COOLIDGE SAYS WORLD PEACE PARAMOUNT

WORLD PEACE DECLARED OUR INITIAL DUTY

Responsibility to Bring All Peoples Closer Together Paramount.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4.—William Howard Taft, himself the twenty-seventh president of the United States, today administered the oath of office to President Coolidge, thirtieth president.

As chief justice of the United States supreme court, Mr. Taft officiated at the inaugural ceremonies. It was the first time he has administered the presidential oath. He was appointed to the supreme bench June 30, 1921, by President Harding.

Immediately after the oath the president began his inaugural address. His words leaped out through a microphone before him to the nation through 25 radio stations. For the first time in history, an inauguration ceremony was broadcast to millions of absent spectators.

Ten thousand people jammed the square where presidents of history have launched their administrations and thousands of others lined the mile-long expanse of Pennsylvania avenue from the white house to the capitol.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4.—America's responsibility to lead the world to permanent peace and prosperity was proclaimed by President Coolidge in his inaugural address today as the paramount duty facing the nation.

The United States, isolated alike in its prosperity, its independence and its power, must recognize the obligation imposed by this exceptional position, he declared.

STRESSES ECONOMY
In his address, delivered in the traditional place before the great dome of the capitol, but by the magic of the radio carried far beyond the thousands who had gathered to hear him, to millions throughout the country, the president preached a gospel of international cooperation and domestic economy with a fervor that was at times deeply religious.

The president re-emphasized governmental economy and tax reduction as the basic internal policies of his administration. The reduction of government expenditure, he said, should be cut before government became more of a burden than a protection to the people. Tax reduction he declared was not only economically desirable but an inherent right to which the citizens of state and nation were entitled.

WORLD LEADERSHIP
World leadership in the struggle to advance universal prosperity and peace devolves naturally upon the United States, the president pointed out because among all the nations the United States is the most favorably situated.

Outlining specific ways in which the United States could properly exert its vast influence, the president advocated adherence to the world court, the holding of frequent international conferences such as those which resulted in the Dawes plan and the Paris agreement, continued endeavors to limit armaments, economic and financial assistance to less favored peoples, and the codification of international law.

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION.
President Coolidge stressed the principle that this country could only be permanently prosperous if other countries also attained a measure of prosperity. He urged therefore that the first aim of the United States in its foreign relations should be to assist other countries.

He did not refer to the league of nations or to debts. But this country's traditional isolation, he said, should only go so far as to keep this nation withdrawn from the political affairs of Europe while cooperating in every practical way which might promote peace and prosperity.

EMPHASIZES WORLD COURT
In discussing the world court he advocated this country's adherence in stronger terms than he has ever previously used.

"We cannot barter away our independence or our sovereignty," he said, "but we ought to engage in no refinements of logic, no sophistries, and no subtleties, to argue away the undoubted duty of this country by reason of its domestic of its numbers, the power of its resources and its position of leadership in the world, actively and comprehensively to signify its approval and to bear its full share of the responsibility of a candid and disinterested attempt at the establishment of a tribunal for the administration of even-handed justice between nation and nation. The weight of our enormous influence must be cast upon the side of a reign not of force, but of law and trial, not by battle, but by reason."

DEFENDS PARTY GOVERNMENT.
Coolidge set governmental economy and tax reduction above all the other aims of his administration. Outlining his general political philosophy he vigorously defended the principles of party government, while he just as

DAWES DEMANDS SENATE ACTION

New President of Body Tells Solons to Get Busy.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—In an inspiring inaugural speech Vice President Dawes upon assuming office in the senate today demanded that the legislation rules of that body be revised so as to prevent "obstruction of the public business."

"Reform in the present rules of the senate is demanded not only by the American public opinion, but I venture to say is in the individual conscience of a majority of the members of the senate itself," Dawes declared.

"As it is the duty on the part of the presiding officer of the senate to call attention to defective methods in the conduct of business by the body over which he presides, so, under the constitutional power it is the duty of the members of this body to correct them," the newly elected vice president told the senators.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Deadlocked to the last moment, the sixty-eighth congress concluded today, leaving a mass of unfinished legislation. A little before noon the gavels of presiding officers in the house and senate fell.

