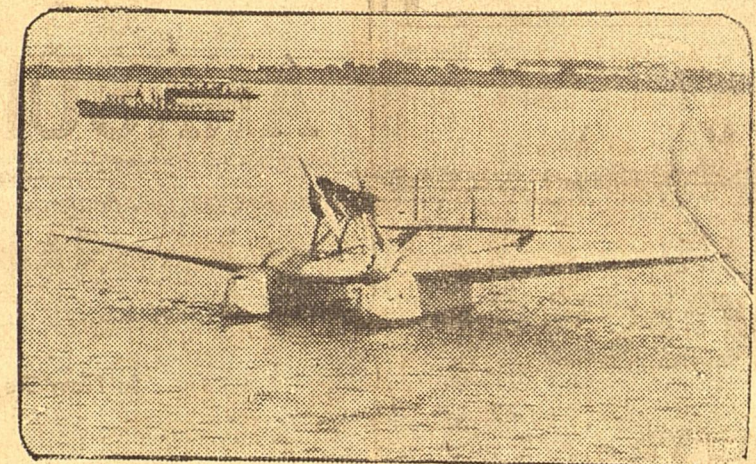
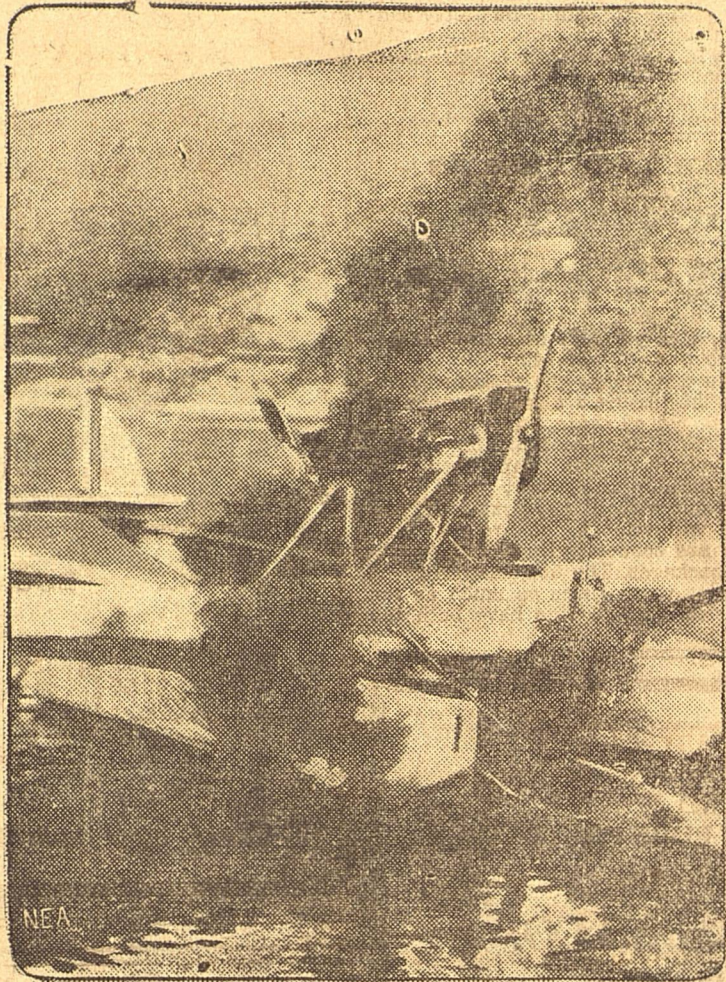

HEAVY RAIN ACCOMPANIED BY HAIL AT RANGER TUESDAY

A heavy rain and hail storm visited Ranger shortly after noon today, breaking the drought of over a month. Rain fell in torrents for a solid half hour and the rainfall was punctuated with hail in varying sizes, but large volume.

Soon after the rain began to fall the various gutters carried the waters swirling down the main business streets of Ranger, where they joined the rapidly forming stream on South Commerce street and poured in a stream as broad as the street and deep enough for small boys to wade in, to the "thank ye ma'am" on South Commerce, where the usual scenes that accompany a rain storm were enacted.

Cars were lined up on each side of the crossing, some attempting to ford the current, and some getting stuck in the attempt.

A big closed car rushed to the scene, a man took his fishing reel and line, which was baited with a live minnow and fish, while the rest of the world got by as best it could.

The low place under the Tee Pee viaduct came in for its share of flood waters and lots of negotiating was necessary to keep traffic moving.

The rain came at a most opportune time, as it has been over a month since there was any rain in this section and crops and pastures were in need of moisture.

The harm done by the hail is not known, but it pelted hard enough to end all ambitions for arriving at maturity in any fruit crop it might happen to have hit.

