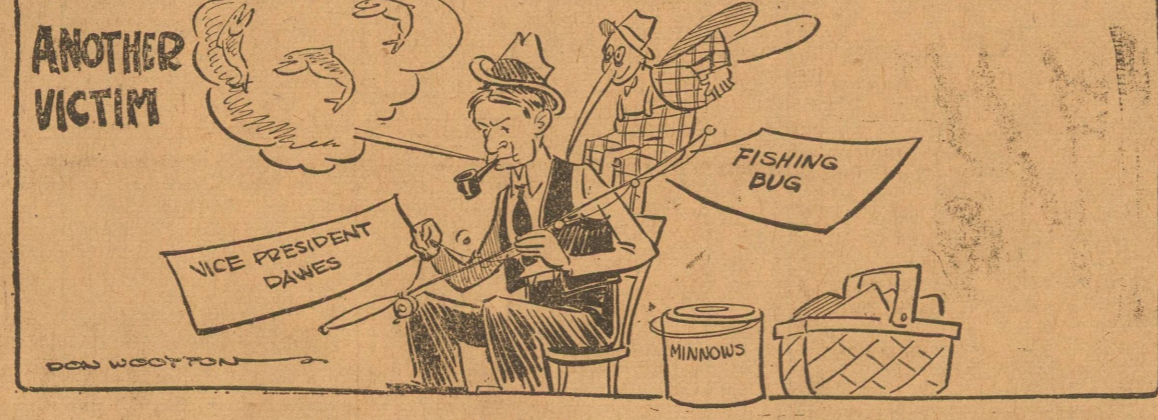
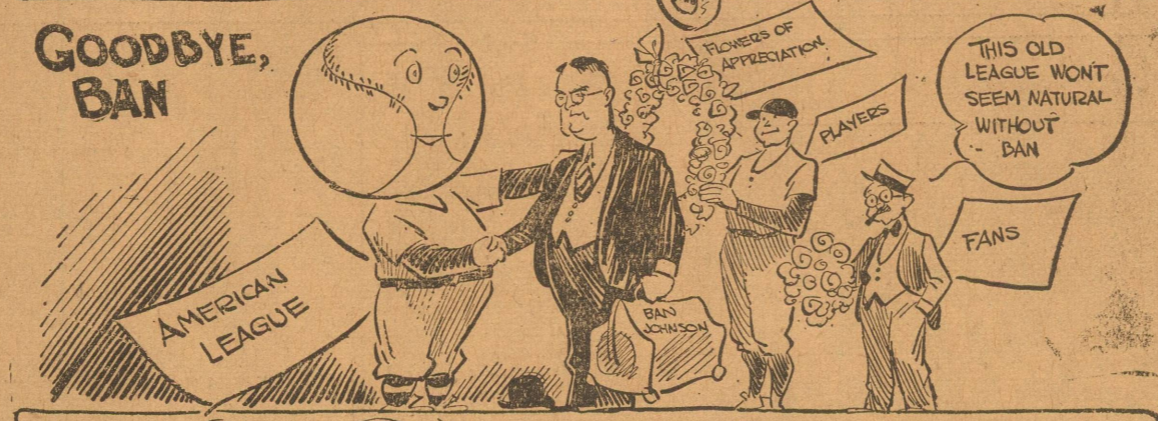
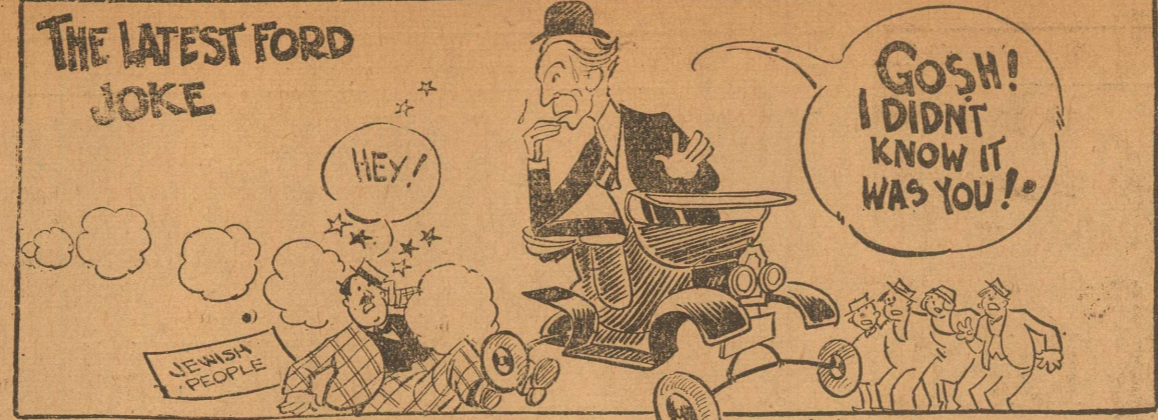