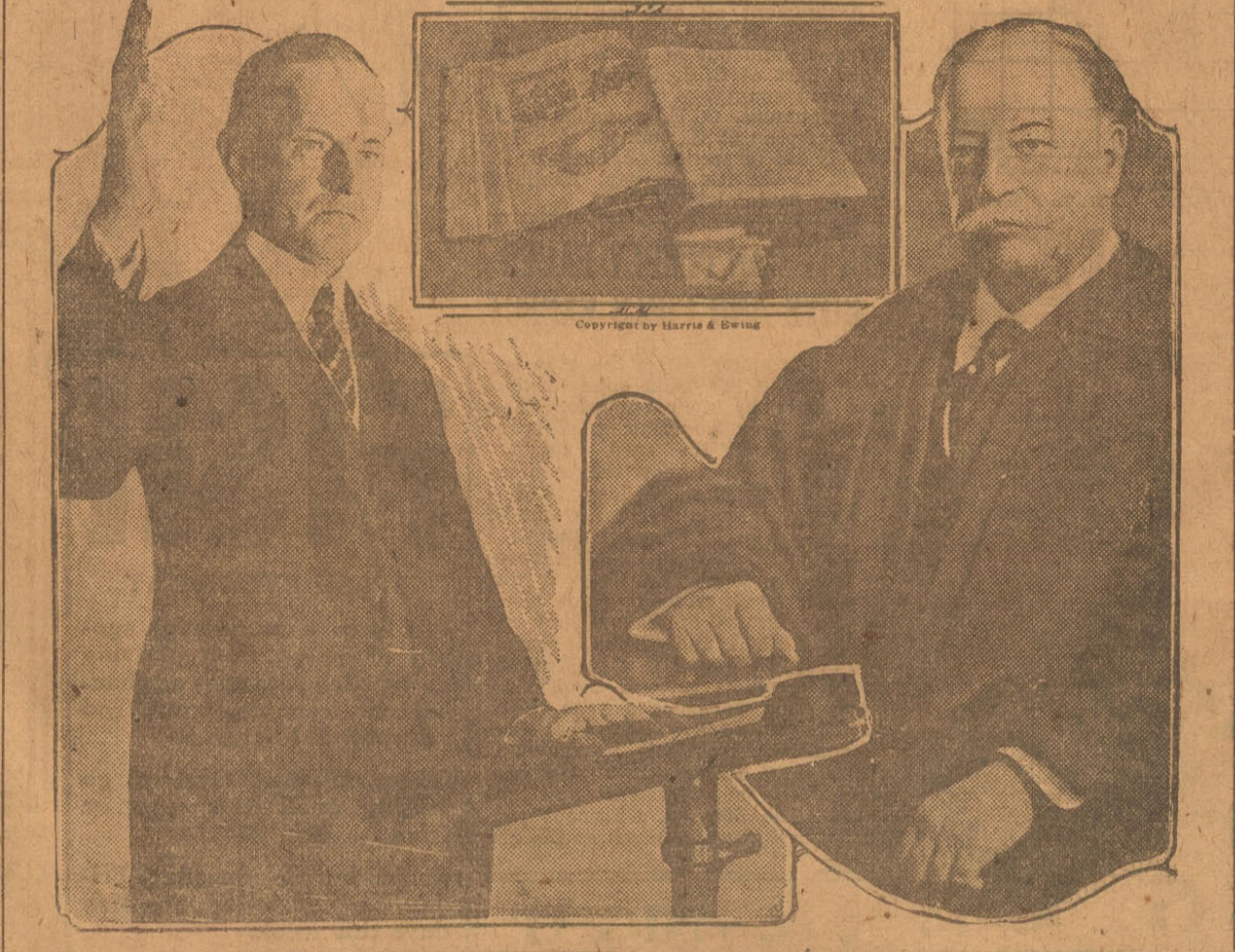

New and Work were appointed by President Harding during vacancies occurred during his administration. Kellogg, Wilbur, Warren and Jardine are selections of President Coolidge.

Mayor Hodges Only Commissioner Decided On Re-election Plans

Ranger city election will be April 7. City Secretary C. A. Love at the weekly commission meeting Tuesday afternoon was instructed to draw up an ordinance calling the election and present it to the commission next week.

Mayor R. H. (Bob) Hodges is the only one of the present commission announced for re-election, the other commissioners stated that they would decide later about the advisability of running for re-election.

Nolan Queen, owner of the property at Austin and Main streets appeared before the city commission and applied for a lowering of the tax reduction on his proposed building and lot. The city commission after considering the question explained at length to Mr. Queen that it would be impossible to set a specific rendition of property for the ensuing year, inasmuch as the matter would be in the hands of the equalization board and out of their jurisdiction.

