Police Arrest Man Attempting To Hit Occupants of Auto

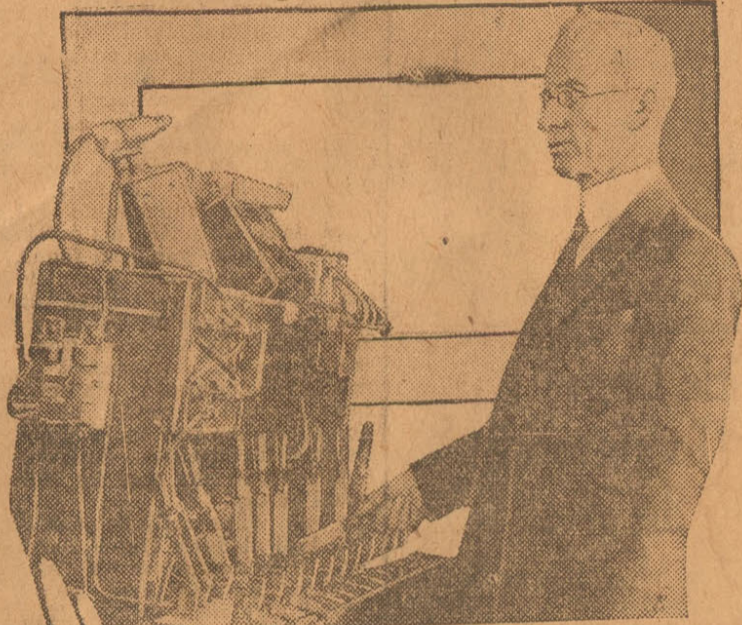

PARIS, France, July 22.—Americans were subjected to hoots, cat calls and attempted attacks when a sight seeing auto carrying a crowd of tourists seeing midday Paris passed through mobs staging a demonstration on the cabinet crisis before the Chamber of Deputies last night.

Crossing the Concorde bridge, the auto became the center of attention the moment it entered the street before the chamber.

Crowding about the car hooting and hissing the crowd of foreign tourists which included many Americans insults were hurled by the mob in torrid French.

One of the demonstrators jumped on the running board of the car and attempted to strike the occupants with his cane. He was arrested by the police.

Plays With 2,000,000 Volts

GOVERNMENT'S SHIPPING LOSS IS EXPLAINED

WASHINGTON, July 22.—No wonder the government finds a national- ly owned merchant marine unprofitable.

If one of the shipping board lines is operating at a hopeless loss, the board hangs onto it and keeps the ships running, the government ponying up the money to meet the deficit.

If a line is paying, the board immediately becomes anxious to sell it as soon as it can, for pretty much anything it can get.

If a line looks as if it might pay before long, the board wants to sell that, too, and is willing to make the terms so reasonable that the purchaser will find the transaction a paying one in the long run, even if it does take him a few months to begin making a margin of profit.

Unbusinesslike.

A business man who sold all his dividend-paying stocks far below their market value and hoarded those on which he was being regularly assessed would hardly expect to grow rich.

However, such is the government's policy with its merchant ships.

The explanation, of course, is that President Coolidge represents a school of thought which holds that a government should engage in no commercial ventures, or being so engaged, should get out of its as speedily as possible and at almost any cost.

It simply cannot sell vessels that promise to cost a private company money to operate, even as a gift.

It stands some chance of disposing of lines which pay or promise to pay soon, but prospective purchasers, aware how desperately anxious it is to sell, are more moderate in their bids.

New to Them.

This policy of keeping what is worse than worthless and getting rid of it at a sacrifice, of what yields handsome returns, is one which the president has had some difficulty in instilling into the minds of the men at the head of the governmentally owned merchant marine.

Moody to Speak At Lockhart on Friday Night

Friday night he will deliver his final speech at Lockhart and return to Austin near midnight.

Driller May Die After Accident On Lease Today

P. D. Alworth, driller of Ranger, was seriously if not fatally injured this morning when he was struck in the head by an underreamer with which he was working on a well being drilled for S. M. Root of Eastland in the Albany field. He was struck in the head and had his jawbone fractured, a hole knocked in the back of his head and was otherwise injured, it is stated.