Move Out, Move In Was Order of Day On Pine Street

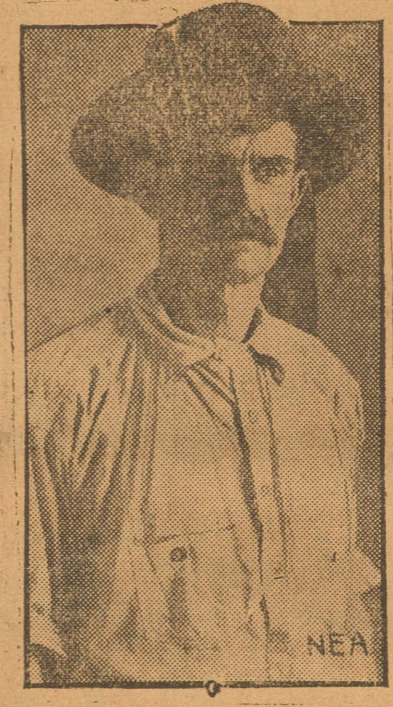

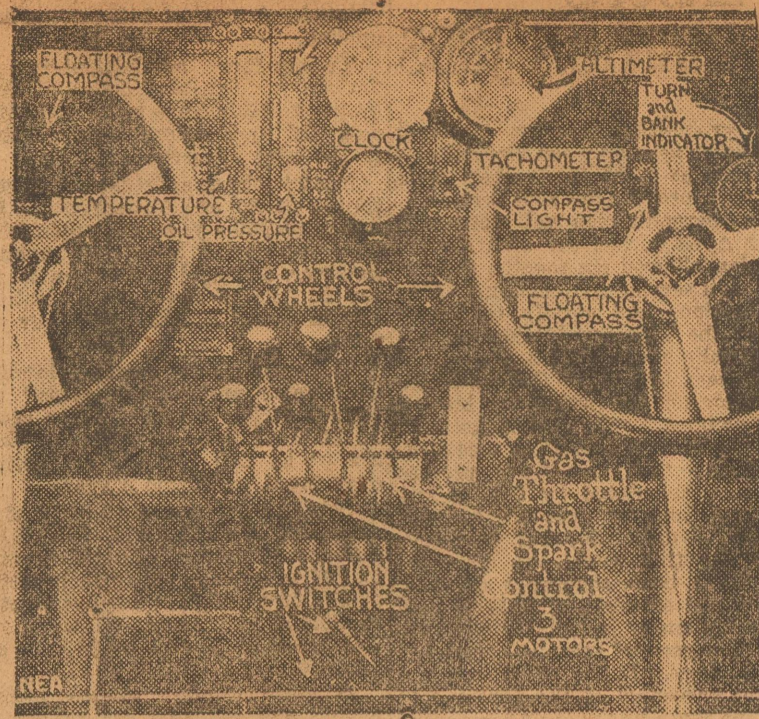

Speaker Decries Indifference Of Average Citizen

KERRVILLE, Texas, July 21.—The lack of public interest in political corruption was decried here today by Congressman Tom Connally of Marlin in a speech before the annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

"If representative government fails in the United States," he said "it will fail because of the indifference or neglect of its citizens."

"There are those who fear that our institutions are in peril from bolshevism. We can deal with the long whiskered Russian bolshevists in short order. The most dangerous bolshevist is the man who corrupts a public official to betray the people."

"The public official who accepts a bribe as the price of his honor is the arch enemy of free government. He is a criminal."

Connally recited the events of the Teapot Dome oil scandal and criticized the last two republican administrations.

