABILENE CASE

In the case of the City of Abilene vs. C. H. Reed, the Eleventh court of civil appeals here today rendered an opinion affirming the judgment of the trial court, which granted an injunction prayed for by the plaintiff denying the city the right to open a ditch.

Herbert Hoover To Make Speech at Trade Convention

NEW YORK, April 22.—Foreign traders from forty states will listen at Detroit to an address by Secretary Hoover on May 26 next at the Fourteenth National Foreign Trade Convention, according to O. K. Davis, Secretary, who made public the Convention's program today. The convention will meet on May 25, 26 and 27, and 2,500 foreign traders are expected to attend.

The address of the Secretary of commerce will be delivered at a special luncheon session, under the auspices of the American Manufacturers' Export Association. Its subject will be "American Foreign Trade," and a nation-wide radio audience will listen to what is anticipated to be one of the notable business addresses of the year.

Among other outstanding features of the convention will be addresses by Roy D. Chapin, Chairman of the Board, Hudson Motor Car company, on "The Motor Influence in Our Foreign Trade," Governor Fred W. 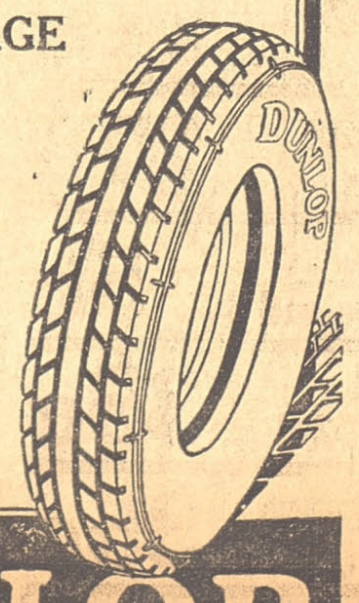

THE STORY OF THE CO-ED WHO WOULD BE A MORO PRINCESS

EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the second of the series of articles on the Moro rebellion in Philippines, led by Princess Tarhata, American-educated flapper.

By MILES W. VAUGHAN (United Press Staff Correspondent) MANILA.—The truth is that Governor Moore meddles in our customs and our religion and persecutes mercilessly those who incur his ire.

This statement by the Princess Tarhata Kiram, niece of the Sultan of Sulu, is believed to sum up much of the excuse which led to the bloody Moro rebellion in the remote island of Jolo which the Princess and her husband, the Oatu Tahil, led in January.

The rebellion was put down by Constabulary after some 35 moros had been killed. The Princess and her husband were captured after they fled ignominiously leaving their followers to die in a crude native fortress.

Tarhata, one time co-ed in the University of Illinois and once considered the most beautiful girl of Moroland, herself faces prosecution for her part in the rebellion by Governor Carl Moore of Sulu Province.

"I feel that an unwarranted importance has been attached to me in connection with this trouble," the Princess telegraphed Malina. "Perhaps it is due to my family and my travels in America. It is a fact that you cannot make a slave of a man after deducting him."

"My stay in America taught me that essence of true government is that all powers should never be vested in one man. In Sulu we have a governor who is at once superintendent of schools and a justice of the peace.

The whole story of Tarhata, persons who have known her for years assert, is that of an ambitious Moro girl, educated in America, who wants to gain a place of power among her fellow countrymen.

Seas, is an old man, fat and suffering from liver trouble. Tarhata, her acquaintances believe, figured that she could rule the country through her husband, the Datu, Tahil, and could engineer his selection to the Sultanate after the old Sultan's death.

The Moros, it should be borne in mind, always have been expert in tribal politics and devious political plotting. And the Sultanate is worth working for. The Sultan of Sulu wields no little power and has a big income. He is spiritual and tribal ruler of all Mohammedan Malays under American rule and of thousands of Mohammedan natives in British North Borneo, and all of them pay him subsidies.

It is inevitable, of course, that Moro politicians all are working for a chance to participate in the succession to the Sultanate. There are a dozen possible candidates. One of them may yet be the Datu Tahil, husband of the ambitious Tarhata and Tarhata yet may live to be Empress of Moroland as her superior education and intelligence undoubtedly would make it easy for her to rule through her less gifted husband.

Commenting on this situation the editor of the Mindanao Herald, only English language newspaper in Moroland, says:

"The upper classes of the Sulu

Moros take a morbid delight in intrigue. There are more cliques and factions and petty bickering between them, than ever was in the court of the Sick Man of the East. "The Sultan of Sulu has no direct heir. He is 60 years old and unhealthy. Upon his death the Sultanate may go to any one of a dozen aspirants. The Princess Tarhata is of royal blood. Datu Tahil's blood has a tinge of the blue. Tarhata is intelligent. She was educated in the States and she is ambitious. Why shouldn't Sultans Tarhata and Consort Tahil rule over the spiritual life of the Suluanos?"