A committee of two, Commissioners Raymond Teal and Col. Brashier, were appointed to draft an ordinance prohibiting the distribution of circulars in Ranger and to curtail the activities of itinerant peddlers. The ordinance was pointed out by the commissioners to be a matter of self-protection. Neighboring towns have an ordinance prohibiting the distribution of circulars and their merchants literally flood Ranger with handbills, while Ranger merchants are not allowed to use circulars in the other towns, it was stated.

METHODISTS WOULD PREVENT UNIFICATION

WACO, March 4.—At a meeting of the Texas Methodists assembled here to organize a formal movement against the proposed unification of southern and northern Methodist churches, speaking as a Southern Methodist, Bishop James E. Dickey of Waco, presiding officer of the Central, West and Northwest Texas conference, and the New Mexico conference, declared the plan meant, "in brief, absorption of the southern Methodist unit by the northern branch of the church."

Dr. J. M. Baucus, presiding elder of the Corsicana district, is presiding, and Bishop W. N. Ainsworth of Macon, Ga., another of the southern bishops opposing unification was chief speaker at a mass meeting here Tuesday night.

PLAYED FLOYD COLLINS

FOSS, Okla., March 4.—A single funeral service was held here this afternoon for three young brothers who died while playing they were the late Floyd Collins. The boys, Charles, Melzen and Barton Smith, 11, 14 and 16 years respectively, were buried in a cave in a sand bank Sunday afternoon, while playing they were entombed in Sand Cave, Ky.

The sand bank has been a juvenile retreat for many years and is literally honeycombed with passages. These will all be destroyed, city officials declared.

HEAVENS SMILE UPON COOLIDGE AND GEN. DAWES

Most Beautiful Weather Since McKinley Inauguration Greet Executives.

JUSTICE TAFT OFFICIATES

President Does Daily Routine, While His Aide Swaps Yarns With Chum.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Smiling skies and a crisp cool day greeted Calvin Coolidge when he arose this morning to begin the ceremony of his inauguration as the thirtieth president of the United States.

From the standpoint of eye-witnesses the advent of the president's new term of office was more appropriate than that of any national executive since 1901, when William McKinley on a beautiful day took the oath of office for his second term.

General Dawes who took his place at the right hand of the president for the next four years, did not arrive until after 8:30 o'clock. He had remained up late last night swapping stories with Owen D. Young, his associate in drafting the now famous Dawes-Young plan for economical and financial rehabilitation of Europe.

In the hotels and throughout the resident section of the city some 20,000 visitors from all parts of the country were assembled to participate in the day's festivities.

So far as outward appearances signify it was just another work day for Calvin Coolidge. For the first few hours of the day his regular routine was little interfered with. He arose at 7 a. m. as usual and slipped out of the white house for his customary morning walk.

While the house always adjourns at 11:45 a. m. to attend the presidential inauguration ceremonies in the senate chamber, the senate being a continuing body remained in session.

SENATE PASSES EASTLAND'S BILL

The Eastland court of civil appeals bill passed the senate this morning by a vote of 24 to 6 and is now under discussion in the house, according to word received from Milburn McCarty of Eastland. Mr. McCarty stated that his information was obtained from ex-senator Joe Burkett of Eastland county now in Austin.

Provisions in the bill creates a new judicial district with the court of civil appeals located in Eastland.

A bill now pending in the house calls for Abilene as the town to be designated for the new court. In the event that the house passes the Abilene and the senate has already passed the Eastland bill a committee will be selected from the house and senate to meet in conference to decide the fate of the bill.

Ranger Legionnaires Planning New Home

A new home for the American Legion and the ladies' auxiliary in Ranger will be acquired if present plans of Carl Barnes post are consummated. A committee of three, W. C. Hickey, J. B. Heister, and C. vigorously condemned government ownership, and radical constitutional changes. These principles, he declared, had been supported "by a very clear and definite mandate from the people" in the last election.

"When we turned from what was rejected to inquire what was accepted," he continued, discussing the meaning of the election, "the policy that stands out with the greatest clearness is that of economy in public expenditure with reduction and reform of taxation."

ADVISES CONSERVATION
"The principle involved in this effort is that of conservation. The resources of this country are almost beyond computation. No mind can comprehend them. But the cost of our combined governments is likewise almost beyond definition."

