New York Central Flyer, Making Sixty Miles An Hour. Hits Crowded Bus at Painesville. Ohio; Five Injured.

> CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 4. -The death of George McGhee today brought the toll of a collision between an auto bus and a New York Central railroad train late last night at Painesville,

Ohio, to fourteen. Five persons are seriously injured and three are expected to die. A coroner's inquest will be held at Painesville this afternoon. City officials of Painesville and officials of the New York Central railroad have already started investigations.

Thirteen bodies were accounted for by the railroad today, but reports are that at least one other person has been killed. E. R. MacPayne, assistant general manager of the New York Central, this morning gave out a statement regarding the collision, in which he said the disaster evidently resulted from the bus driver trying to beat the train to





LAND OWNERS ARE LOSERS IN RIVER BED SUIT

AUSTIN, March 4.—The final ruling of District Judge George Calhoun of the Travis county district court was in favor of the state in the case of Adkins vs. State of Texas from Stephens county. He held that permittees on state land have the right of ingress and egress over the lands of adjacent property owners.

On a former day Judge Calhoun sustained the validity of the mineral act of 1917 which empowered the land commissioner to issue oil and gas permits on the beds of streams classed as navigable under the constitution, being those thirty feet in width or

It was admitted in the Adkins case that the South Fork of the Brazos river came under that classification and Judge Calhoun held that the permit act was valid, thus denying the relief sought by Adkins, who would enjoin the state's permittee from drilling in the river bed opposite his land, he being the riparian owner. The

Judge Calhoun held under advisement the question as to whether a permi given by the state carried with it the holds that it does.