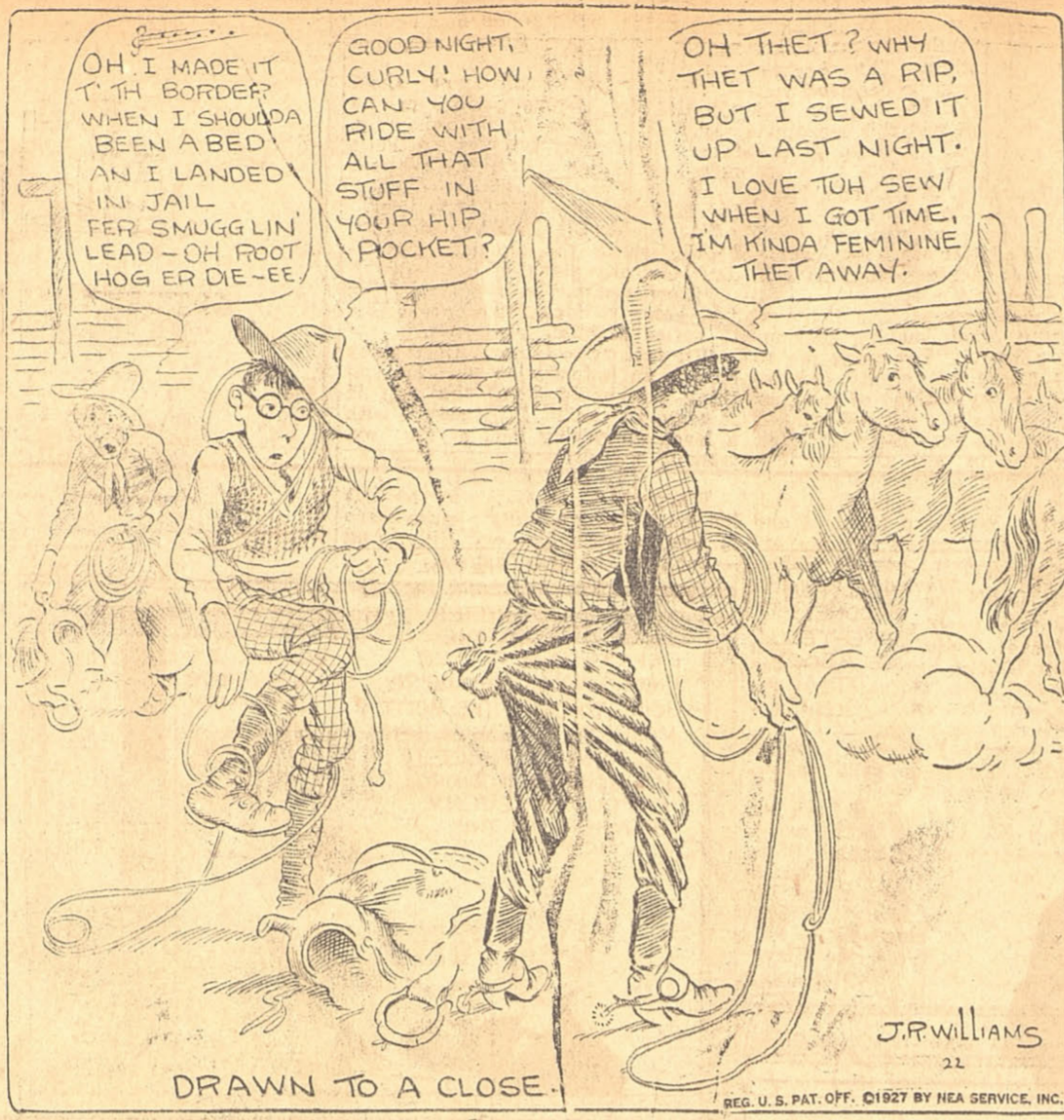

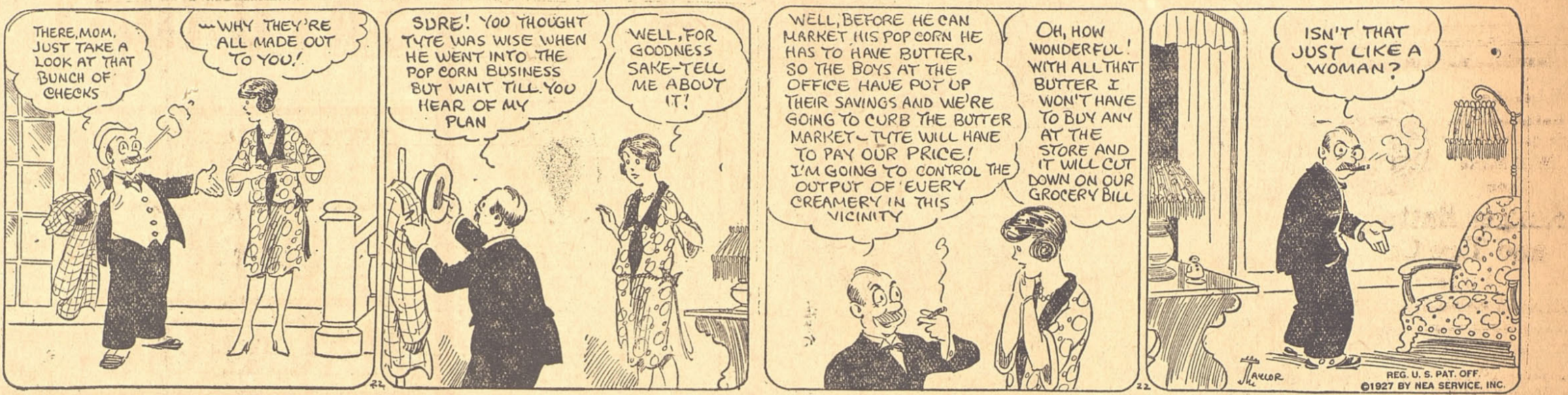

Holloway told about his first impression of Weatherford, and his references to some of the old landmarks of Weatherford winged their way home to those who also remembered them.

Mrs. B. T. Granger and Mrs. R. W. Laprelle, Ranger's two talented solo-

ists, were most pleasing in their numbers, as were Miss Gillian Buchanan and Leo Underwood, in their violin and cornet solos, respectively.

One-Act Play Good.
Mr. and Mrs. Peters' one-act play, "The Time Table," was clever, and especially well received as this popular Little theater couple hail from that particular neck of the woods. Mrs. Peters also read "Bobby Shaftoe." Her former expression teacher was in the audience.

Florence Alice Palmer, in a quaint little costume, did some dance numbers which were enjoyed by Ranger folks as well as the Weatherford people, as it is seldom that this talented little dancer appears in Ranger in dance numbers.

Miss Norma Woody Graham was pleasing in two whistling numbers, and the instrumental quartet, composed of Floyd Killingsworth, Bobby Sanderford, Ruth Shirley and James White, was well received. Marvin Ed-

wards sang "Melisande" and responded with "Love," in a way that made Ranger people who were in the audience swell with pride.

Miss Nell Tibbels, who played the majority of the accompaniments, was as usual perfect in that role.

It was a jolly affair. At the tables in the Parker hotel were the some 60 Lions and entertainers that went from Ranger, properly chaperoned by three ministers of the gospel. E. A. Ringold served as toastmaster and the orchestra played while the Ranger bunch partook of a splendid meal.

