\$28 for Nine Months Awarded By Jury to Restaurant Employee; at least \$900 Worth of Lawyers' Time Spent on Case

terday afternoon awarded Jim Flattery, 52, erstwhile oil field worker and recent self-acclaimed 'porter, messenger boy, and general roustabout" at the Pershing cafe on Pine street, the sum of \$28 as salary for nine months' work. Mr. Flattery sued for \$200 on a basis of \$1 a day, or \$270, but to be generous toward his former friend, George Copellis, proprietor, he knocked off the odd dollars and made it \$200 even. Work, when even spoken in

connection with the plaintiff was indeed "flattery," Mr. Copellis unhesitatingly avowed in his testimony and argument before the jury. More than a half dozen patrons of the restaurant, testifying for the defense, were of the same opinion and testified that the only work they had ever seen Mr. Flattery do was "to feed his face."

Flattery was the only witness for himself. The proprietor, he declared, had promised in March, 1921, to give him his food and bed and to "use him right" if he would assist him during his wife's illness.

Mr. Flattery continued to eat at the cafe regularly, he admitted, during the time; was given \$12 for eating tobacco and remained perfectly satisfied until the wife of the proprietor recovered and ran him off at the point of a butcher knife, he told the jury.

Copellis declared that he had started feeding Flattery out of sympathy more than nine months ago and had tipped him for every errand that he had run. Flattery, he said, had recounted a hard luck story of how some former attorneys of Eastland had swindled him out of \$1,000 and against whom he had obtained a judgment. He denied that Flattery had ever been employed at the cafe.




