



CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 12 .- The first 75 years of bachelorhood-They're so easy that Theodore Elijah Burton would choose them anew

if he had the opportunity. To Burton's three-score and fifteen years of matelessness is to be added his repute as one of the most famous of American congressmen when

his qualifications as a critic are weighed. The cynic's handbook strikes no responsive chord in this statesman's

breast when it rates matrimony as "something which everybody who has it doesn't want, and everybody who hasn't it wants it."

"I believe I would be a bachelor again if I had my life to live over," Theodore Elijah Burton told me.

#### He Uses No Vernacular.

He did not exactly say in the vernacular of the times that "marriage is the bunk.'

In fact, meditating deeply, pacing back and forth, he judiciously opined that he was not sure that he "cared to go upon record in any minutes of the day" as discussing matrimony-

"I really know little about it. I am a man who has confined his study to a few grave subjects, and a man who never speaks except upon a subject with which he is thoroughly familiar. On matrimony I am not so informed, save from more or less casual observation."

The state of bachelorhood, however, the "senator" does know-the title of "senator" still being worn gracefully by Theodore Burton because of one term he eserved in the more august congressional body.

Seventy-five years' worth of first-hand information and personal research embolden him to speak its worth.
