Rogers, stormed the parish jail here last midnight. A hole was cut in the wall and several of the mob crawled through. Neither of the prisoners were found and the mob disbanded.

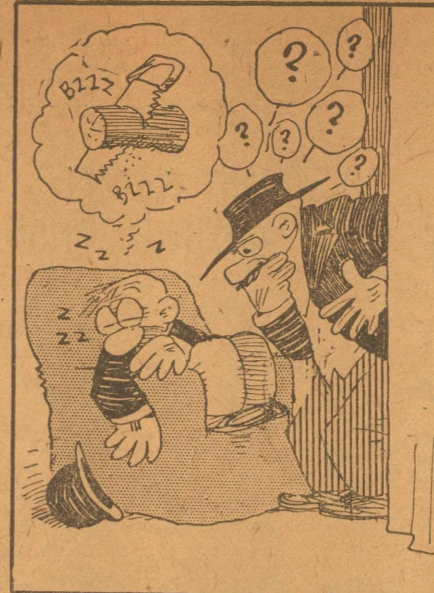
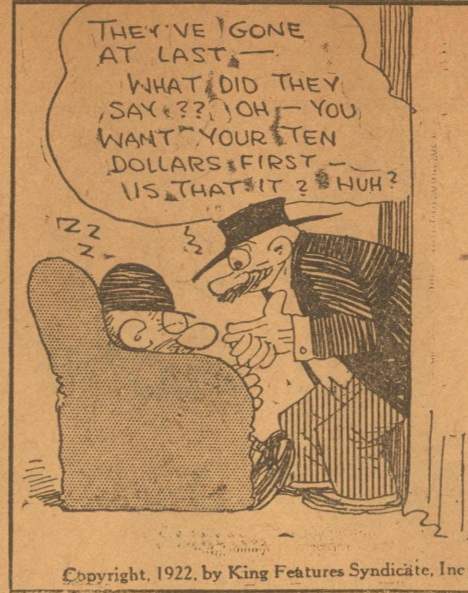
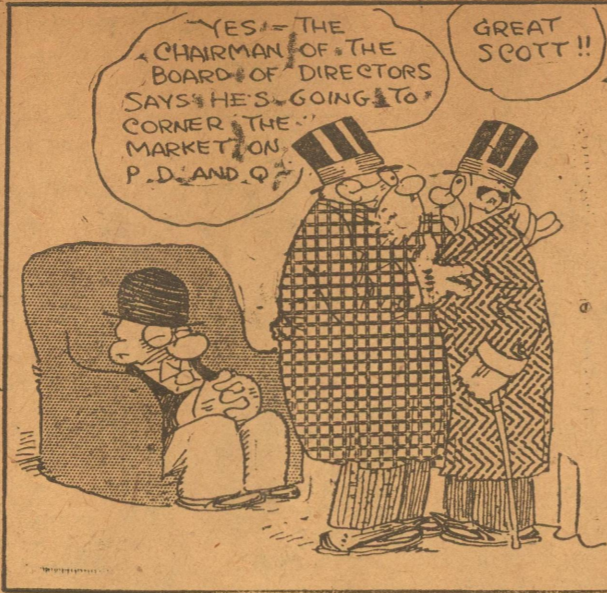
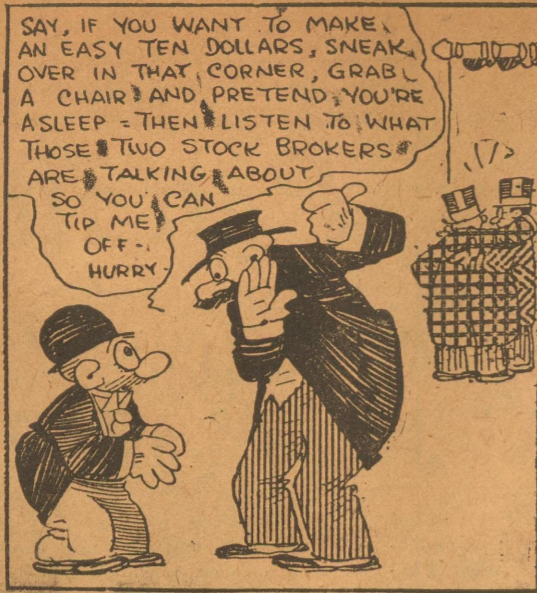
Miss Groves entertained the convention with two clever readings, one of which was "Men, According to Our Feminine Friends," and the other "A Willful Woman."

BUSINESS IS BETTER. Although no specific cause can be pointed out for a betterment of business conditions, yet the signs are unmistakable that things are on an upward trend. Ranger people are by nature optimists—they have had to be—but no town can be optimistic to the extent that Ranger has become in the last month unless there is a present as well as a future. There has been a wave of organization and promotion during the last month. A new bank has been organized. The start of the baseball season has been financed. Many calls have been made upon the business men and other residents for support of various enterprises. And without exception, the appeal has been successful.

That is a sign that more money is trickling into the cash registers now, as well as being looked forward to in the future. Six months ago, these movements would not have been started, because their backers would have adjudged the situation hopeless. But now, they have no hesitancy in asking aid for worthwhile projects—and they get it.

That is fine business. It means that Ranger has won its rear guard action against the depression, which has endured for many months. It means that a line of resistance has been reached and the forward movement has begun again, if Rangerites will but co-operate in getting the things which will make it better and larger.

