

EXPECT MA FERGUSON'S WITHDRAWAL SOON

CLEMENCEAU HURLS DEFIANCE AT AMERICA ON DEBT QUESTION

FORMER PREMIER SAYS FRANCE IS NOT FOR BARTER

Calls On Coolidge Not To Consider It A Monetary Affair

PLYMOUTH, Vt., August 9.—The appeal of Georges Clemenceau, the "Tiger" of France, former premier and great figure in the World War, addressed to President Coolidge, is that the president not allow the French debt to be treated as a monetary transaction and in no way to influence the attitude of the American government toward the French financial obligation to the United States, it was indicated today by the president's spokesman.

Clemenceau broke his silence of six years, as the "Petite Journal" of Paris says, "not to interfere with a domestic squabble but to speak of French interests to the American people." France is not for sale and will not sacrifice her freedom for the payment of her debt, the former premier declared.

His declarations were hailed in Paris as the opinion of the average Frenchman, dispatches from Paris state.

"If nations were but business houses, bankers' accounts would settle the fate of the world. You are claiming from us payment of a debt, not of commerce, but of war. You know, as we do, that our treasury is empty. In such a case the debtor must sign promissory notes, and that is just what you are asking us to do, and yet each of us ought to believe that settlement in cash will be made on the day fixed."

"Now it is an open secret that in this affair there are only imaginary dates of payment, which will lead up to a loan with solid security in the shape of our territorial possessions, as was the case for Turkey. Such a thing, Mr. President, I am bound to tell you, we shall never accept."

Monroe is involved. "France is not for sale, even to her friends. Independent she came to us, independent we shall leave her. Ask yourself whether, according to President Monroe, you would feel otherwise about the American continent."

"If France were to disappear under the blows of her enemies and of her sworn friends (this word friends is placed in quotations marks by Clemenceau himself), there would remain of her a name to be proud of."

"Wherein have we failed to fulfill all the demands of duty? Ought we to have surrendered our fortresses to Germany when she demanded them from us under penalty of a declaration of war? Will anyone get up and say we have done nothing but submit to the inevitable? Does Verdun prove we have fought badly?"

"Yes, we have thrown everything into the abyss—blood and money—as England and the United States did on their side, but it was France's territory that was devastated scientifically. For three deadly years we awaited this declaration from America. France is the frontier of Liberty three years of blood and money oozing from every pore."

U. S. Must Judge Herself. "Come to our villages and read the endless lists of their dead and make comparisons, if you will. Was this not a 'bank account,' the loss of this vital force of youth?"

GOVERNMENT ESTIMATES PRODUCTION OF COTTON AT 15,621,000 BALES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The cotton crop was estimated at 69.8 per cent of normal on Aug. 1, indicating a production of 15,621,000 bales, the crop reporting board of the department of agriculture estimated today. This is in the face of a decided reduction in acreage. The yield probably will exceed this, according to some of the board. The Texas crop is unusually heavy, and the average in the Lone Star state is much higher than elsewhere. Seasons fell just right in Texas for a bumper crop with comparatively little damage having been reported from boll weevil and cotton flea pests. RESCUERS DIG TO SAVE FIVE MINERS

SALEM, Ky., Aug. 9.—More than 100 rescuers dug today in hopes of rescuing alive before night the five miners, trapped 600 feet from the entrance of the Star and Zinc mine near here. A diamond drill set up Saturday, has penetrated 47 feet of hard pan and rock to the shale. A drill must sink 50 feet further before the shaft leading to the entombed miners is reached. The pumps are working ceaselessly to bail out water left into the shaft when a small drill struck the bottom of an underground lake.

SMITH AND VARE FACING DEFEAT OF SENATE SEAT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Senator Jim Reed's slush fund investigation has progressed far enough now so that Washington believes Frank L. Smith stands as little chance of being seated in the upper house of congress, even if he wins the senate fight in Illinois, as William S. Vare stands if he wins in Pennsylvania.

Politicians at the capital, however, are not so sure that Smith will carry Illinois as they are that Vare will carry Pennsylvania.