Immediately following the accident Alworth was rushed to a physician, whom, it is stated, advised his removal to Dallas for expert attention.

Alworth's home is in Ranger where his parents live.

FILIPINOS NOW SEEK FREEDOM FROM U. S. RULE

Position Untenable For Him to Hold on, Carmi Thompson to Report

MANILA, P. I.—It was learned from sources considered reliable, that Governor General Leonard Wood, had sent his formal resignation to President Coolidge, with the request that it be accepted, when the president thinks advisable.

The belief is becoming wide spread in the Filipino and American circles, that Governor Wood's position is becoming untenable.

The belief grows as it is released, that Colonel Carmi Thompson, President Coolidge's personal representative, came with definite instructions to report on means of obtaining a better administration of affairs.

American newspaper correspondents are still under fire of the Filipino leaders who declare they are sending out biased reports.

Governor General Wood and leaders on the island have been at loggerheads for the past two years or more. There is no common ground between them. Every move that has been made for the betterment of the islands by Wood has been fought by Filipino leaders.

The Filipino legislature adopted drastic resolutions against Wood. Leading Filipinos are of the opinion that Wood was hindering their being given freedom.

The resignation is no surprise to anyone. It has been expected for some time, ever since Colonel Thompson was appointed to make an industrial survey of the islands, as well as a report on general conditions.

SIX PRISONERS ARE KIDNAPED BY THE RAIDERS

Men Released Were Serving Sentences For Serious Crimes

HOUSTON, July 22.—Two autos loaded with armed men drove up to the Ferguson prison farm, 25 miles from Huntsville today, shot and killed Prison Guard William Rader, 50 years old, and kidnaped six white prisoners.

The jail delivery was staged in the early morning hours when only Rader was on guard in the prison barracks. All the other guards were asleep at the time and the kidnapers had made good their escape before they could reach the scene.

The autos were headed toward Waco, according to reports to Warden Speer at Huntsville.

Heavily armed possess are pursuing the men, but the roads made heavy from the constant rains are hindering them from their pursuit, according to Mr. Speer.

All men kidnaped are under long-time sentences for robbery with firearms, according to the warden.

Escaped Convicts.

He believed the jail delivery was conducted by convicts who escaped from the prison farm about two weeks ago.

Rader had been guard five years and is survived by a widow and four children.

The two powerful automobiles containing the slayers of Guard Will Rader of the Ferguson state prison farm, and six escaped convicts from that place, were objects of a statewide hunt, Thursday. The killers and convicts are believed headed toward Central Texas, but officers everywhere were notified and asked to aid in the search for them.

About midnight Wednesday the automobiles loaded with armed men, drove up to the barracks of the Ferguson prison farm, six miles from Midway and about 25 miles from Huntsville. They entered and shot Will Rader, the guard, and liberated six of more than the 100 prisoners in the house. The other prisoners were refused release. The automobiles then sped away toward Midway and Normangee, a route which officers believe, will lead toward Waco.

Previous Records.

The escaped men, all in for long terms, and all having previously escaped and recaptured, were named by Huntsville authorities as follows:

Robert Bernard, in for 30 years, robbery, Freestone county; Richard Naylor, in for four years, robbery, Fannin county; George Dixon, in for 30 years, offense not given, Bexar county; Charles Pryor, in for 30 years, offense not given, Red River county; Alvin Ireland, in for 20 years, robbery, Archer county; C. H. Holland, in for 30 years, offense not given, Guadalupe county.

Killed Man

NORRIS GIVES HIS VERSION OF THE HOMICIDE

FORT WORTH, July 22.—Dr. J. Frank Norris, pastor of the First Baptist church, who shot and killed D. E. Chipps in the study of the church Saturday afternoon because he felt he was no physical match for Chipps, and because he feared for his life, he declared in his first statement made to the district attorney shortly after the killing. He said he fired when Chipps made a motion to his hip pocket.

"When Chipps came into my office I saw he was infuriated," Norris said. "I had been threatened many times before and have always been able to take care of myself, so when Chipps came into my office, I thought I could handle him as I have many others before. I thought I could reason with him and he would leave without any trouble.