The past year has not been without its achievements. The new passenger station is virtually completed. Arrangements have been completed whereby the High school and the City-County hospital will soon be under way. Many casinghead plants have been erected in the last year. Other improvements, imposing in the aggregate, have been made, quietly and without ostentation.

Now, Ranger is in a position to plan definite steps. Among the first should be to bring Ranger money home, where it is both safest and most useful. Another is to build more homes with modern conveniences; homes that will attract residents who desire a central location in the oil fields. Another is to cityfy the downtown districts by removing the old-style awnings and ultimately establishing a white way. There are others that might be brought forward. They can be accomplished if Ranger will but work in harmony for the common good.

NITROS WALLOP STRAWN BY VARIED ATTACK, WITH WALLOPS FEATURING

Slapping out fifteen hits and playing a fair to middling game in the field, the Nitros walloped the Strawn team yesterday, 10 to 3. Only a small crowd was present, due to confusion in the advertising arrangement, but those who straggled out accidentally refreshed their eyesight with several nifty plays and a homer by young Mr. Hoffman—a smack sighted at an elevation of 250 mils which was still on the upward curve of its trajectory as it cleared the chicken wire palisade in the right background. Two double plays by the Nitros attested to snappy fielding around the inner works, and there would have been a third if Hardgrove had been as tall as the Guaranty bank building or maybe the Golsol hotel. Strawn also fielded nicely in spots, a catch of a foul bunt by Pitcher Leady and two one-handed stops by Second Baseman Guydis being the best.

Mix 'Em Up. A varied attack, embracing a squeeze play as well as hefty swatting and fast footwork on the baselines, enabled the Nitros to run up their respectable score.

Three of the tallies came in the first with two down, with Craig driving two runs across and Plumlee another. Three more were counted in

the third, when Craig laid one down following hits by Hardgrove and Hoffman. The bunt upset the Strawn infield and all hands were safe. Infield outs and an error put two more across. In the fifth Craig scored on hits by himself and Plumlee and an infield out. In the seventh, Hoffman dumped his third homer in two games, and received the plaudits of the crowd—but no money. The eighth recorded three safeties by Pulley, Bellah and Delane, batting for Craig. The last blow sending two men across.

Strawn connected with the plate only in the first and last innings. Two swats off Zapalac put one over in the first round, and three in a row off York counted two in the windup.

The Nitros didn't look bad at all, even though the competition may not be up to the league standard. They betrayed an enviable and praiseworthy disposition to circle the bases, and had their heads up all the way. Clayton (who hasn't been released, as previously reported) pulled a nice play in the second, when he nipped a would-be stealer at second with a runner at third and one down. Zapalac pulled out of a hole in the second, when he struck out a man after two had hit safely, and the next batter drove a hot bouncer to Bellah, who touched the base and threw to first for the double out. Duckworth caught a foul fly going away from him and held onto the ball, though he fell sprawling, and also blocked the plate in fine form on a close play.

But the main thing, was the boys demonstrated that they can caress that apple. Craig and Bellah led with three each, while Hoffman, Hardgrove and Plumlee each got two.

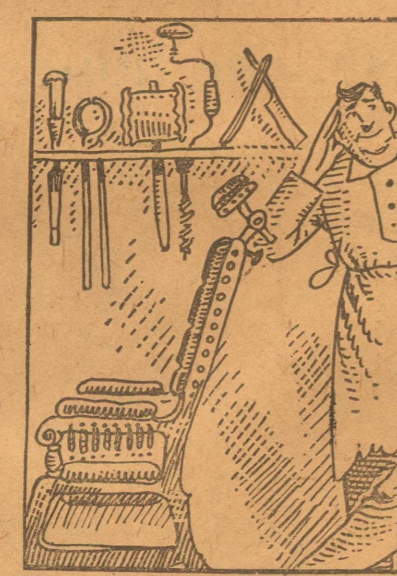
Bronc Riding; Bull-Dogging Contest

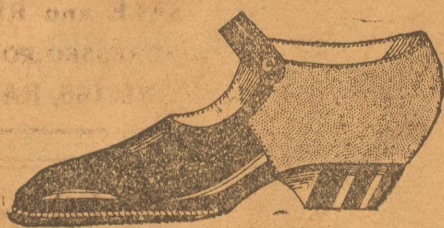

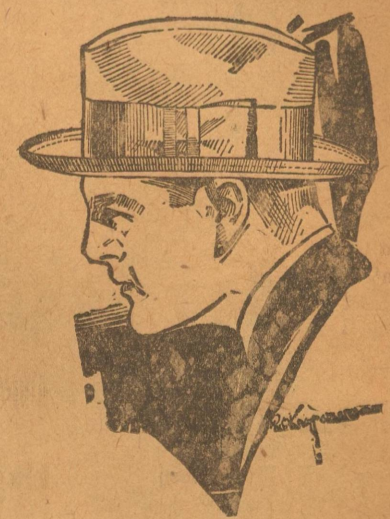

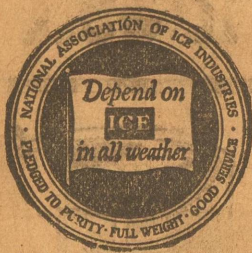