Lightning Plays Queer Tricks In Oklahoma Home

STILLWATER, Okla., April 12.—Lightning struck the home of Dr. J. K. McClure, housing seven persons, at 2 a. m., today, collapsing all four walls of the structure but left the roof intact and all household fixture unharmed and injured none.

Several of those in the house were students at Oklahoma A. & M. college here. The skeleton structure of the house remained standing—not so much as an electric light globe destroyed.

Tornado Hits Del Rio Territory, Big Damage Done

DEL RIO, April 12.—Del Rio was strewn with debris today following a severe rain, wind and hail storm last night. The town was without outside communication for twelve hours. Many houses were unroofed and thousands of dollars worth of plate glass broken.

So far as is known no one was severely injured although communication with a section 12 miles east of here where a twister passed is still out. The tornado cut a path fifty yards wide and fifty miles long through Kinney, Maverick and Val Verde counties.

THORPE WELL IS FLOWING 720 BARRELS DAILY

With the Thorpe No. 1 of the Mc-Lester Oil corporation in the Ram-sower pool making around 30 barrels an hour flowing by heads every 40 minutes, G. A. Davison et al., others drilling on the Good tract that adjoins the Thorpe lease are feeling very optimistic. The Good well is down around the 1,600 foot level and is in line of the way the pool seems to trend.

The Gordon interests probably will make several locations, as soon as Colonel Gordon returns from the Pacific coast. The syndicate recently made a location to the north and east. The talent seems to be of the opinion that the field trends toward the west and north.

Information from other pools in the country where drilling is in progress is optimistic. Advances from around Carbon are to the effect that the Spencer well north of the Morgan and southwest of the McAllister is due in soon. It is expected to get pay in and around the 3,100 foot level. This well will further test that sector and prove up both the Morgan and McAllister pools.

Advices from the Mook-Texas Sibley well near Staff is that it has settled down to a steady production of from 70 to 75 barrels a day and making good with no great showing of gas.

The Belva company continues to sink the bit deeper in the producing sands of the Phillips well two miles east of Eastland on the highway with hopes of increasing the production now estimated at 15 barrels a day to a good paying proposition. The sand in this well is said to be thirty feet thick. There has been no showing of gas since it was given a shot of nitro, and only once since drilling operations started has there been a showing of gas in the hole.

Hicks Well Has Good Showing in Leuders Field

Operators in Jones county, especially those in and around Leuders are all pepped up over the showing of the Stebbins well on the Hicks farm six miles southwest of Leuders. This well has a good showing of oil from 1,500 to 1,605 feet and has approximately 300 feet of oil in the hole, although it is not near completed.

Other activities in Jones as well as in the wildcat territory is slowing down a bit. Wildcaters seem to be laying off for a while until the price of crude takes an upturn. The big companies are managing to keep active enough to hold on to their good leases and are drilling where big production makes it necessary for them to drill.

Other sections of Jones county are getting a big play with operators meeting with fair success. While Jones is holding its own, Callahan, Coleman and Brown counties are not showing up so big the past day or two. Quite a few holes in these last counties will be plugged, a few drilled deeper and several put in the duster class.

Meacham Resigns As Ft. Worth Mayor Bryce Successor

BEING SON OF U. S. PRESIDENT IS NO EASY JOB

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Being the son of a president of the United States is not always what it is cracked up to be.

The freedom of his life is held up to the average citizen as an enjoyable game but young John Coolidge, the son of the president has more to worry about than the pursuit of happiness.

A secret service man follows his every step; college professors are under orders to make him feel he is an average citizen; his schoolmates fear he may become possessed of an idea that he is son of President Coolidge and girls can't keep their hearts from fluttering at the thought of a possible marriage to the son a president.

These forces over which he has no control have not made life any more enjoyable for young Coolidge.

Recently, he spent his Easter vacation in Washington, but instead of riding around in the presidential car or giving parties for his friends, he went to the naval hospital to get his teeth fixed and read books at home of evenings.

President Coolidge, is just as important a force in his own house hold as he is around the White House. He does not object to movies but last summer he prevented young John from attending them because he felt that the boy could spend his time to a better advantage reading at home. He is not opposed to dancing but he feels that his son can benefit more by other occupations than "black-bottoming" through life.

Young John, would like to dance; he doesn't care more for studies than anyone else does and his youthful desire for pleasure measures up to that of the ordinary 20 year old American boy.

But the thought that he is the son of a president, that every move he makes will be of interest to millions of persons and that a secret service man must guard him gives him a degree of caution that might mark an older man.

Two years ago he tried riding around with the White House chauffeur carrying bundles and letters as a means of occupying himself. Sometimes he even was permitted to drive the car himself but always he was subject to the restraint that a son of the president of the United States is subject to.