"Not only those who are now making their tax returns, but those who meet the enhanced cost of existence in their monthly bills, know by hard experience what this great burden is and what it does. No matter what others may say, these people want a drastic economy."

DOMESTIC SITUATION GOOD.
"I favor the policy of economy, not because I wish to save money, but because I wish to save people. Every dollar that we prudently save means that their life will be so much the more abundant. Economy is idealism in its most practical form."

The president said the domestic situation at present was marked by the most favorable conditions. Industrial relations, he said, were "peaceful and prosperous," employment plentiful, wages good, and wage earners contented, "under the helpful influences of restrictive immigration and a protective tariff," the railroads recovering, and that agriculture, though "slow in reviving," had in the recent rise in the price of cereals indicated "that the day of its deliverance was at hand."

NEEDLESS TAXES LARCENY
The president's address showed evidences of the long hours he had spent in outlining what he wished to say and then in reducing what he said to the brevity he so much admires. The typical Coolidge style reached in his address today new heights of epigrammatic vigor and precision.

As a guiding principle in international relations he said, "if we expect others to rely on our fairness and justice we must show that we rely on their fairness and justice."

Taxation above that absolutely required to run the government he termed "legalized larceny."

U. S. TRANQUILITY EXAMPLE.
And in conclusion he declared, "Here stands our country, an example of tranquility at home, a pattern of tranquility abroad. She cherishes no purpose save to merit the favor of Almighty God."

In the course of his address the president outlined his views on most of the important questions now before the country.

NATIONAL DEFENSE.
Of national defense he said: "Our country represents nothing but peaceful intentions towards all the earth, but it ought not to fail to maintain such a military force as comports with the dignity and security of a great people. It ought to be a balanced force, intensely modern, capable of defense by sea and land, beneath the surface and in the air."

ARMS LIMITATION
Of arms limitation: "Removing the burden of expense and jealousy, which must always accrue from a keen rivalry, is one of the most effective methods of diminishing that unreasonable hysteria and misun-

derstanding which are the most potent means of fostering war."

Party regularity: "Common honesty and good faith with the people who support a party at the polls require that party, when it enters office, to assume the control of that portion of the government to which it has been elected."

TAX REFORM, NOT REDUCTION.
Taxes: "The time is arriving when we can have further tax reduction, when, unless we wish to hamper the people in their right to earn a living, we must have tax reform."

Law enforcement: "In a republic the first rule for the guidance of the citizen is obedience to law."

COMMENDS CONGRESS
Congress: "In spite of all the criticism which falls to its lot, I do not hesitate to say that there is no more independent and effective legislative body in the world."

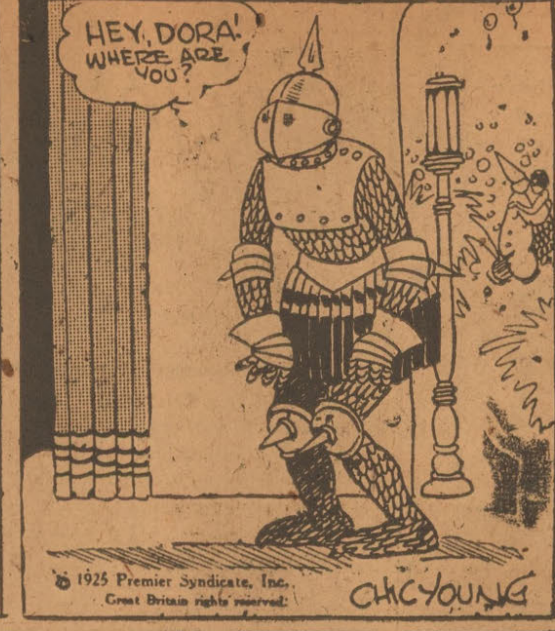
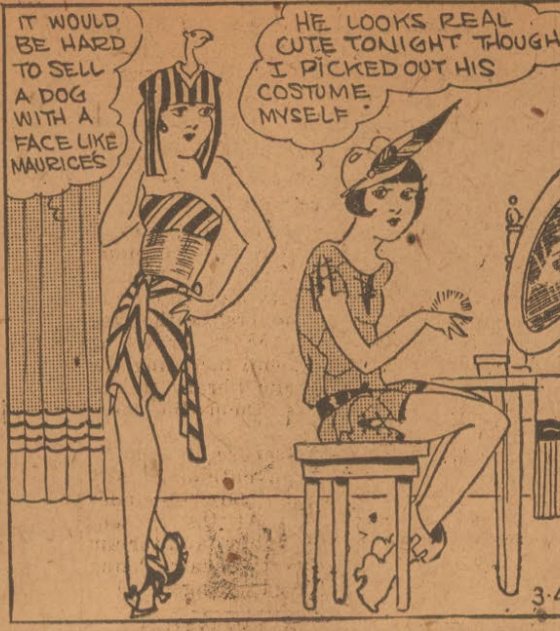