"I watched every movement of his hands and tried to talk calmly with him although he was using the vilest language. I knew with me sitting down and he standing up, and being the powerful man he was, I would have no chance with him.

"My physical condition now is not at its best. For several weeks I have been considering an operation for appendicitis, and other ailments have me in a very bad physical condition.

The killing followed a sermon preached by Dr. Norris the previous Sunday in which he made charges against H. C. Meacham, and declared "L. D. Haugey, a Roman Catholic, manager of Meacham's store," has discharged members of his church because they would not quit the church.

"Ma" Will Vote In Temple, Will Leave Saturday

WASHINGTON, July 22.—One hundred thousand casks of genuine liquor destined for thirsty Americans during the warm months have been seized by the coast guards so far this year, Lieutenant Commander Stephen Yendel, supervising official of the federal dry navy, said today.

"Run-runners swarm off the coast awaiting an opportunity to land contraband goods," he said. "Approximately one out of every five eludes the coast guard blockade and lands its cargo, it was estimated.

Eighty liquor laden ships have been seized inside of American territorial waters in the last six months. They contained casks of champagne, whisky and rums as well as tins of alcohol for making gin.

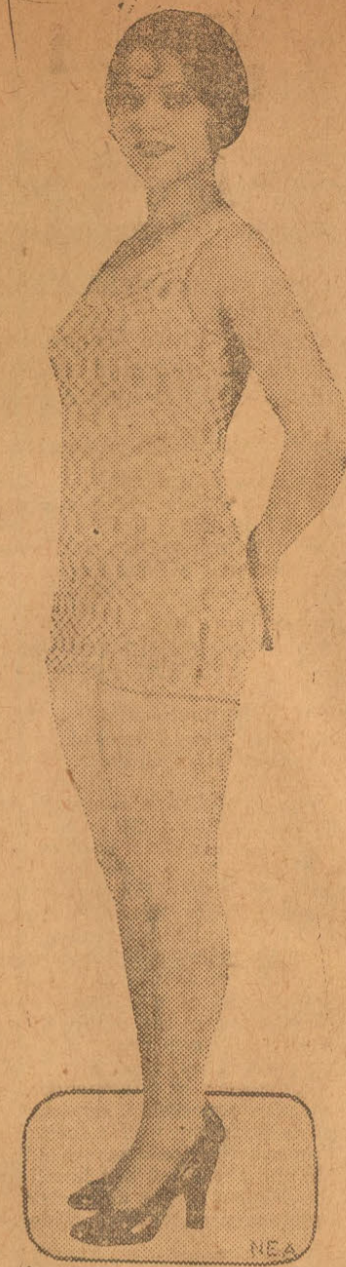

Blanton Presents His Record and Candidacy

In presenting his candidacy for re-nomination of the Democratic party for congressman from this district last night on the high school campus at Ranger, Hon. Thomas L. Blanton of Abilene gave an account of his stewardship and defended his vote opposing the repeal of the stewardship tax. In defense of the accusation that he had no influence in Washington, Mr. Blanton read several letters, one from house parliamentarian Charles Crisp of Georgia, Congressman Henry R. Rathbone of Illinois, and W. D. Upshaw.

He spent some time in explaining why he and the other representatives of Texas helped to kill the Haugen bill that would place a tax on the cotton produced to help the grain farmer of the middlewest.

He was assisted in explaining his acts by his son, who read most of the letters and papers offered by Blanton to support his statements.

He spoke at some length of the part he played in landing Major Forbes director of the veterans bureau in the Atlanta federal penitentiary.

He explained why he should be sent back, because he knows where to take hold and how to take hold to safe guard the interest of his people.

In defending his vote on the estate tax, he told of how Lee Satterwhite, R. A. Stuart and several others came up to Washington to lobby to have the bill repealed on the expense of

wealth. He told about how many democrats, Jefferson, Wilson and others favored the state tax, which is as old as the hills and was used by the ancient Romans. Quite a crowd attended the speaking, and he was well received.


