Obregon Orders All Troops Into Field; Gorozave Exhibited as "Example."

MEXICO CITY, July 19 .- President Obregon decided today upon a mailed fist policy when he ordered all federal troops to mobilize for a concerted drive to crush rebel bands. Soldiers were withdrawn from garrisons in cities and dispatched to the country, with orders to continue a campaign against the inusurgents until all rebellions were stamped out

The order is considered highly significant by political observers who point out that the government evidently fears the growing strength of the rebels may lead to the concentration of all lawless elements under one leadership, thus becoming a real menace to the Obregon gov-

And yet a farmer was heard to remark the other day: "Ranger business men take no interest in the farmers."

Such an impression, though erroneous, should be corrected. Business men and farmers have mutual interests and should stand together and work together for mutual benefit.

Why not, then, have a get-together, and talk it over? Suppose every farmer in this section was invited to meet with the Chamber of Commerce and give suggestions as to how the business men could assist the farmers—and thereby assist themselves? Isn't it highly probable that good would come from such a meeting? Would it not be well to have farmer members of the Chamber of Commerce and farmer director?

It is a fact that Ranger business men are neglecting the interests of the farmer by not getting together with them. They cannot aid the farmer without the farmer's co-operation, and both suffer on that account.

Take the handling of produce, for instance: Town people want fruits and vegetables with the best of flavor and the lowest price. And yet a large percentage of truck sold here is shipped in from outside, entailing greater cost, and lessening the quality, while the local farmer loses profit by being forced to peddle his products.

Now that is a situation that could be remedied by co-operation. Ranger people prefer Ranger produce. Its quality is superior, because it can be picked while at the proper stage of ripeness, if for no other reason. And yet for lack of distribution facilities, the farmer is handicapped for a market and the householder is unable to obtain products of the soil in a proper state of lusciousness.

It stands to reason that business men could arrange a distribution system if they were assured of an adequate supply. They could find out the quantities that Ranger and Ranger territory consume daily. Then the farmers could divide this amount among themselves, and regale the plates of Rangerites with fruits and vegetables plucked fresh each day. The dealer could get his per cent. The farmer could be assured a reasenable market price, based on other markets, and the savings in transportation charges could benefit the consumer.




