

BOSTON WAGE BOARD URGES \$14 AS SALESGIRLS' WAGE

BOSTON, April 7.-A minimum weekly wage of \$14 for experienced saleswomen in retail stores, with special rates of \$10 and \$12 respectively for minors and apprentices, was recmmended by a wage board Saturday. This represents an increase of 64.7 per cent over the existing minimum of \$8.50, which has been in effect since 1916. The retail store wage board is one of several boards reconvened by the state minimum wage commission for the purpose of revising rates to meet changes in the cost of living.