There were present, the present president of the Lions club, E. A. Ringold, and three past presidents, Dr. Harry Logsdon, Dr. C. C. Craig, and Walter Murray, and practically all of the Ranger Lions, their families, and the talent that made the program go over like a house on fire.

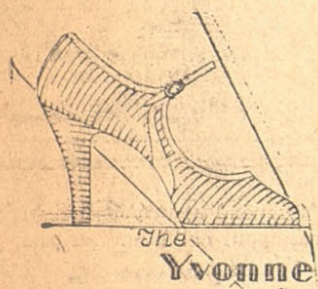

One of the wells will be 900 feet east of the Ramsower No. 1, the discovery well, and the other will be in the northwest corner of the holdings, an offset to the Thorpe No. 1 of the McLester Oil corporation.

This will make seven wells in that area.

area. Two of them, the Higginbotham of the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company and the Ramsower No. 2, were dry holes, but they gave the operators a trend of the pool which seems to bear to the east and north and northwest.

The Root-Fehl Watson No. 1 well in that area is a producer, but just how much it will eventually make is problematical. It is not known whether the dose of nitro administered several days ago has exploded. It is a fishing job with a bit stuck down in the hole.

The Good well of the Davison et al. interests is down around the 2,200 foot level and is being closely watched. This well is another offset to the Thorpe No. 1 that is making around 50 barrels of oil an hour flowing regularly.

Col. Gordon was very optimistic over the outlook of the field and probably after getting two more producers will mark time until the price of oil advances.