"The revelation of malfeasance and corruption during those two administrations have been gross enough to outrage the people of the United States," he declared.

"But the astounding thing is that the people in many sections seem indifferent to or unaffected by these loathsome transactions."

Corrupt elections are the most pressing issues before the people, he said.

"The United States needs re-baptism in the spirit of Thomas Jefferson," he concluded. "They need in public life the vitalizing example of Andrew Jackson. They need the simplicity and honesty and courage of these great leaders."

Scranton's New School Building Is Completed

By HERBERT LITTLE
(United Press Staff Correspondent)
WASHINGTON, July 21.—Nearly everybody wants to be a prohibition agent. And the rest of us want to be prohibition officials. This is the impression given by a survey of the jobs and appointments resulting from the federal prohibition enforcement reorganization.

Nineteen thousand men and women have applied for the 2500 jobs. The applicants have gone to the trouble of filling out lengthy questionnaires and submitting to other examinations, indicating their desire is something more than a momentary enthusiasm for the job of sleuthing after bootleggers, moonshiners and smugglers—a job picturesque from a distance but entailing lots of hard work and danger for tender stomachs unaccustomed to some of the questionable liquor sold nowadays.

The tremendous job of weeding out the least desirable applicants has just started, now that all applications are in and the entries closed. Civil service examinations are being held all over the country for the purpose of selecting the best for these responsible jobs.

The "prohibition unit" of the treasury department was transformed into the "bureau of prohibition" by a reorganization law signed by President Coolidge last March 3. The law provided that all employees, except the commissioner in charge, should be under civil service regulations. Since the unit came into existence shortly

after prohibition became national eight years ago, only the clerical employees, some 1200 in number, have been appointed under civil service.

The reorganization act went into effect April 1, but the civil service provision allowed six months for the U. S. civil service commission to give examinations and certify to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon the applicants eligible to the job.

Secretary Mellon, or Commissioner J. M. Doran of the prohibition bureau in his name will appoint men for each position from the eligibles certified. Under the law this entire process should be completed by Oct. 1, but due to failure of congress to pass the second deficiency bill providing funds for this work, the examinations have been somewhat delayed.

For 24 jobs as assistant administrators in charge of enforcement, at \$3,120 to \$5,200 a year, 114 applications were received. Peculiarly enough, however, 607 applications are on file for 24 jobs as assistant administrators in charge of handling liquor permits.

The ordinary dry sleuths, classified as "junior prohibition agents" will receive \$1,860 a year. There are to be 1260 of these appointed. There are to be 288 "prohibition agents" over these, at \$2,400 a year.

Other vacancies to be filled include one chief of field division at \$6,000 a year; 50 deputy administrators at \$3,000 to \$4,500; six field inspectors at \$3,000 to \$3,900; 12 investigators at \$3,000 and 3,800; 53 warehouse watchmen at \$1,140 to \$1,800; and 74 attorneys at \$1,860 to \$5,200.

A large number of the present agents and officials are taking the examinations. Most of them have good chances of appointment because of their familiarity with the work.

UNEXPLORED TERRITORY STILL MAY BE FOUND IN ARTIC REGION

By United Press.
LONDON.—Possibility of existing unknown and unexplored lands in the Arctic is being studied by British scientists.

Various computations of Arctic ocean tides which have been made from time to time are being compiled with a view to aiding any future exploring parties which might enter the frozen North in search of unknown reaches of land.

Despite the varying theories from Harris' hypothetical reach of land somewhere within the Arctic regions to Nansen's declaration that from his observations in the Fram between 1893 and 1896 there only existed a deep Polar basin, science is still desirous of determining something definite regarding the possible existence of land between the Taimir Peninsula of Northern Siberia and Barrow Point in Northern Alaska.

