The scheduled production of "raw stock," as the trade calls the unex-posed film, is 1,250,000,000 feet, which works out into 236,742 and a quarter miles. Roughly speaking, the coarth is 24,000 miles in circumfar earth is 24,000 miles in circumfer-ence, and so the film would girdle it nine times and go pretty well around on the tenth lap.

Part of the film is used for "neg-atives," upon which the action of the photoplay is originally impressed, but by far the larger part of it goes but by far the larger part of it goes into the production of "positize prints"—those which are run through the projection machines at the theaters.