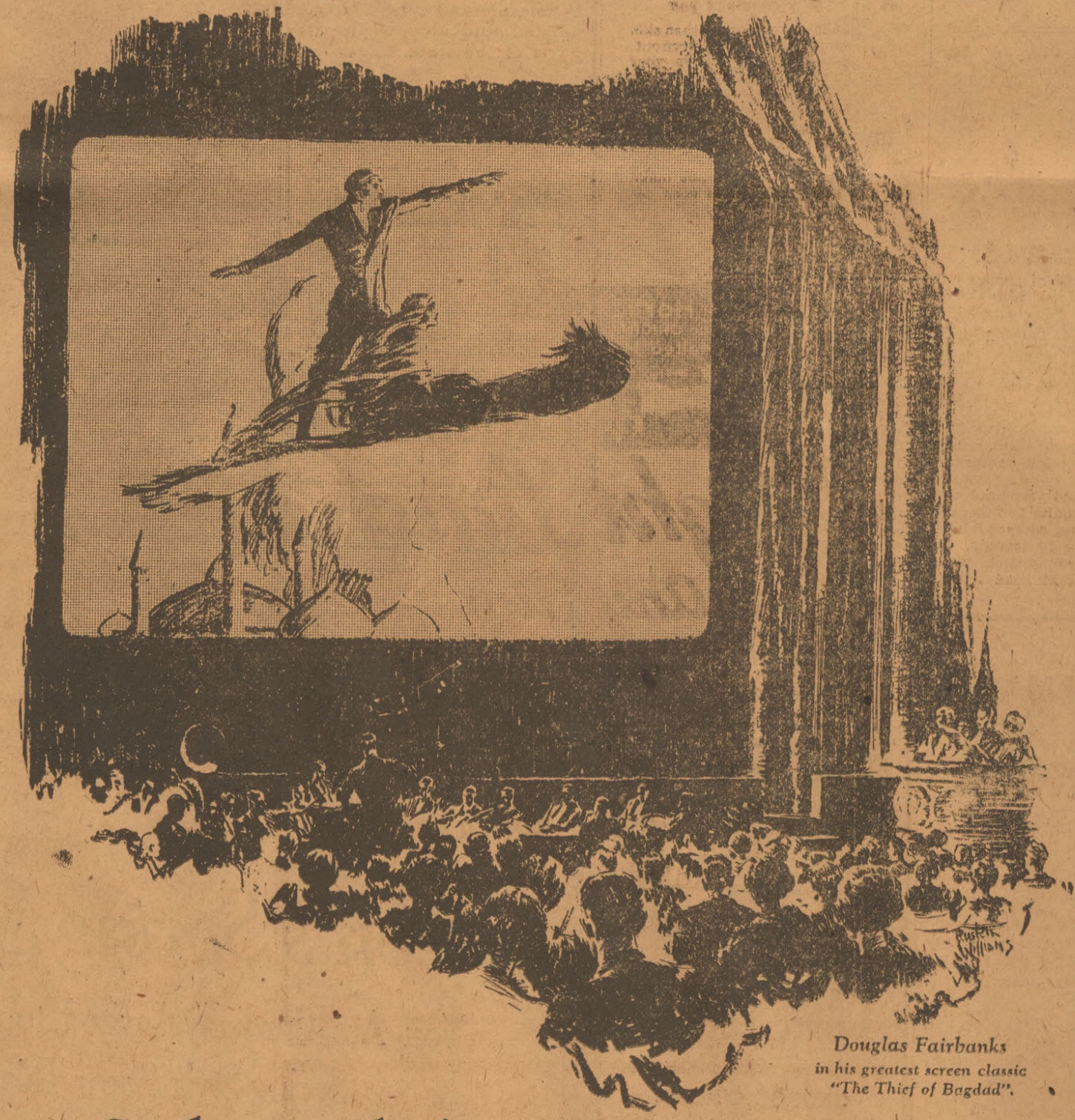
