LONDON, July 21 .- The center of the Naval Armament Conference shifted to London today. W. C. Bridgeman, First Lord of the Admiralty and Lord Cecil, both of whom returned from Geneva late yesterday, arranged for conferences with the cabinet and with naval experts at the admiralty.

In government circles it was reported that Bridgeman, head of the British delegation at the arms con-ference, would lay before the govern-ment proposals which were said to constitute the basis of an agreement

reached among the three-powers at the conference earlier in the week. It was explained that the presence of the British delegation at London is the result of its desire to discuss by written or telegraphic communi-cations. School And Pension Taxes Are Unchanged Total Now Is 67 Cents

AUSTIN, July 21.—The state tax rate fas fixed at 25 cents by the automatic tax board this morning.

The 25 cent tax is for general revenue purposes. The school tax was continued at 35 cents and the conformation of the school tax was continued at 35 cents and the conformation. federate pension tax at 7 cents. This makes the total rate 67 cents.

The rate is two cents higher than that fixed a year ago. Governor Moody announced that he is confident the tax rate for the bi-ennium consisting of this year and next will be eight cents lower than that of the last bi-ennium. The past bi-ennium constituted the administration of former governor Miriam Ferguson.

In fixing the rate the board followed the specific directions of the statute except that they took an average of penitentiary income for six years and made it part of the estimat-

years and made it part of the estimat-

This was done because the legislature made penitentiary income go directly into the general fund. It did not do so when the tax statue was

enacted.
State Treasurer Hatcher argued that the law is merely directory and that the board had discretionary power to estimate other likely income.
Based on such estimates he moved a 23 cent rate. It was not seconded. Governor Moody seconded Comptroller Terrell's motion for a 25 cent rate.