It has already been determined that the tidal lines between these two points indicate that the progressive tidal wave from the North Atlantic enters the opening between Greenland and Spitzbergen and crosses the Arctic Sea without meeting any obstruction caused by extensive land masses. It is declared that the tidal wave reaches De Long's island (at Longitude 140, East, Latitude 73 North) five hours before it reaches Point Barrow, Alaska, although the direct distance from the Spitzbergen opening to the island and to Point Barrow is nearly the same. Thus suggesting a shallow sea in the unexplored region north of Wrangel

Island and Point Barrow, with perhaps islands in places. It is said that the tidal streams met with are of the rotary type, usual in open ocean areas, but it is declared that they present a striking peculiarity. Below the ice to the depth of some 20 fathoms, water of the same density is present, while below this there is a sudden increase in density and later a slow increase in approaching the bottom. In the water layer of equal density, it has been found that the tidal streams run slowly while deeper down where the density increases the tidal streams are at a maximum dying away toward the bottom.

Some scientists contend that this absence of the tides indicates the absence of any great masses of land within the unexplored reaches.

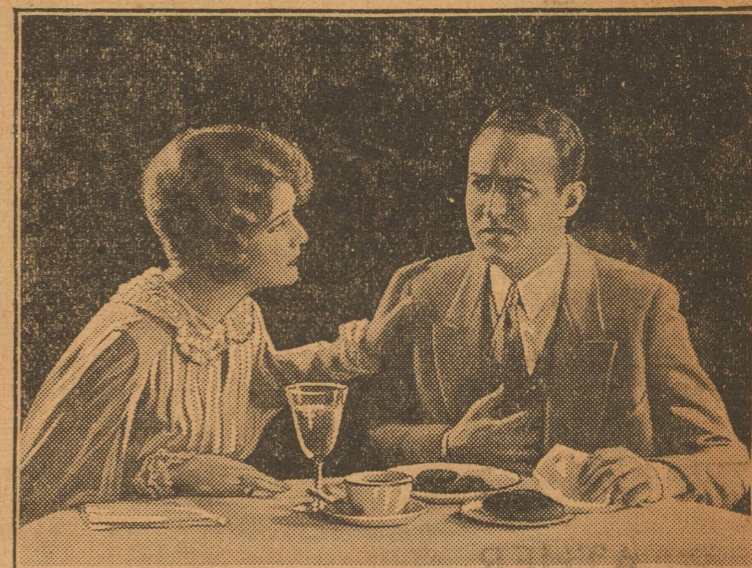

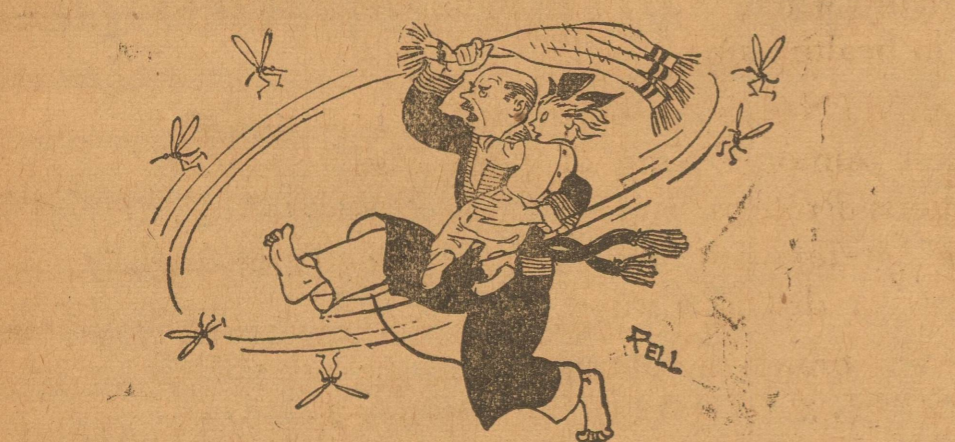

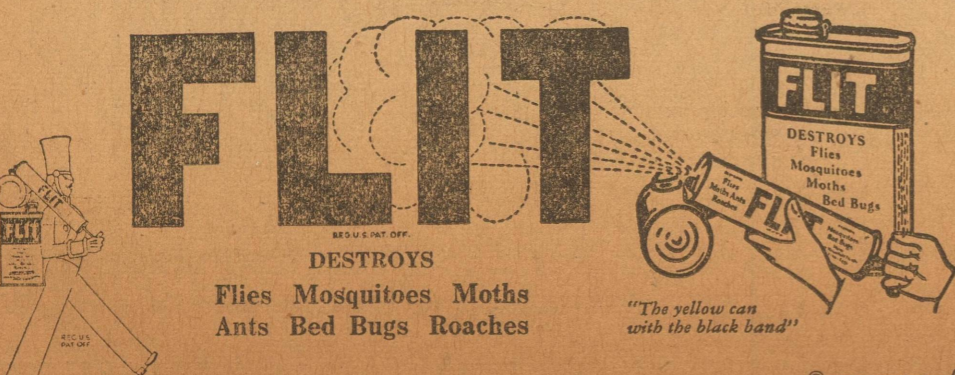

 Recently while making a jump from Boston to St. Louis on the same train with two American League clubs, I had a chance to study the players as to how they departed themselves off the field.
 I was struck with the decided contrast as to how the players of today while away their hours compared with those of 20 years ago. While games of chance are still a favored form of amusement there is a wide difference in the stakes and the games played.
 Twenty years ago, as the train pulled out of the station on one of the long jumps, at least three games of draw poker would be in operation within a half hour. As a rule the games and their personnel had been planned prior to the start.
 The "poker" game, so-called, would be a two-bit limit. Another set would be playing stud poker, say a dollar limit with two dollars on the last card. The third table would either be table stakes or a two dollar blind tiger, the pot always open.
 As a rule a dice game would be in operation in the rest room with big money passing hands.
Big Stakes Gone
 As I watch the two present-day teams get settled for the long ride, I marveled at the difference between then and the old-timers.
 Poker, once the favored game of big league ball players to kill the time is no longer very popular. Three other games of chance, bridge, hearts

and "rummy" have supplanted draw poker and its variations.

