3 cup milk or water (for "rolled" biscuits)

LONDON, Feb. 22.—The 195th anniversary of the birth of General George Washington, depicted in Eng-lish history books as "the traitorous rebel." saw Parliament sitting in London with its wings clipped, bemoaning the nearly final turn of the ball in all of its dominions which Washington started rolling in 1776.

Formerly the instrument of the rovernment of the British Empire the Parliament is now sitting under its diminished designation of "Parliament of Great Britain and North-ern Ireland." If this designation had existed in 1776 the national cry in the United States of "No taxation without representation" might never have been heard and Washington might never have led a victorious or, in fact, any army into Yorktown several years later.