Smith's democratic rival, George Brennan, has no such enormous republican majority to overcome in the Sucker state as William B. Wilson, opposing Vare, will have to overcome in order to win in the Keystone state. Pennsylvania democrats have their hopes, of course, but they're not very brilliant.

Smith, then, may escape the humiliation of a rejection by the senate, by being beaten at the polls. Prospects are extremely poor that Vare will get out of his difficulties in a similar manner. Elected, nothing can prevent his credentials from being turned down by an overwhelmingly republican senate, and the best political judgment is that the next one will be anything but overwhelmingly republican.

Vare being eliminated, it will be up to J. S. Fisher, republican candidate for governor, who is sure to be elected, to fill the Pennsylvania vacancy by appointment.

There already is much speculation as to whom Fisher will pick, if called on to make a selection.

AIR EXPEDITION PLANNED TO MAKE FLIGHT OVER SOUTH POLE IN OCTOBER

BUENOS AIRES—Organization of a new south pole air expedition to be initiated next October, has been announced here by Anton Pauly, Austrian engineer and explorer, whose intention is to conduct the first airplane trip to the bottom of the earth.

Pauly plans to start from Buenos Aires in a sailing ship near the end of October in order to make the coast of Graham Land about the middle of November. According to plan, the ship will land the expedition on Wandel island at 65 degrees south latitude, where the primary base of operations will be established.

Established Base. The next step will be the establishment of another base 10 degrees farther south. Eight trips by airplane are calculated to be sufficient to transfer food and fuel supplies to this point which will be 300 miles nearer the pole. Following the establishment of this last base the party will digress temporarily from its prime goal to make explorations in the Weddell sea and to Charcot Land.

Following these explorations a final preparatory move will be made to a point at 80 degrees south latitude, 600 miles nearer the pole than the previous base. This point is calculated to have an altitude of 6,000 feet above sea level, and from here the

flyers will make their dash to the south pole, a flight of 600 miles.

Stop. According to Pauly's statement the pole is a plateau 10,000 feet high. He states: "We will stop at the pole long enough to make necessary observations and to try to find messages left there by Captain Scott in 1922. We shall then continue the flight to Wales bay, where we hope to find the deposit left by Amundsen. This distance is about 600 miles, making the whole flight from our 80 degrees base nearly 1,300 miles."

In the actual flight across the polar region Pauly plans to carry two passengers besides himself, a pilot, observer and mechanic. Two months' food supplies and equipment for a sled expedition to be used in case of accident to the plane will complete the cargo carried on the flight.

No time limit has been set for the expedition which is expected to end at Melbourne, Australia. Pauly is confident of his success and is laying careful plans to insure against mistakes in preparation. He has long been associated in ventures of exploration and research.

Pauly is the author of several volumes on geographic conditions in little known parts of South America and has long since established himself as a leading mining engineer in Chilean and Bolivian fields.

2 LAMAR PRISONERS BREAK JAIL

PARIS, Aug. 9.—After wresting a radiator pipe from the wall of a death cell in which they were confined, in the Lamar county jail, Carl Golden, 24 and Paul Stephens, broke the bars from the cell and escaped Sunday night.

The men had been put in the death cell on account of previous attempts to escape. They lowered themselves to the ground by tying blankets together.

MOODY LACKS 886 VOTES OF THE MAJORITY

Leaders Expect Real Love Feast Before Meeting Is Closed

DALLAS, Aug. 9.—The question of whether there will be a run-off contest between Dan Moody and Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson for the democratic nomination for governor was still undecided when the state democratic executive committee recessed shortly before noon Monday morning until 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

The first tabulation made by the sub-committee showed Dan Moody to be 886 votes short of a majority over the field in the governor's race with Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson as the runner-up. This tabulation is now being re-checked. No withdrawal of Mrs. Ferguson's name has been received by the committee at noon, Arthur Edison of Hamilton, state chairman, said.

James E. Ferguson, husband of the governor, when informed by the newspapermen that Moody lacked a majority on the first compilation, and asked whether Mrs. Ferguson's name would be withdrawn, was non-committal. He cited a Bible quotation: "Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof," and added, "Life is one continual introduction to a long story."