I would say that bridge was by far the most popular of the three. A small limit is played and there is little chance for a player to suffer financial hardship, even if things should break badly.

A number of major league managers are very strict about the gambling limits and, in some cases, they themselves set it very low, to eliminate the trouble that invariably results when one or more in the game get badly stung.

I know one former star player, now a big league manager, who admitted that his winnings in poker and dice reached \$7800 one season. That was \$200 more than he received in actual salary.

Doing away with the big stakes has been an excellent thing for discipline and morale on major league clubs. On most clubs African golf is banned.

Many Read
 Listening to the conversation I soon discovered that the modern player talks much less baseball than did the old-timers. That isn't so good.

One group of five players were discussing finance, trying to decide where to best invest their season's savings. An automobile stock was being reviewed pro and con as a good investment.

Another bunch was talking golf. Several expressed the wish that fall was here so they might indulge in the

game, same being barred on the club during the summer. The chance of Bobby Jones to repeat in the British open was the chief topic of conversation.

The only real baseball talk that I overheard, came from a veteran star of 30 years back, now acting as a coach, who had a couple of youngsters sitting in the same section with him.

He was trying to explain why baseball was a better game 25 years ago than today. By the expression on the rookies' faces, I could see they were skeptical.

Most of the other players were reading either magazines or books. In the old days few of the players read, some of them couldn't.

Twenty years brought about many drastic changes in the life of the ball player, but I cannot say that all of it has been for the betterment of the game.

The American League owners will find it a difficult task to pick a president capable of filling the shoes of Byron Baneroff Johnson. Probably no man in the whole history of baseball did more than he to elevate the game to its present high standard.

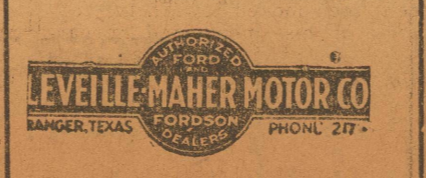

STORY TELLERS ORGANIZE AGAINST RADIO PROGRAMS

CONSTANTINOPLE.—Story tellers in Asia Minor are banding themselves into a trade union to protect their interest against radio broadcasting.
 The story tellers are urging the government to impose a heavy fine on coffee-shops, Turkish baths and harems where the installation of radio sets has supplanted the ancient profession of telling tales. They hope by making listening in such an expensive luxury that they will be able to continue with their work; but they are fighting a losing battle with great broadcasting stations here and another huge one at Angora.
 Already the women of the harems have shown a decided preference for the jazz music, the Anatolian melodies and peasant songs which are broadcast.

