# Hornsby Pays Penalty

Large Crowd at Belton Disappointed at Not Seeing Hanging.

BELTON, April 14.—George Hornsby, convicted for the murder of J. N. Weatherby at Brownwood in October, 1920, was hanged this afternoon at 2:11 o'clock.

Hundreds of curious persons gathered around the jail hoping to catch a glimpse of the condemned man, for whom much sympathy has been created by the circulation of petitions for executive clemency. The crowds were disappointed, however, for a high board wall had been erected around the jail yard, cutting off all vision. The gallows was erected near the rear of the jail.

Hornsby had refused to make any statement. He appeared to be very nervous and indications were that he might break down before the hanging.