The state committee received the official returns from every county except Edwards and Gray counties. The election results in these counties are not included in the tabulation, their vote is small.

A petition was filed with the committee Monday morning by Mrs. Edith Wilmons of Dallas demanding a recount of the returns. She declared that irregularities had existed.

Chairman Edison announced he had received the petition and that he did not believe it sufficient to require a recount. He said he wanted to go over it carefully, however, and would bring the matter up in the afternoon.

Many members of the committee were predicting Monday noon that ex-Governor Ferguson would present Mrs. Ferguson's withdrawal as soon as the official count is announced.

"The meeting is going to end in a 'love feast,' one of the committee said.

"Ferguson is going to make a speech withdrawing Mrs. Ferguson's name and announcing that he would support the nominee."

"I have no information on this, but that is my guess."

Dan Moody and Jim Ferguson both attended the meeting. Ferguson was in high spirits. He has completely recovered from the strain he showed during the campaign and appeared in fine health.

FERGUSON QUESTIONS EXPENSES

DALLAS, Aug. 9.—A petition in behalf of Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson in which the legality of Dan Moody's campaign expenditures in the recent democratic primary was questioned, was filed with the Texas state democratic executive committee this afternoon.

The canvassing committee reported its findings on both counts in the first primary for governor: Moody, 409,732; Davidson, 122,449; Ferguson, 283,482; Johnson, 1,029; Wilmons, 1,580; Zimmerman, 2,962.

The committee recommended that the names of Mrs. Ferguson and Dan Moody be placed on the tickets for the run-off primary in August.

BRITISH SUBMARINE H-29 GOES TO BOTTOM

LONDON, Aug. 9.—The British submarine H-29 sank today in the Devonport basin, the admiralty announced. It was feared that one officer and four civilian dock workers had lost their lives. Divers have located the submarine, according to the announcement.

The H-29 lies at a depth of 25 feet.

"Their principal advantages are cooperative marketing," Mr. DeLane said.

Mr. DeLane stated that a poultry expert from Petaluma, Calif., was interested in what is being done in Eastland county in the poultry business and is desirous of coming to Eastland and engaging in the business if a suitable ranch of not less than 20 acres can be secured for him. On the motion of Jack Lewis, President Brelsford appointed a committee to work with a committee from the Eastland Lions' club to endeavor to secure a suitable 30-acre ranch for the California man.

"Ted" Ferguson told the Rotarians of what is being done in the way of oil development in the Panhandle. "A large number of wells have been shut down and others are to be shut down at once in that section because of the lack of pipe line facilities," Mr. Ferguson said.

Earle Johnson, chairman of the program committee for today, gave an interesting talk on the activities of man. "Some men have reached the dead line at 20, others at 40 and 60, while other never reach it," Mr. Johnson said. The speaker declared that education was the means by which a person might use his intelligence.

Craig of Houston, father-in-law of Major Harry Brelsford of Eastland, was present at today's luncheon as the guest of Senator Brelsford. Mr. Craig made a short talk, expressing his pleasure at meeting with the Eastland Rotarians.

Woman, Woman, Where's Woman With Blank Bond

Eastland county officers are looking for a woman, wanted in this county on a charge of swindling. The woman, it seems, gave the officers the slip Friday when she persuaded them to allow her to go from Eastland to Cisco to get parties there to sign a bond for her. She left Eastland for Cisco with blank bond. Whether she got it signed or not, is not known, but she has not returned nor neither has she sent the bond in, the officers declare.

She was charged by complaint with swindling in connection with a deal in which certain parties purchased an automobile from an Eastland dealer some weeks ago. Friday a representative of the company from whom the car is alleged to have been obtained, was tipped off from Cisco that she was leaving that city in a car en route to Austin; that she had with her some \$400 or \$500 in cash. Representatives of the automobile company caused her arrest when she reached Eastland and caused a complaint charging swindling to be filed against her. It was while she was endeavoring to make bond on this charge, which had been placed at \$500, that she was allowed by the officers, to go alone to Cisco to get signers for the bond.

The officers say they are not at all uneasy that the woman won't either come back or send the bond. They believe she didn't want to delay her trip to Austin and that, when that has been made, she will show up with the bond.