Plan Calling Election In 30 Days, Cost Be \$300,000

Estimates Place Additional Tax at Not More Than 7 Cents on One Hundred Valuation Property Values are Rapidly Increasing

Petitions calling for an election to issue bonds in the sum of \$300,000 to build a new court house in Eastland county are being distributed by Judge C. B. Frost and others who are fostering the movement.

The tentative plans for the new court house call for a five-story building and a basement completely furnished. The perspective of the new structure already has been drawn by a Dallas architect showing just what the building will look like when completed should the bonds be voted.

It is planned to have the petitions generally circulated all over the county, and signed by the latter part of next week so that the election may be held within thirty days. The proponents are anxious to have the petitions generally signed by the tax payers within the next week or ten days.

The election calls for the vote of a tax to pay interest on the said bonds and create a sinking fund. The bonds to bear five percent interest redeemable in twenty or forty years. It is estimated that the tax levy to build the court house will not exceed seven cents additional on the hundred dollar valuation. The county now is paying 2 1/2 percent on \$350,000 in rent for offices in other buildings.

The reasons assigned in the petition for calling for the election that the present structure is wholly inadequate in size to house the officials and the courts and permit efficient conduct of judicial county business. Such conditions result in waste of public time and expense and in addition is a great inconvenience to the citizenship.

That the tax levy will hardly amount to seven cents, is because the value of taxable property already amounts to more than \$37,000,000 this year. There will be a big increase in another year as is already to be noted in the construction of four new pipelines in the county, the additional oil wells that have been brought in and will be completed, besides the increase in buildings in all the towns in the county at Rising Star, Carbon, Pioneer and other places to say nothing of Ranger and Desdemona.

Besides the residences and business blocks going up, new hotels will be under construction at Cisco and Eastland.

However one of the main reasons assigned is that some safe place should be had in which to keep the records of the county that now are exposed to great hazards of fire. Loss and destruction by fire or storm would mean irreparable damages to the county at large.

The increased valuations in the county will hardly make the amount of taxes to be levied felt.

Mayfield Ready To Campaign For His Reelection

A fifth director will be named also, to fill the place made vacant by S. Perstein, who has been in Europe for about a year.

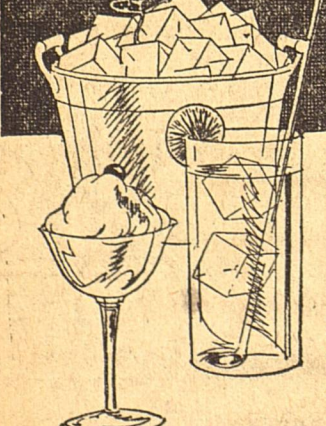
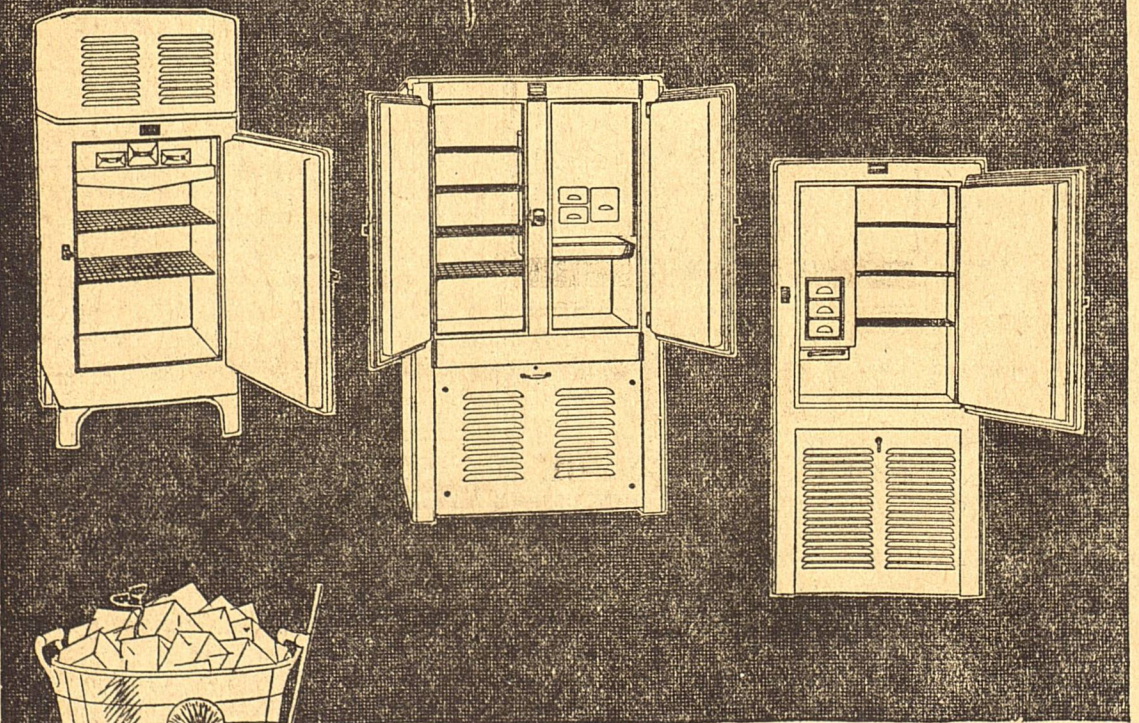
San Antonio Hit By Hail and Rain Streets Flooded