The popularity of moving-pictures and the rapid decline in illiteracy have also reduced the demand for the story-teller, and many of those once nationally famous for their flights of fancy have been compelled to compete with the humbler members of their craft who amuse the crowds for a few piasters on summer evenings and feast days.

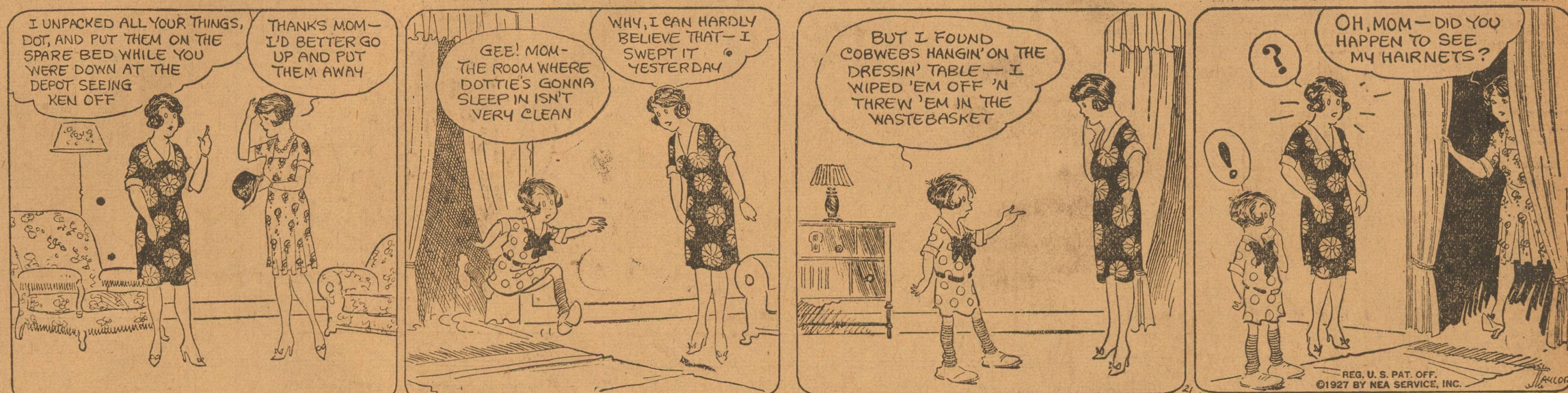

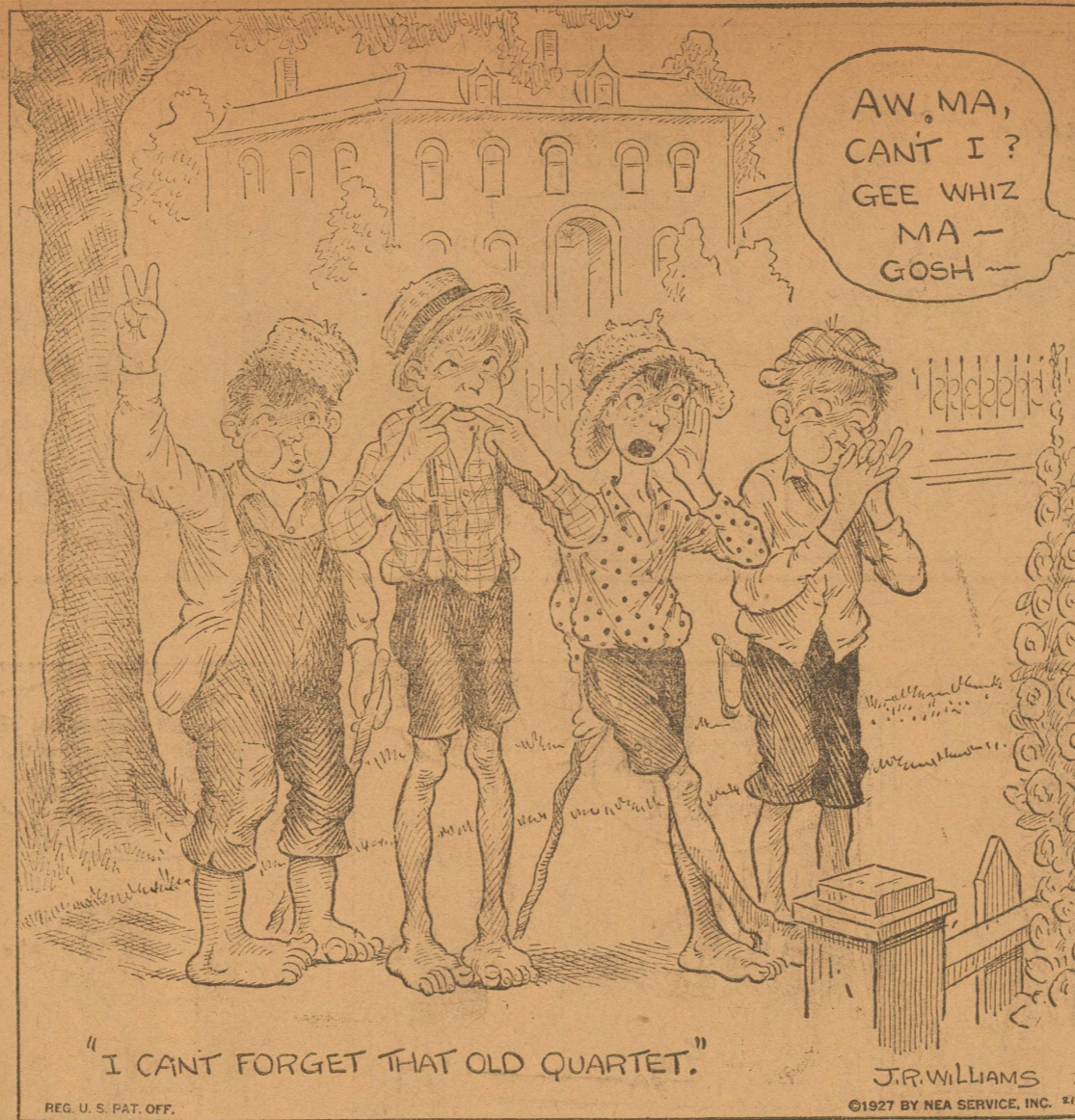

Washington Is Resting On These Long Hot Days

WASHINGTON.—These are the days when Washington lets down. The wheels of government turn, but ever so slowly. Those officials and workers who have been unable to flee the heat just naturally "go native."

It has been comparatively cool summer for the capital, thanks apparently to Herbert Janvrin Browne, the long distance weather forecaster, but the hot muggy days that do come require a spell of recuperation between each other.

This is the time of year when government officials welcome visitors to their offices. In case one finds them doing a little actual work, they are invariably tickled to death to leave off, settle back in a chair, plant their feet on their desks and chin awhile.

It is, in fact, the gossip season, for there's little else to do.

The eyes of the capital rest longingly on President Coolidge as he keeps cool in the Black Hills. The gossip, too, turns to him frequently. The latest morsel retailed to your correspondent is the one about the two groups of American bankers fighting about the president's re-nomination.

It seems, according to this yarn, that the international bankers are opposed to a Coolidge third term, while the commercial bankers over the country, supported by the business

interests, are very much in favor. One of the props of this supposition is that the international bankers are admittedly in favor of a low tariff which would enable European creditors to pay off their debts. Other bankers and the manufacturers are opposed. The administration is high tariff.

One is advised that Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler was appointed to break the ice and create the beginnings of a genuine anti-third term sentiment. Butler has also been proposing a coalition of Democrats and progressive Republicans to lower the tariff. The international bankers, so the gossip runs, would like to see Butler a candidate at the next national convention, backed by wet delegates. Butler could not obtain the nomination, but his party might be a good anti-Coolidge bloc for trading purposes.

FEWER ENGLISHWOMEN ARE GOING IN FOR LAW

LONDON.—The desire on the part of English women to follow the profession of law is on the decrease as compared with the number who became barristers five years ago when admission was first possible for feminine legalists.

The Trinity Term Bar examination report shows that this decline in interest is due to the fact that many of the women lawyers have not been able to make a remunerative living from the profession. Only a few women have taken high rank with men as advocates before a jury.

Three and four years ago there were often as many as fifteen women admitted on "call nights" while now there are generally not more than two or three.
