

AMNESTY BILL IS HALTED BY **HOUSE ACTION**

Advancement of "Ferguson's Vindication" Movement Is Apparently Blocked.

By United Press.

AUSTIN, March 5-Advancement of the Ferguson amnesty bill upon the calendar apparently was defeat-ed today and the measure will have to await its turn for consideration by the house, while open efforts were under way today to bring the thirty-ninth legislature to an end in less than two weeks.

In a series of skirmishes that kept the house on the alert throughout Wednesday afternoon, opponents of amnesty defeated attempts to give the measure an early or priority consideration. Proponents of amnesty showed a majority of about 15 votes, but could not muster the necessary two-thirds votes to set the amnesty bill as a special order of business.

An attempt by amnesty proponents at the starte of the afternoon session to table subject to call bills on the calendar ahead of the amnesty measure was blocked after two bills had been tabled. Charges were hurled at amagnity appropriate the started of the start hurled at amnesty opponents that they were deliberately attempting to keep the bill from the house, while counter-charges were made that amnesty proponents were opposing legislation necessary to the state in the interest of a one-man bill.

The house today ended the skirmish by voting, 75 to 68, against a motion to set the amnesty bill as a special order for this afternoon.

HOME LOAN BANKS

The setting up of a system of national home loan banks to stir home building through loans at low interest rates is provided in a bill introduced in the senate by Robert N. Stanfield, republican, senator from

The plan follows closely that of the farm loan system, according to Mr. Stanfield. The banks could make loans on improved residential real estate up to 60 per cent of its value, not to exceed \$10,000 in any one loan, payable in monthly installments over a period of five to fifteen years. and at a rate of interest not more than 2 per cent above the rate paid by the bank on its bonds.

Tax exempt bonds similar to the farm loan bonds would be issued. proceeds to be lent to home owners. The national home loan board would consist of the secretary of the treasury and four commissioners.



COMING TO THE LAMB SUNDAY

CERTIFICATES,

DALLAS, March 5.—B. A. Mckinney, governor of the Federal Reserve bank of Dallas, announced today the bank's March financing would take the form of a combined offering of nine-months treasury certificates of indebtedness and 4 per cent treasury bonds. The announcement says:

"The certificates are offered at par and bear 3 per cent interest from March 16, 1925, and mature Dec. 15, 1925. The bonds are an additional issue of the 4 per cent treasury bonds of 1944-54, dated and bearing interest from Dec. 15 1925, maturing Dec. 15, 1954, and redeemable at the option of the United States on and after Dec. 15, 1944. The bonds are offered at 100½ and accrued interest from

"The combined offering is for \$450,000,000 or thereabouts. About \$560,000,000 of treasury certificates of indebtedness and treasury notes become payable March 16, 1925. There will also be interest payments on the public debt in March, April and May, totaling slightly over \$300,000,000. 