 Jack McCallister of the Cleveland Indians wasn't worrying about his pitching, yet he was hopeful that Hudlin would come up to expectations. He is the husky right-hander who showed so much promise late last fall.
 Connie Mack enthused over his pitching but added there is always room for another good hurler on any staff.
 Possibly pitching isn't 70 per cent of a team's efficiency, but it isn't so far away from that figure.
 Washington's Status.
 Give the Washington club high class pitching and it will be one of

the strongest clubs in the majors. In all other respects it is a great aggregation.
 The Washington pitching staff is made up of a rather unusual combination, fading veterans and rising youngsters. The injury to Walter Johnson was a terrific handicap. It temporarily put out of commission a dependable veteran.
 If the old-timers hold up and the youngsters come through, by that I mean, say two of the many rookie pitchers Manager Harris has under contract, Washington will be mighty troublesome. Getting such a break is asking considerable.

A similar condition exists in the ranks of the New York Giants. It's a mighty pert ball club that may want for consistent pitching.
 A manager with five pitchers rating as regulars, can figure that 50 per cent of his managerial worries have been taken care of.
Restrict Batting.
 I am inclined to think that within a few years the magnates will be seeking methods that will aid rather than curtail the effectiveness of the pitcher.
 In the era of slugging that has enveloped baseball for almost 10 years, legislation has always been in favor of the batsman. Increase the batting at the expense of the pitcher has been the watchword.
 Stricter pitching rules, elimination of the spitball and other freak deliveries, a livelier baseball and various other restrictions, have tended to make the path of the pitcher rougher and the batter softer.
 The scarcity of high class pitching material makes it seem as if the magnates would have to shift their affection from batter to pitcher in an effort to bring about an adjustment of conditions.
 Walter Johnsons are not picked up these days for the mere asking.

Man Given Three Year Sentence On Liquor Charge
 Judge Elzo Been of the Eighty-eighth district court believes in getting through with business and cleaning his docket, even if he has to hold night sessions as was the case during the trial last week and again last night when Marshall Broyles was on trial charged with violation of the prohibition law.
 The trial of the case was completed about 10:30 o'clock and within a half hour after having been given the case, the jury returned a verdict of guilty and assessed his punishment at three years in the penitentiary.
 The court began trial today, the case against Mrs. A. E. Kelsay, charged with possession of liquor for the purpose of sale. Following this case, J. H. Ferguson charged with a similar offense will be tried. The trial of these two cases probably will last far into the night tonight. The selection of the jury was begun this morning.

Everything passed off wonderfully well and the 8,000 Confederate veterans there were well pleased with the hospitality Tampa bestowed on them."
 Colonel Wilson was one of the organizers of the Confederate veterans at the first meeting for that purpose in New Orleans in 1899. Since that time he has never missed a convention and although he is now 85 years old, he looks as though he would be good for several more. He says he is old only in years and the fact that he is a justice of the peace at Electra shows that the colonel is still on the job.
 As a member of the Third Louisiana, Colonel Wilson went out to war with Gen. P. G. T. Beauregard, but when they reached Richmond he became attached to General Lee, as his private scout and served in that capacity under his beloved leader as long as there was any chance to serve the Southland.
 Colonel Wilson is an old newspaper man, being an editor in Louisiana back in '72, when, as he said, "men were killed every day."

The auditorium is the capital's largest hall and the Rev. Dr. Pierce was able to promise that the public

The president, when in Washington, has always attended the Sunday morning services of the church. In recent months services have been held in a theater, as the District of Columbia authorities condemned the old church. A campaign for a new church is under way.

Announcement that Spain had purchased for an embassy the magnificent Sixteenth street residence which Mrs. John B. Henderson had offered to congress for the vice president, was a sad blow to the lovely ladies of the Congressional club.

The Congressional club has had a bad case of growing pains, for its members augment after every election. It had expanded beyond its present cozy clubhouse and has been casting its eyes around for new quarters, most longingly of all at Mrs. Henderson's wonderful, unused mansion alongside the Mexican embassy.

Ever since congress had turned down Mrs. Henderson's splendid offer, the most exciting topic of conversation when the lovely ladies got together was speculation over whether Mrs. Henderson, the club's honorary president, would do the noble thing and donate the place to the organization.

Aviators Start Flight in Effort To Break Record
