Sober Dies of Wounds WAR EXPERIENCES WAR EXPERIENCES

Loser in Battle With Ranger Officers Tells Little of Self.

Earl Sober, alias Johnson, fatally wounded early Saturday night in duel with Officers Reynolds and L. E Davenport of the police department, south of the city, died at 11:30 last night at the Clinical hospital. The body is being held at the Milford Undertaking establishment pending efforts to locate Sober's wife and children in Vici, Okla. Two other men, one of them living at the house near Olden where Sober sought assistance on escaping from the officers, are being held at police headquarters for investigation.

The second man was arrested yes terday afternoon in Breckenridge, after Sober had implicated him ir connection with the alleged stolen car over which the fight occurred. Sober died last night refusing to add anything to the statement he gave to the county attorney Saturday night, although that official was present just prior to his death and attempted to obtain additional information from the dying man.

Arrested in Fort Worth. According to word received from the Fort Worth police this morning, Sober had been arrested there several times on charge of automobile theft but so far as has been learned here had never been convicted there. The dead man is also said by the police have been implicated in an attempted bank robbery at Ivan some time ago.

He was shot by the officers about " o'clock Saturday night after he had been surprised seated in an alleged stolen car hidden in the brush some four miles south of town, just off the old Olden road. He reached for his revolver as the officers came up and replied to a shot from Reynolds' revolver by shooting that officer through the hat.

"I saw them coming-and then it started," was Sober's laconic story of the battle.

Sober escaped in the brush when the officers ran out of ammunition.

The officers ran out of ammunition. He was located late Saturday night at a house two miles east of Olden. A pallet was made for the wounded man on the porch of the house and here ambulance attendants found revolver beside him.

FLOOD AT OKLAHOMA CITY. By Associated Press.

Says Ranger Cook, Who Admits Knowing Only Three Words of English; Negro Culprit Thinks Court Is Minstrel Show.

For the first time in Eastland county, a witness was asked on the stand this morning if he was a member of the Ku Klux Klan. The question was propounded by Judge Flewellyn of corporation court. No answer was forthcoming-neither was any fine or jail sentence, for his honor was in a gracious mood and the witness was John Varthis, Greek dishwasher who understood no English except ----, an epithet, name or description which the witness testified, through an interpreter, had been applied to him frequently. The interpreter understood the question as somewhat of a pleasantry; the court evidently felt the same way about it, for the question was not pressed. The spectators settled back against the door jambs and the trial continued.

The trial ended when Frank Brown and Walton Berry, negro porters at the Bernardo hotel, who seemed to find the proceedings very amusing, were fined \$10 and costs and \$5 and costs respectively for an attack on the Greek as the latter left his room in the McCleskey hotel several days ago. The attorney for Varthis, who was charged with previously striking the negro, demanded a jury trial for his client. The court, however, dismissed the charge against him.

L. Theoharis of the Ranger cafe, acting as interpreter and later as a witness, declared that the Brown negro had come to the

restaurant about 3 o'clock one morning and while waiting in the kitchen for an order to take out had put his hand in an order that was being prepared for a patron seated in the restaurant. He had been ordered to keep his hand out of the dish and a quarrel ensued in which the Greek struck him,

the witness said. The negro, Frank Brown. smilingly admitted that he had gone to the McCleskey to "whip the Greek" and had taken the other negro along with him. He admitted to striking Varthis over the head with a stick. The Greek had used one English word and one Greek, he said, in giving him some very uncomplimentary advice in the cafe, and had struck

The Berry negro likewise testified to the encounter, but claimed that he went to the Mc-Cleskey as a spectator only, although prepared to join in the affray if any of Varthis' countrymen came to his rescue. The restaurant proprietor protested to the negroes' remarks that they did not "whip a white man but a Greek," and declared that in one other instance, Greek employes of the restaurant had not received full justice, but that the assailant of one had been allowed to plead guilty and pay a \$10 fine in justice court for chopping the Greek with a cleaver. The negroes were warned by the court that a repetition of their offense would mean heavy fines.
