

ANOTHER GUSHER IN SOUTH OF EASTLAND

EASTLAND, July 14.-Another gusher is reported south of Eastland. It is the No. 3 Martin of the States Oil corporation, which hit the top of the oil pay at 3,350 feet and is flowing at a rate estimated at 2,000 barrels. There is a strong gas pressure and the flow of the well is said to be increasing. This is the second gusher for the States on the Martin lease the No. 1 still making around 1,400 barrels after being in several weeks.

The Martin No. 3 hit the top of the gas sand at 3,341 feet Wednesday afternoon when drilling was stopped and the boilers moved back.

J. R. Hill and George Beggs of Fort Worth, drilling three-quarters of a mile southwest of production in the field south of town, have encountered a big gas flow at 1,400 feet. 

2: By all means, have the refrigerator large enough. Never crowd it full of food. Food is a heating element, just as tee is a cooling element. When there is too much food the heat gets the upper hand. Too much food in a refrigerator also obstructs the flow of cold air which purifies its contents.

3: It is a good plan to keep the refrigerator in a cool spot, away from drafts. Even a draft of cool air melts ice rapidly.

4: Close the doors tightly and keep them closed. That prevents the warm air outside from seeping in. Open the doors as little as possible; it is estimated that opening a door for just a moment raises the temperature inside two degrees.

5: Never put any food on the ice or in the ice chamber. That melts the ice. Leave the ice uncovered.

6: Putting hot food in the ice box makes a sudden and overwhelming demand upon the melting ice. Always cool the food a bit first, say in cold water.



SOUTH TEXAS ACTIVE IN

SAN ANTONIO, July 14.—The district between San Antonio and Houston, comprising Bastrop, Brazoria, Colorado, Fayette, Fort Bend, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Jackson, Lavaca, Lee, Matagorda, and Wharton counties is being rid of ticks, as is shown by the dipping of 1,668,635 head of cattle during June, according to W. L. Endsley, district supervising in spector of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture. The work is being conducted under the joint co-operation of the Texas live stock sanitary commission and the United States bureau of

animal industry. "The credit for the splendid show to the earnest efforts of the cattlemen in getting out to the dipping vats every 14 days as hear to 100 per cent of the cattle as possible," Inspector Endsley declared, "to the fine spirit of co-operation shown by the county officials in enforcing the tick eradication law; the ever-willingness of the press to publish articles pertaining to tick eradication and boost the work at every opportunity; and the good co-operation on the part of the legal profession by advising their

clients to obey the law. "The counties of Matagorda and Jackson dipped over 200,000, each. The total number of cattle dipped in the district was 1,688,635. The total number of vats in operation was 963 and the area in square miles of the territory was 11,319 square miles."
